centre, housed in what was once Shelburne's most palatial home, brings to completion an idea which started with the Dufferin county federation of agriculture. From

the beginning the idea was popular throughout a wide section of the county. Today there are more than 305 members who paid a \$10 membership. Seen above is one of hospital's first patients.
