Trinity Credit Union Shows Gains In Assets, Membership

SUMMERSIDE—From assets of \$1,500 of 37 members shown on its annual report in 1958, the eleventh annual meeting of Trinity Credit Union last evening in Summerside reported a membership of 117 and a record of over \$29,000 in assets.

President Harold Carr presided at the business meeting which followed a turkey banquet served by the Trinity Women's Auxiliary.

Chairman of the credit committee, Ralph Heckbert, reported 20 new loans made during the year, totaling more than \$10,000. A dividend of two percent was approved by the membership on share capital, and the interest rate of one-half of one percent per month on the unpaid bal-

ance of loans will be retained. The meeting authorized the board of directors to add temporary disability loan insurance to its previous death and permanent disability insurance protection on members' loans.

Guests at the banquet meeting included the president of St. Paul's Credit Union, Leo Wood, who addressed the meeting and described the progress of his credit union and some of the benefits that it had made possible for its members.

At the conclusion of the meeting a Canadian color film was shown by John Hopkirk. New officers for Trinity Credit Union were chosen in spirited elections. The result of the balloting named Maynard Thomp-

son, Elmer Moore and Don Baker to the board of directors; Earl Arsenault and W. E. MacCausland to the credit committee; Alan Jenkins to the supervisory committee; and Vance Bridges, Dr. H. E. Clark and Parker Crockett to the nominating committee.

The treasurer's report was made by Harry Bishop; the supervisory committee's report by Keir Duggan; and the clerk's report by Parker Crockett.

Vice-president Marven Wiley presided while the president's report was made by Harold Carr.

Arsenault, Tignish; Frank Bryan, Casumpeque; Harvey Hutt, Alberton South; Harold Phillips, Conway; Keir Ramsay, O'Leary; Ralph Adams, O'Leary; Hubert Gaudet, Tignish; Frank Weeks, Alberton and Fred Peters, St. Louis.

TOURISM EMPHASIZED
An emphasis on tourism was indicated in the annual report of the secretary-treasurer. Roadside tables, a fine picnic and camping site at Bloomfield and an extensive survey eventually leading to the construction of a new scenic highway in western Prince County were a few of the projects mentioned by the secretary as occupying the board during the year. Concluding his report Mr. Leard was pleased to announce an increase in membership and it now stands at 74 with an average attendance at regular meetings of 22.

In his annual report the retiring president, Earl Atkinson, expressed appreciation to both the former and the present provincial governments for co-operation with the West Prince Board.

Among projects dealt with were resolutions regarding snow removal, sponsorship of a minor hockey league and donation of trophies, a swimming and a water safety course and the formation of a tourist association.

A long time project, the dredging of the entrance to Alberton Harbor and improvements to docking facilities, is presently being carried out, the president stated. The dock extension has been completed and dredging is to be continued next year. A water depth of 16 feet at low tide has been recorded on the inner bar after about two months dredging.

Aquatic Day was again most successful in its original purpose which was as an attraction for tourists and publicity for western Prince County, it was reported.

WAS GUEST SPEAKER
The guest speaker, Mr. Farmer gave a comprehensive outline of what constitutes a board of trade or chamber of commerce and how they function on the community, provincial and national level. It is definitely not a social club, it is to get things done and is only as strong as its members and officers, he stated. The chamber of commerce movement has been in operation for a long time, he said, and it is one of the

most constructive voluntary groups in a community. A common desire links the boards together for the betterment of the province and country and they are a force which no government at any level can afford to ignore, Mr. Farmer continued.

The importance of keeping the old members while gaining new ones and the need for a good secretary were points stressed by the speaker.

A motion expressing appreciation to Mr. Farmer was made by Hubert Gaudet and seconded by Frank Bryan.

Short addresses were made by the Summerside and Charlottetown board of trade officers present. William Fraser, Dr. Phillips and Dr. George Dewar made brief remarks.

Walthen Gaudet urged members of the board or anyone interested in the tourist trade or fisheries to make an effort to represent west Prince at meetings of the provincial tourist association and the fisheries federation.

The banquet was catered to by the Ladies Aid of the Western Hospital.

Action Taken In Shore Area

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN—The Prince Edward Island department of health has ordered the Summerside director of town planning to declare a number of dwellings in the Glover's Shore area as unfit for human habitation, it was learned from an informed source yesterday.

Reached yesterday Health Minister Hubert MacNeill said he understands that homes will be declared uninhabitable as they become vacant and no one will be dispossessed at the present time.

Dr. MacNeill said this action would ease the present situation at Glover's Shore where seeping sewage has contaminated drinking water.

Taking this course the town would prevent anyone from occupying the dwellings until the matter has been cleared up. Some people have already moved out.

Dr. MacNeill also says that the community of Tignish has also asked for a sanitary survey in its area similar to the one conducted at St. Eleanor's.

Nehru Sends Protest To Communist Chinese

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—Prime Minister Nehru forwarded a strong protest to Communist China Wednesday rejecting its claims to Indian territory on the northern frontier.

A few hours later, Nehru told 100 Parliamentary members of his Congress party that "every possible step will be taken" to defend Indian soil against Chinese inroads.

The party members, at a 3½-hour private session, told the prime minister India is in a mood to defend its territory "at any cost."

Nehru declared India must remain non-aligned in regard to power blocs. He said all countries except Communist China want to end the cold war.

NEHRU MISLED
Nehru is understood to have confessed he was completely misled by Chinese professions of friendship. It also is understood he told the private meeting that "thousands" of Chinese Communist troops actually are in Indian territory.

In reply to members' questions, Nehru said the possibility of a joint defence policy with Pakistan did not arise. But, he added, the current improvement in relations with Pakistan is a great help in the present situation.

A Congress spokesman said Nehru was asked about the call by the former army chief of staff, Gen. K. M. Cariappa, for immediate action to drive the Chinese out of Indian territory.

The spokesman said Nehru replied the general's statement was "not appropriate."

It was understood most members left the meeting dissatisfied with the government's policy. Further meetings are expected.

Wednesday's note to Peking, an Indian government spokesman said, rejected "all Chinese claims" made in a statement Oct. 26.
