

Tigers Boost Slim Lead In American League Race By 6-3 Win Over Yankees

Quebec Pro Ties With Two Yanks In Golf Tourney

MONTREAL, Aug. 24—(CP)—Lennie Harman, the unsung professional from the nine-hole Knowlton, Que., Golf Club, whipped Royal Montreal's elaborate layout today with a blistering five-under-par 67 and tied two Americans for the lead in the first round of the Canadian open golf championship.

Harman's 67 stood alone until the heavy suns of the American invaders came into action and Willie Oggin of White Plains, N. Y., and Ed Furgol of Royal Oak, Mich., caught up with him.

Canadians kept well up with the parade of the American stars and in contending position.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24—(CP)—Kas Zabowski of Halifax Golf Club today topped five Maritime golfers participating in the Canadian open golf championship.

He put together scores of 38 and 36 for an 18-hole total of 74. He was followed by Pete Kelly of Fredericton Golf Club with 38-37-73.

Other scores were: Don Sinclair, Saint John Riverside, 43-35-78; John McPherson, Saint John (no club listed) 36-42-78; and Vince Halsall, Moncton Lakeside, 39-41-90.

Fish And Game Meeting Held At Morell

At a meeting of the King's County Fish and Game Association held at Morell last night, the following were elected to represent the branch on the Provincial executive: Cyril Johnston, president; Allan MacLean, vice president; King's County Harold F. Landry, secretary; James James, director; Glen MacLaren, director.

Several items of importance were taken up during the meeting, particularly regarding the leasing of streams and their pollution by foreign material.

It was brought to the notice of the meeting that certain reports had come in regarding the using of 22 rifles on wild ducks in certain localities. It was felt that any report of such infraction of the hunting laws should be reported immediately to the R.C.M.P. and action be taken against the violators.

Another question of importance regarding the rice seeding of fresh water ponds was considered. It was felt that the addition of such feed would add considerably to the number of ducks in the particular locality and thereby create more interest in hunting. However, no move, it was decided, should be made without the permission of the owners of such mill ponds. It was further pointed out that the addition of such feed would in no way hinder the proper operation of the mill.

The wild rice for the fresh water ponds could be acquired without any difficulty in Pisiquid Pond or in some other area. For salt water seeding a special feed would be necessary which could be acquired at some mainland points.

Mr. Stewart Jones spoke briefly on the support required for the continued good success of the county branch, and urged all sportsmen to join the association. He further urged the full support of all members for any special project which might be undertaken by the branch.

Mr. J. A. Rodd, Department of Fisheries, commented on the progress of the local branch and also asked for the hunters' assistance in carrying out a census survey which the Department was making this year by filling out a form at the end of the season indicating the number of game obtained during the season. This assistance, he said, would help to determine the length of the season and bag limit for the next year so that the shooting game might not be depleted too rapidly and that the

The Detroit Tigers salvaged the final game of their three-game series with New York Yankees yesterday 6-3 and boosted their slim lead in the American League race to 2½ games.

Detroit put together three big innings after the Yankees had taken a 3-0 lead, and with Hal Newhouser allowing only four scattered hits after the third inning the hard-pressed Tigers partially avenged defeats in the first two games.

It was Newhouser's first victory since July 17, and he picked a sweet spot, with a crowd of 44,078 looking on. Tommy Byrne was the losing pitcher, and it was Tiger hitting more than his lack of control which brought his downfall.

A ninth-inning two-out homer by Junior Stephens with the bases loaded gave Boston Red Sox their 10th straight victory with a 6-2 decision over St. Louis Browns. It was a heartbreaking setback for Ned Garver, the only St. Louis fliker to gain a decision over the Sox in the 19 games those clubs have played to date.

In the National League Emory (Bubba) Church scattered five Pittsburgh hits to pitch Philadelphia to a 4-2 victory—the fourth in a row for the National League leaders. It was Church's sixth triumph against two losses.

Bob Elliott drove in the 1,000th and 1,001st runs of his career as Boston Braves defeated Chicago Cubs 11-9 in the first game of a National League doubleheader. The Cubs took the nightcap 4-3 as Frank Hiller bested Mickey Haefner in a pitching duel.

Proximity Wins Trotting Event

WESTBURY, N. Y., Aug. 24—(AP)—Proximity, the sensational queen of the trotters, led all the way tonight to win the \$25,000 American Trotting Championship at Roosevelt Raceway.

Chris Spencer, who defeated Proximity in the event last year, was second, three quarters of a length back of the fast-stepping eight-year-old daughter of Proctor-Agnes-Worthy. Third in the field of eight of the country's top trotters was Full Bloom, a 35-to-1 shot.

Proximity, never extended, finished the mile in 2:03 2/5.

The odds-on favorite, Proximity returned \$27.40, \$2.40 and \$2.20.
