WORKERS OF THE WORLD.

Temperance Women of all Countries to Meet in Boston.

(Chicago Tribune).

The interest of temperance women of the United States and of the world is being centered about the coming world's and national conventions of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, which will be held in Boston Nov. 10 to 18—the world's convention meeting the 10th and the 11th, and the national convention holding forth from the 12th to the 18th. This will be the first world's convention of the W. C. T. U. that ever convened and the eighteenth national convention. Five hundred delegates are expected from the United States alone, besides a large number from Canada and abroad. With the exception of the general officers of the states and nations, every delegate to this convention must have at least five hundred paid up members of the W. C. T. U. as her constituency. The conventions will meet in Tremont Temple; the committee meetings will be held in Park Street Congregational Church on Boston Common, and at the Massachusetts state headquarters of the W. C. T. U. on Tremont street. Some of the meetings will be held in Faneuil Hall.

The women want to have a hand in making that "cradle of liberty" at least once, even if they have had to wait over a hundred years to get a chance. Miss Francis E. Willard tersely remarked: "The convention will open on Tuesday morning, Nov. 10, and the opening prayer will be made by Mrs. Mary Grant Cramer, of New Jersey. Mrs. Cramer is a sister of the late General Grant."

OPENING ADDRESS BY MISS WILLARD.
The address of the opening morning will be made by Miss Francis E. Willard, president of the world's and national W. C. T. U. She will make a survey of the world as to the present traffic in and use of brain poisons, the great deteriorators of the human race, treating principally alcohol, opium and tobacco, against all of which the faces of the white ribbons are set as flint. The address of welcome will be given the evening of Nov. 13 by Mrs. Mary A. Livermore in Tremont Temple.

TEMPERANCE PEOPLE TO BE NESTOR among women of brains in this country. The Governor of Massachusetts and the Mayor of Boston will deliver addresses of welcome also, and Phillips Brooks expects to make a speech in assisting the welcoming of the guests. The response for the union will be made by Mrs. Mary Clement Leavitt. She well deserves the name, for in the last eight years that she has been travelling in the interest of the temperance work she has visited every habitable country of the globe, and, according to Miss Willard, sighs for more planets to conquer. Lady Henry Somerset, President of the British Women's Christian Temperance Union, will be one of the most notable women to come before the convention. Lady Henry comes to America with Mrs. Hannah Whitall Smith, who will also address the convention.

WOMEN WHO WILL BE THERE.
Mrs. G. L. Parker, chairman of the dress reform committee of the women's council and wife of Col. Parker, the famous educator of Chicago and president of the Cook county Normal School, will present. Prof. Rena A. Michels will address the convention on the Woman's Ballot, and Alice Fremont Palmer will also deliver an address. Prof. Anna E. Morgan will speak on The White Lady. Mrs. Mollie McGee Snell of Mississippi will have for her subject: "What the White Ribbon has done for Mississippi Women." Mrs. Frances Griffin of Alabama, will also speak. Dr. Kate Mitchell of London, has for her subject The Scientific side of Temperance. Mrs. Mary Wright Sewall will give a presentation of the National Council of Women, to be read before the convention. Mrs. Zerelda Wallace will also deliver an address.

Matilda B. Carse will be on hand with a model of the Women's Temple of Chicago. Mrs. Mary T. Lathrop will speak to the assembled delegates. Forty superintendents of departments will give reports of the work accomplished by their respective charges, and 44 state presidents and six territorial presidents will make two minute speeches on the temperance work in the states and territories. A delegation of 50 women will be present gathered from all parts of Canada. It will be headed by Mrs. Judge Steadman, president of the Canadian W. C. T. U. The delegation will be accompanied by Lady Edith Archibald, whose father, Sir Edward Archibald, was for 20 years British Consul to the United States and who was knighted for his services during the civil war. A royal commission of inquiry into the effects of the liquor traffic on the nation has been established by parliament, and it is almost certain that Mrs. Archibald will have a place on the commission, the first woman so honored.

The music for the convention will be under the charge of Mrs. Alice Osborn-Lake, the soprano soloist of Tremont Temple, Dr. Lorimer's church.

A banquet will be spread in Boston Music Hall the evening of November 16, to which 3,000 guests will be invited, and the toasts will be given by the most distinguished speakers of the temperance cause in America.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

The Case of Mr. Henry.

SIR,—The Patriot of the 15th inst. has a short editorial in defence of its friend James R. McLean, Commissioner of Public Works. Whether to strengthen or weaken his arguments, he openly admits that he knows nothing of the merits of the case. This is a very strange admission. Generally, I thought the editor of the Patriot prided himself on being accurate.

Now for the facts. He calls Mr. Nicholson's report a settler. If the report was accurate, it would doubtless be a "settler." But as other men are equally as good judges of heights and distances as either Mr. Nicholson or Mr. McLean, it is contended that the report in all particulars is not strictly accurate. Suppose for argument sake that it is, why, then, does not the Commissioner call upon Mr. Henry's securities to complete the work? Why keep Mr. Henry without his money and use the Bridge for about six months without compensation? If the Government are not biased by meddlesome reports from would-be officials and office hunters, they would say to Mr. Henry "do so and so where we think the contract is deficient, and we will pay you; otherwise we will give you an arbitration or a fiat and sue the government. No, this does not appear to suit the honorable (?) gentleman. He has no respect for the certificate of the Inspector who watches the contract while building, and whose certificate is in the hands of Mr. McLean, and the government let him take this as a counter settler to that of Mr. Nicholson's report. I presume John R. Corbett's veracity will not be questioned by any body of men, and his certificate that the work was finished satisfactorily will carry more weight as he was on the spot at the time the work was building, and knows whereof he wrote. The pile work was never better than it is now, and competent judges will tell you that is higher than formerly. Were it not for the settlement of the brush work at the north end, the appearance of the bridge is good, and it appears the mud in the river is so deep that it is a matter of impossibility to allow or pre-determine the amount of settlement, particularly six months after the completion of the work. (This is taking a shabby and unfair advantage of Mr. Henry. He has been in the habit of building bridges since the Government and gave general satisfaction. In fact this bridge has never been in better condition since it was first built by Mr. Henry. And I again ask how is it Mr. Henry is so harshly and unfairly dealt with?)
