

St. Mary's Roar From Behind In Third Period For 4-3 Win Over Miners

GLACE BAY, N.S., Feb. 10 (CP)—Halifax St. Mary's set Glace Bay fans back in their seats with a bang Saturday night when they came from behind a three-goal deficit with four goals in the last 10 minutes of play to whip Miners 4-3 and take over the lead in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

The loss put Miners in the fourth place slot.

The visitors trailed Miners 2-0 at the end of the first period, and 3-0 going into the final stanza but whipped in two goals in the lightning time of 21 seconds. With three minutes to go, they tied it up.

Things looked bleak for Saints when McKenzie was penalized for holding but they kept up the fight and pushed in the winning marker 13 seconds before the game ended.

Halifax was outshot 32-21 as Miners held the territorial edge all the way but Jimmy Strachan held the answers.

Leger and Cooper scored for Miners in the first period, and Haley added another in the second, but a brace by Morrow and singles by Ford and Watson in the third stopped Miners.

The second period witnessed the only flurries of the game when Bloomer and Bergeron tangled at the Halifax blue line. They started high-tackling but Bergeron wouldn't drop his stick when challenged to fight by Bloomer. Both were waved to the penalty box with misconducts as well as minors.

In the alleyway by the sin bin Bergeron swung at some fans and he and Myketyk became involved. Myketyk, in the players box at the time, placed a shiner on Bergeron

who clashed later with Bloomer when they returned to the ice and both were given the gate.

Morrow also got into a snarl when he slugged a policeman trying to help Bergeron. Myketyk was given a minor for roughing.

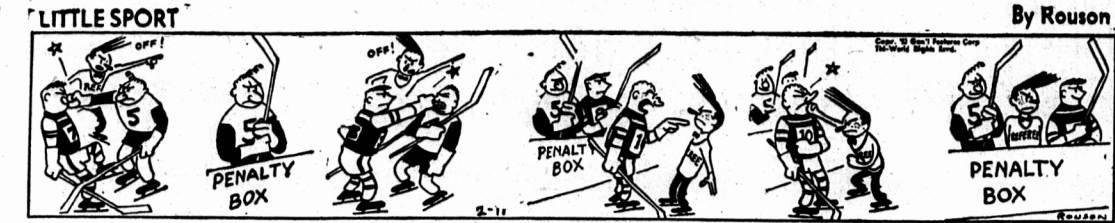

Moncton Keeps Playoff Hopes Alive With 5-3 Victory Over Islanders

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 10 (CP)—Moncton Hawks kept alive their hopes of reaching the Maritime Major Hockey League playoffs Saturday night by defeating Charlottetown Islanders 5-3.

A crowd of 2,600, far short of the 5,000 goal set by team officials as the required number to keep the team in the league, witnessed two rousing periods of hockey which saw Hawks outscore and outplay their rivals.

Officials of the team announced late today after a lengthy meeting that the team would carry on despite the fact that it had lost \$10,000 during the past six weeks. They said they were encouraged by attendance at Saturday night's game despite a heavy snowstorm which kept away many fans from outside points.

Hawks left tonight by train for Sydney where they will meet Millionaires tomorrow night. Islanders ran up a two-goal lead in the first period due to loose play by Hawks' defence. Hawks held an edge in territory but their repeated sallies against the Charlottetown net were foiled by erratic shooting. They tied the count in the second only to see Islanders go ahead at the nine-minute mark.

The final period was all Moncton's. Hawk forwards roamed deep into Charlottetown territory and rammed in two goals before the half-way mark. Six seconds of play remained when they got their final tally.

Fleet-footed George Scholes paced the Hawk attack with a pair of goals. Other scorers were Marcel Clements, Sam Kennedy and

Materialism Seen Rotary's Top foe

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—Materialism is the chief enemy of Rotary, Arthur Mortimer of London, past Rotary International vice-president for Great Britain and Ireland, told members of the Montreal Rotary Club Friday.

The problem today, he said, is not just an iron curtain that separates country from country but steel selfishness that separates man from man and all humans from the Government of God.

Said Mr. Mortimer: "Our scientists have discovered the way to split the atom; now we must learn to unite humanity. The ideas and aims of Rotary are a great aid in this connection, but too many people today are looking to their personal security instead of looking for opportunity—they appear to be more afraid of life than of death."

The answer to all living is to be found in the Golden Rule, the speaker said, and Rotary has not discovered it—merely restated it in the language of today. In discussing Rotary, he said that any organization that draws men together in fellowship, friendship, and service will live as long as it continues to serve the community.

SDU Comes From Behind To Defeat Mt. A. 47-43 In Thrilling Basketball Game

The Saint Dunstan's University basketball five climaxed a game-long uphill struggle with a brilliant last quarter display Saturday night to come from behind to defeat the Mount Allison University quintet 47-43 in a thrilling hoop game at the S.D.U. gymnasium.

The Saints won the game in the last five minutes after trailing their opponents from the opening stages of the contest in one of the most exciting basketball games played on a local court in years.

The Saints went into 2-0 lead seconds after the contest started and it proved to be the last time they led until the last quarter. At half time the Mounties led 20-15 and at the end of the third quarter mark the visitors were leading 33-31.

Shortly after the fourth quarter opened the Mounties increased their lead to 35-31. Then Jack Reardon of the Saints scored two quick baskets and for the first time since the game opened the two teams were tied.

Baxter of the visitors put the team ahead 37-35 with a shot from close to the basket and seconds later Pete Dunphy evened matters again with a shot off the backboard. But the Mounties were not to be outdone and Trafford scored back with a corner shot to send the Mounties out front 39-37.

Again it was Jack Reardon, hitting his stride in the last quarter when he put the Saints up on even terms with a one-hand basket. A short time later Cy MacIsaac sank a foul shot to put the Saints ahead 40-39 and from then on they never looked back.

Dave Kennedy made it 42-39 with a two hand set shot from well out. The Mounties fired two foul shots and the Saints one to make it 43-41 and then Reardon scored two baskets to put the game on ice. Mills on a one hand key-hole shot scored the last basket of the game to make the final score 47-43.

Reardon scored 21 points, 11 of them in the last quarter, to lead the Saints to victory. Pete Dunphy was runner-up for the Saints with nine while Dave Kennedy was third with five.

H. Baxter was the visitors' leading point getter with 11. F. Mills and T. Trafford both scored eight.

The win was the Saints third in the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Islander Intercollegiate Basketball series against one loss. The Mounties have a 500 average in two games played.

Pete Dunphy scored the first basket of the game only to see Baxter neutralize his efforts seconds later. At the end of the first quarter the Mounties were leading 13-7.

Western Powers To Quit Wrangling On Rifle Question

LISBON, Portugal, Feb. 10 (AP)—Gen. Omar Bradley said Saturday the Western Powers have agreed to stop wrangling over what rifle should be standard in the N.A.T.O. armies "until a better gun comes along."

Until then, he said, it was agreed the forces of the member countries will use the rifles they have now.

Chairman of the U. S. joint chiefs of staff, Bradley arrived here with American, British, French, Canadian and Belgian officers to get ready for the opening Monday of a meeting of military committee of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The military committee is composed of the chiefs of staff of 11 Atlantic allies and a civilian representative from a 12th, Iceland, which has no army.

The announcement of agreement brought a nod of assent from Canada's chief of staff, Lt.-Gen. Charles Foulkes, who is chairman of the N. A. T. O. military committee. It also tended to go on using the old British 303 calibre rifle which took with them.

Nearly all military men favor a standard rifle for all the Allied troops. It would simplify production and supply problems and would knit co-operating armies of the various member states closer together in combat. But some experts feel that selection of a single new rifle may take some years.

of them will show enough to merit continued attention and schooling.

Col. Oland, the man behind Halifax St. Mary's has his own plan. It is understood that he may propose to the towns in the Maritime League that next year, it be made a league rule that each team must carry at least three home-bred players. Col. Oland put this idea into words while speaking on the radio from Halifax recently. Hockey followers in Charlottetown who heard him gave the plan an immediate O.K., especially the members of the Islanders Executive. Previous to the Colonel's radio statement the Executive had been talking along the same lines and about their plans to scout the whole Province for talent.

Saves Horse From Drowning

The accident occurred recently when the horse and sleigh owned by Mr. William Smallwood of Bunbury, and driven by Mr. Wood were proceeding along the shoreline of the river near the Government Garage during their regular morning milk run. Without warning the ice suddenly gave way under the horse's weight and sent him crashing through, lodging his head and neck under a sheet of ice 14 inches thick. Unhappily Mr. Wood leaped into the water beside the beast and managed to dislodge it's head. With the aid of several men from the Government Garage and the Fertilizer Factory they secured a rope around the horse's neck and hauled him to the shore.

The horse sustained severe injuries to its mouth, the upper teeth having been driven through the lower lip as a result of the impact. Mr. Wood was unharmed.
