

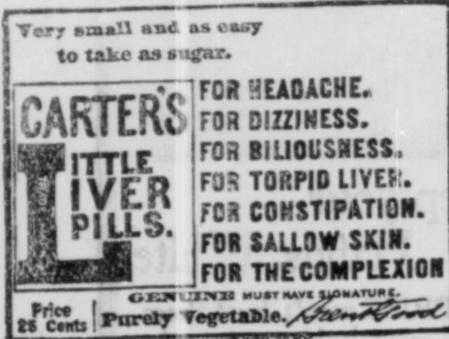

THE MARCH TO RUIN.

The way in which the "business is business" idea runs through the comment of the Liberal press on recent unpleasant events is not a promising sign for the Government. It seems to be the accepted doctrine that when the party is in power the hangers-on should make something, and no one is squeamish about the methods. One man makes a demand for a slice out of the price of a coal contract. Another sells the Government a railroad, another gets a dredging contract without tenders, which he sublets to some one else who can do the work. Another is favored with gold-seeking privileges, which he sells at a good profit. Another is let in on the inside in an army hay purchase. Another sells the soldier's ground biscuit rations at \$2 a pound. And so on through almost every department of the whole administration. None of the beneficiaries are men of weight; some of them are hardly known in their localities till the success of their pull draws unfavorable attention to them. But whoever they are, or whatever they are, when light is thrown on their doings, the party rallies to their support as if to assail them were to lay the axe at the root of the tree of Liberalism. The emergency ration white washing is the latest case in point, but it is only one. Common sense is outraged and public intelligence offended by attempts to show that everything is all right when it is plain that everything is all wrong. But Liberal journals and Liberal politicians cannot see this, and so they pursue a course that brings their whole party into the mess and makes it appear that the first duty of a government and all who believe in its principles is to protect the black sheep of its following from the punishment their offences merit. The end of such folly is disaster, as it should be; but there is evidently no one in authority in the party who both sees and has strength to point out and stop it. The march to ruin will go on. Montreal Gazette.

CAUSES OF THE LONG SESSION.

In the course of his last Ottawa letter Mr. S. D. Scott remarked that after five months Mr. Mulock had introduced his bill for adjusting labor disputes, which he declared to be one of the most important events of his life. About the same time Mr. Fielding brings down a series of estimates asking for seven and a half million dollars.

To go back a little we find that the first estimates which are usually down within a few days of the opening were not ready for weeks. Mr. Fielding's budget speech did not come until seven weeks after the opening. The house has been in session four months before the supplementary estimates for the year then closing made their appearance. No obstruction from opposition. As to obstruction, the opposition made no debate on the address, and were even attacked by the ministers for allowing it to go through with so little objection. The budget debate was long, but for the first time probably in the history of the country there were more speeches on the Government side than on the opposition. We have had amendments to supply, but the first one moved was brought in by Mr. Russell, on the Government side, for the purpose of glorifying Mr. Fielding and killing time. Much the larger part of the debate was on government side and in all subsequent discussions the supporters of the government have done at least their full share of the talking. In the face of this it was charged no longer ago than Friday night that the opposition was making delay. Yet here is the record for that day and the three preceding, given in Hansard column, adjusting the broken counts of conversation as fairly as possible:

THE NEW HAVEN MEETING.

MR. EDITOR.—The report of the New Haven meeting published in the Patriot is both untruthful and misleading, notwithstanding its silly head lines. New Haven did not speak decidedly in favor of Dr. Douglas. After reciting the Grit speakers the Patriot adds Messrs. William Campbell, P. McCourt, A. C. Shaw on the Conservative side. The latter, needless to say did not get a hearing. I pronounce this statement a deliberate falsehood as every one at that meeting knows I was called on by the electors and did not want to speak as it was late. Mr. Cyrus Crosby then got up to speak, but the meeting continued calling for me and Mr. Crosby was not allowed to speak until I was first heard and I may say the respectable people of New Haven of both parties always gave me a good hearing at its meetings. D. Farquharson's hoodlums from Long Creek and other sections, who attend from meeting to meeting to bowl Conservative speakers, were there headed by a person from the Registry office who was busy distributing whiskey outside and at the door in order to make trouble as on former occasions. On my going on the platform Squally Jack, junior, and four or five others set up a squeak or two near the door, but the respectable electors of New Haven would have none of it, and so Farquharson's hoodlum turned to attend again to distributing whiskey.

I then spoke at the meeting; the respectable electors listened attentively and I

reminded them of Farquharson's false statements about one and a half millions being offered for our claims, his broken promises, publicly made which I now say are as numerous as the frogs in the plague in Egypt and stinking in the land.

The farmers in the second district will show on the 11th that flooding the district with whiskey, jobbery on roads, corrupt acts will not influence the electors. They will help to save the province from an enormous debt and return an honest farmer at the head of the poll with a big majority. His name—Honest Joseph Wise.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

"No regiment in the army," writes the *Observer*, "has had harder work, or has killed more men, or more fighting" than the First Canadian Contingent. They have so gloriously upheld the Canadian name, that Britain will never again hesitate to accept an offer of Canadian troops in time of trouble.

Events (Ottawa), an independent journal with strong Liberal leanings says: "Mr. Tarte talked too much and too recklessly. His conduct in Paris, where he should never have been sent, has been such as to intensify the feelings of resentment which he raised by his course on the sending of the contingent to South Africa. He has never been recognized by the old Liberals as a good Liberal and his appointment was resented by them from the very hour when it was announced. The appointment of Mr. Bernier succeeded Sir Henry Joly in the ministry lends color to the rumored retirement of Mr. Tarte. It is no secret that Mr. Bernier was long ago spoken of for cabinet honors but that he refused to serve in a ministry of which Mr. Tarte was a member. Either one of two things must, therefore, have taken place. Either Mr. Bernier has changed his mind, or Mr. Tarte is going out. Which one it is will be known shortly no doubt. As for Mr. Sifton, whether he is retired from the ministry or remains, it is the something with him—he is politically dead and all there is now to be done is to bury him. If his leader does not do so for the good of the party, it is certain that the people of Manitoba will when the chance comes their way. Months ago, I said that if the Liberals hoped to win at the next election there would have to be a reorganization of the cabinet, with Sifton and Tarte left out."

A correspondent of the London Outlook of June 7 says that he does not take much stock in the popular talk of the decadence of France. He writes: "Let me describe the splendid fete of the Union of the Gymnastic Societies of France. This is the twenty sixth of the annual series, and it was held in the Annex of the Exposition at Vincennes. Over eight thousand young athletes from every part of France were in attendance; and in one of the finest numbers of the programme—the exhibition of physical drill—over three thousand members took part simultaneously. Except in the two florid manifestations of architecture, in which a distinct falling off of taste is to be perceived, and also to some extent in the kindred art, there is no decadence. On the contrary, there are signs of a great revival such as France has shown time after time after misfortunes which would have crushed any other nation. The best educated nation in Europe, the attention of the rising generation is directed to physical development in a degree which is actually causing concern among those who most cordially welcomed the growing interest in sports evinced by the foundation in every quarter of football, cricket, boxing, boating and kindred clubs. The fear, indeed, is that the pendulum may swing too far, and that in the eagerness to discover and practice the secret of the 'superiority of the Anglo-Saxon,' the same excessive devotion to attainments which excellent in themselves, have been elevated to a ridiculous prominence in our own country, may be developed to the deterioration of higher and more essential qualifications. Excessus in rebus. But this is a hard saying. Meanwhile the youthhood of France stands for sobriety and physical vigor, and the nation will reap the reward."

United States and China.

BERLIN, July 5.—An important despatch from Washington has been received at the American embassy. It is understood that the despatch clearly outlines the entire present China policy of the United States. The main features of the programme are the restoring of order in China, the obtaining of full damage for the straits and the loss of life among American citizens and missionaries residing in China, and the promising of a corresponding share of military aid wherever American interests require it. Under no condition, however, will the United States become a party to the division of China or to territorial conquests.
