AT TAXATION PROBE

Sydney Brief Makes Plea For Federal School Aid

BY STEWART MACLEOD HALIFAX (CP)—In one sitting Thursday, the royal commission on taxation examined the field of education, gambling, stum-clearance, the all the varied forms of the catering capabilities of non-commercial organizations.

Since owners of more valuable homes would have a greater saving than owners of other homes, this would encourage a property improvement, decrease demand for slums, result in more employment in the construction industry, and increasing municipal taxes.

C.T. Fisher Of Auto Fame Dies In U.S.

DETROIT (CP)—Charles T. Fisher, 83, second-oldest of the seven Fisher brothers of Automobile fame, died Thursday in Detroit's Harbor Hospital.

Mr. Fisher's surviving brothers are William A., Edward F., and Alfred L., all of Detroit.

Charles Fisher was born at Sandusky, Ohio, but the family moved shortly after his birth to Norwalk, O., where the father and an uncle, Albert, owned and operated a blacksmith shop.

Later, Charles and his brothers worked at an automobile factory. It was said the brothers—with the help of their uncle, Albert—started their own auto body business.

Six months after the new company was started, the uncle withdrew, and Fred Fisher became president. Charles, who already held the position of vice-president, was also made secretary of the company.
