## Kell Out In Front In American League

**CHICAGO, June 19**—(AP)—Detroit's George Kell has taken a commanding 18-point lead in the American League batting race with a .384 mark, while runner-up Walt Dropo of Boston has slumped 13 points to .366.

Kell, climbing three points during the last week, replaced Cleveland's Larry Doby in the No. 1 spot. Doby is in fourth place with .355.

Official figures computed through Sunday's games put Hoot Evers, Detroit, third ahead of Doby with .359; Al Zarilla, Boston, .337; Johnny Pesky, Boston, .329; Dom DiMaggio, Boston, .325; Ted Williams, Boston, .323; Johnny Ligon, Detroit, .320; and Johnny Groth, Detroit, .320.

Williams, continuing to lead in homers with 20, remains ahead in runs with 57. Williams and his Red Sox team-mate, Vern Stephens, share the lead in runs batted in with 65 each.

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## Dodgers Tied With St. Louis Cardinals For Top Spot In National League



Brooklyn Dodgers moved into a first-place tie with the St. Louis Cardinals of the National Baseball League last (Monday) night by defeating New York Giants 8-5.

Ralph Branca went the distance for the first time this season although tagged for 12 hits.

Jackie Robinson and Carl Furillo led the Dodgers' 10-hit attack against five Giant pitchers with three hits apiece.

In another National League set-to—and it was a set-to—lefty Cliff Chambers became involved in a spectacular "hubcap" with Boston first baseman Earl Torgerson while hurling Pittsburgh Pirates to a 1-0 shutout over the Braves in the replay of yesterday's second game 9-9 tie.

Torgy rushed Chambers in the third inning after being grounded by a close pitch but they were separated by the umpires and players before a blow could be exchanged.

Torgerson was ejected from the game, along with infielder Gene Mauch, who had rushed off the Boston bench.

Chambers had hit Torgy on the back with a pitched ball during the first inning of yesterday's deadlock.

Before being credited with his seventh triumph and the Pirates' fourth in their last 24 starts, Chambers pulled himself out of a deep hole in the second inning when, with two out, the Braves filled the bases on singles by Walker Cooper and Sibby Sisti and a base on balls to Buddy Kerr.

Cincinnati at Philadelphia was rained out.

Marvin Rickert's second American League home run this season opened the second half of the 11th inning and gave Chicago White Sox a 4-3 victory over Washington Senators before 7,638 persons.

The same four ran in the same order a week ago but Musial then sported a 37-point edge.

Sam Jethroe, Boston's rookie outfielder is making himself heard in the individual departments. Jethroe is tops with 49 runs and way out front with 13 stolen bases.

## Fish And Game Ass'n. Meeting Held At Pownal

A well attended and enthusiastic meeting of the Queen's County Branch of the P. E. I. Fish and Game Protection Association was held in Pownal Hall recently. The meeting was arranged by Mr. Harold Smith, Vice President of the branch, and between forty and fifty persons were present.

Motion pictures showing the release of game birds on the Island were shown as the opening feature of the meeting.

President Harold Shaw presided over the business meeting which followed. The meeting was held for the purpose of giving the people of the district an opportunity to learn of the work of the Association and of its reorganization.

President Shaw outlined the aims of the Queen's County Branch after which Mr. F. A. S. Jones, Provincial President of the Association, spoke to the meeting. Mr. Jones urged everyone to take an interest in fish and game work so that membership in the Association would be widespread throughout the Province.

Mr. J. A. Rodd, Provincial Director of Fisheries in the Department of Natural Resources, spoke on the good work which is being accomplished by Fish and Game Associations throughout the Country, and commended the idea of County Branches of the P. E. I. He emphasized the value of having practical advice available to his Department from the Association.

Mr. Harry Webster, Maritime Wildlife Officer, described the advantages to the Province in having proper organization. He discussed the matter of seasons, closings, hours, etc. Considerable discussion followed, during which several members pressed for a change in the regulation to permit shooting one hour after sunset.

Mr. Webster explained that the half-hour regulation was for the purpose of conservation as many birds are shot at sundown and never recovered.

President Shaw told the meeting that the Queen's County Branch is pressing for development this year of three ponds for public fishing.

The meeting discussed the damage done by foxes, skunks, and crows, and a resolution was adopted calling for the bounty on skunks to be left on throughout the year.

Following the showing of further Island films, the meeting closed after thanking Mr. Eddie Acoron for his courtesy in showing the pictures.

## 54 Craft In Race-To Bermuda

**NEWPORT, R. I., June 19**—(AP)—Favored by the finest kind of weather conditions, a record fleet of 54 small but seaworthy sailing craft got away today on the 17th 235-mile open-ocean race to Bermuda.

A brisk westerly wind piped up to better than 12 knots to send the windjammers off on their long southeasterly course.

The contestants sailed in three divisions, for east in starting Class 'A' wheeled over the starting line with the grace and precision of a ballet team. In class 'A' were the largest vessels in the fleet, carrying the heaviest handicaps.

About four days are required for the fastest to reach their destination.

## Montreal Fight Winner To Get Shot At Title

**MONTREAL, June 19**—(CP)—The winner of the Laurent Dauthuille-Tuzo Portuguese fight here tomorrow night will get a shot at the world's middleweight title, promoter Raoul Godbout said here today.

The Montreal promoter said that a championship fight was "99 per cent certain" to be staged in Montreal this summer.

Dauthuille of France, who registered a victory over Jake LaMotta last summer before he captured the middleweight crown, takes on Portuguese here in a 10-rounder that will pave the way for the winner to move into top challenging ranks for the world title.

The Frenchman was considered by the International Boxing Club of the United States as an opponent for Jake LaMotta, June 28 at New York. LaMotta was originally scheduled to fight Rocky Graziano for the title, but the bout was called off, after Graziano suffered a fractured thumb. The I. B. C. named Tiberio Mitri of Italy as a replacement and postponed the battles until July 12.

Godbout said today that he had "Positive assurance" from the National Boxing Association that a world middleweight championship bout would be staged at Montreal.

## Red Cross Launch Summer Program

The men and women who sponsor the Red Cross swimming and water safety program throughout Prince Edward Island met on Friday at Red Cross Headquarters to formulate plans for this summer's activities.

Representatives were present from sixteen centres in the Province along with members of the Provincial Committee and the Public School Supervisors.

Mrs. E. M. Bagnall, chairman, welcomed the guests and introduced the President of the Society, Mr. R. H. Rogers. Mr. Rogers commended those present for their part in this Red Cross service which is so important in the Island Province.

Miss Iphigene Arsenault, Commissioner, outlined the various Red Cross services and urged that someone in each community act as chairman of the different departments.

Dr. L. W. Shaw, Director of Education, addressed the meeting of the subject of Citizenship. He emphasized the fact that these present at this meeting were there because they accepted responsibility in their community and in this way were demonstrating good citizenship.

Mrs. Bagnall spoke on the national aspect of this program and explained the policy of training instructors. She stated that any community which desires this Red Cross service must be willing to assume the responsibility for local organization.

The Red Cross swimming and water safety program has developed tremendously during the five years it has been in existence. Last year over 1800 candidates were enrolled in regular classes.

Everyone at the meeting evidenced satisfaction with the work which has been accomplished and expressed a keen desire to make this essential education available to all.

Plans were discussed for the instructors school which will commence on Wednesday, June 21, at Brighton Beach, Charlottetown.

The announcement was made last night at a special meeting held at the Legion Hall by the special committee appointed last week to conduct the canvass, and attended by the divisional commanders and team captains who will carry out the drive. The meeting was presided over by the committee chairman, Major T. B. Rogers.

The committee also announced that the canvass will be under the distinguished patronage of His Honor Lt. Governor J. A. Bernard, Hon. Premier J. Walter Jones and His Worship Mayor B. Earle MacDonald.

Mr. Wendell H. Beaton was appointed Campaign Chairman, who will preside over some 30 teams that will launch the campaign today.

The following are the Divisional Commanders appointed and the districts that they will canvass:— Ward 1, James Power; Ward 2, Leo P. Callaghan; Ward 3, Harold Hennessey; Ward 4, William Boyles; Ward 5, Forbes Kennedy; Parkdale Area, E. D. Reid.

Addressing the meeting last night, Major Rogers stressed the point that no money is to be given to or accepted by the canvasser, but that it is only a survey in which all interested citizens are asked to pledge their support by signing the form which will be presented by the canvasser. "If the support in the City is sufficient to warrant the continuance of the drive," he stated, "then it will be extended to take in the whole Province."

The first report on the canvass will be made on Wednesday night at eight o'clock at the Legion Hall, when all divisional commanders, team captains and team members are asked to attend the meeting and make their reports.
