Survey Results Made Known In Commons

OTTAWA, May 13 (CP)—Extensive reorganization, expansion and improvement of New Brunswick's health and welfare services have been recommended by a committee which surveyed the province's health and hospital needs.

The committee's 160,000-word report tabled today in the commons by Health Minister Martin, outlined the province's deficiencies in medical, nursing and allied personnel. It cited the need for more hospital beds and laboratory facilities.

The deficiencies, said the report should be considered before attempt to establish a compulsory health-insurance program.

The product of two years' work, the report contained a lengthy series of recommendations. They included suggestions for reorganization of the Department of Health and Social Services; the development of public health and laboratory services; the provision of adequate numbers of hospital beds; the use of medical manpower; the training of nurses and nurses' aides; and the extension of dental services.

Other recommendations dealt with programs for the control and treatment of tuberculosis, venereal diseases, mental health, blindness, and cancer. Also urged were the

Tough U. S. General Takes Over Prison Camp

SEOUL, Korea, May 14 (Wednesday)—(AP)—A tough United States combat general who is also an old China hand Tuesday took command of tense Koje Island where Communist prisoners seized the prison boss last week.

Chinese-speaking Brig.-Gen. Hayden L. Boatner, assistant commander of the U. S. 2nd Infantry Division, flew to Koje within hours after his appointment.

He relieved Brig.-Gen. Charles E. Colson, appointed temporarily Thursday—a day after die-hard North Korean prisoners seized Brig.-Gen. Francis T. Dodd, released unharmed Saturday night after Colson had granted concessions to the Reds, was reassigned to U. S. Eighth Army headquarters. Colson went back to his old job as chief of staff to the 1st Corps in Korea.

The wording of Colson's concessions was criticized sharply by the U. S. Defence Department in Washington. A spokesman said it gave an erroneous impression of Allied treatment of Chinese and North Korean prisoners.

The new commander of the rocky island is a professional soldier who served in various posts with the Chinese Nationalists during the Second World War.

Kremlin Must Agree on Free German Elections

LONDON, May 14 (Wednesday)—(AP)—Britain, United States and France told Russia today they will join four-power talks on unifying Germany if the Kremlin first agrees to free all German elections.

Further, the western allies rejected the Soviet suggestions of a neutralized Germany linked with neither east nor west.

In almost identical notes, the western allies also asserted any all-German government must really be free—even before a peace treaty is signed.

The 1,750-word replies were delivered in Moscow Tuesday. The aim was to kill off any Russian attempt to pose as the principal champion of German unity.

The western allies said they are ready to begin negotiations "as soon as it is clearly apparent that it is also the intention of the Soviet Government to avoid the fruitless discussions of the past."

Plan Disposal Of Surplus Cattle From Sask. Farms

OTTAWA, May 13 (CP)—The Federal Government is setting up an arrangement for disposing of surplus Saskatchewan cattle blocked from markets by embargoes, Agriculture Minister Gardiner announced today in the Commons.

He disclosed a tentative plan whereby the government will take over cattle which farmers must sell but cannot market elsewhere. Those that could not be slaughtered at once would be put out on government pastureland in the province.

Mr. Gardiner said A. M. Shaw, chairman of the Agricultural Prices Support Board and Robert McCubbin, his parliamentary assistant, are going to Saskatchewan to set up the organization.

He expressed the view that it can "take care of the situation" and that there will be no eventual loss to the Federal Treasury through paying flood prices for the unsalable animals.

Because of embargoes stemming from the outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease, a heavy surplus has been piling up in Saskatchewan. The three-way barter deal for disposal of surplus beef to Britain, announced Friday, is expected to be of chief benefit to Alberta and Manitoba.

OTTAWA, May 13 (CP)—Justice Minister Garson today said Canada's Criminal Code will be cut down by one-third and clarified by bulky amendments placed before parliament.

He said in explaining the changes at second-reading stage in the senate that none of the broad principles of criminal law are touched. Most of the recommendations of a commission on the code were incorporated in the amendments.

However, the amendments do not eliminate minimum sentences for certain crimes as the commission suggested in its report, tabled earlier in the commons and senate.

The minimum sentence of seven days for drunk driving is retained. The jail term is mandatory on conviction. The minimum sentence of \$50 or a jail term for driving while ability is impaired by alcohol also remains. The government felt they were a deterrent to these crimes.

Koje Incident Dealt Blow To U. S. Prestige

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—United States officials have decided to treat the kidnapping of a U. S. general by Communists prisoners on Koje Island as a Red move to regain lost propaganda ground.

The view is that the Korean and Chinese enemy sorely felt the need of something to offset the stated determination of 100,000 of their captives not to go back behind the Iron Curtain.

While conceding that the incident has been damaging to the West, policy-making officials figure it won't have much real effect on the issue of a truce in Korea.
