

Goodwill Race Meet Away To Fine Start

Keen Competition In Free-For-All Pace Is Feature Of Afternoon

Three heat winners in the Free For All Pace featured the opening day of the Goodwill Races yesterday afternoon at the Provincial Exhibition Grounds. There were nine dashes in the opening day's card that was run off in fast time before a crowd of about 1,000 people.

Lock Hanover, A. G. Scott and Argot Pointer were the heat winners in the featured Free For All with the horses winning their dashes in the above mentioned order.

In the first heat A. G. Scott took over the lead from Lock Hanover as they passed under the wire the first time around. As the field moved up the backstretch the horses went to their drives but it was not until the seventh-eighth pole that Lock went to front. Argot Pointer and Miss Knox both came roaring down the stretch to challenge the front horses and in the blanketed finish the Hanover horse edged out the Pointer with Miss Knox third and the Scott stallion a foot behind for fourth place in the field of five. Billy McVey was fifth all the way.

Charlie Willis piloted Louis MacPhee's Joandale to a straight heat win in the first division of the Classified Trot, winning both heats rather handily. In the first dash of the race Winnie's Last waged a terrific duel with the black mare right down the stretch with Blaze Dillon third and Miss Judy Dale fourth. The remainder of the field was strung out behind the first four trotters.

The second heat was a repetition of the first in that Joandale had too much trot in her for the other nine trotters. Miss Judy Dale moved up two positions from the first heat to challenge the winner with Blaze Dillon again third and Winnie's Last fourth. Prince Marine finished the mile in second place but was set back four positions to sixth place for performing at a mixed gallop.

In the first heat of the first division of the 2:25-2:27 Pace, P. E. I. Budlong showed the way home in front of Bessie Budlong and Miss Playfair. But the Hankinson-owned horse was set back to fifth for interference on the upper turn and Bessie Budlong was placed first. Miss Playfair was second and Mary T. Clegg third with Just Brenda fourth and the Budlong horse being placed fifth. In the second heat of the race driver "Rook" McCallum made no mistake as he overtook Bessie Budlong halfway down the stretch to win by a length with Yankee Dale third and Mary T. Clegg fourth.

Lusticia made every post a winning one in both heats of the second division of the Classified Trot to win in straight heat. She headed Col. Dan MacKinnon's Baron in both heats with Bonnie Dale third in each dash.

The second heat of the fast class saw A. G. Scott win the heat in another close finish by heading Argot Pointer who again was second, and Lock Ha ver who finished third. Miss Knox and Billy McVey placed fourth and fifth respectively. The first heat was in 2:10 3-5 with the second dash in 2:09 4-5.

It was the third heat of the race that brought the crowd to its feet with mad cheering as Argot Pointer and A. G. Scott waged a terrific duel all the way around with Horace Willis' game little pacer winning by a foot from the big black stallion from the Lorne Letcher stable.

As the field went into the first turn Lock Hanover was in front but as they went up the backstretch Argot Pointer showed to the fore. The second time around the horses all started to move with A. G. Scott taking to the outside of the Pointer and both Miss

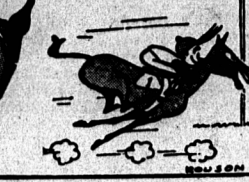

The fifth and ninth heats saw a nine horse field wage terrific battles all the way around the racing dirt before a winner was declared. At that there were two heat winners. In the first heat Daisy Budlong edged out Belle Budlong 2:17 3-5 with Ramona Peters third and Random Harvest fourth. However Belle Budlong reversed the positions in the second dash when she headed Daisy home. Random Harvest moved up to third and Ramona Peters dropped back one position to fourth.

"Iron Man" Newcombe Pitches 16 Innings As Dodgers Win Twin Bill

Canada's Press Staff Writer The tension-ridden pennant races produced their expected share of thrills Wednesday night, with the top-dog Philadelphia Phillies in the National League dropping a doubleheader to Brooklyn Dodgers—for which "Iron Man" Don Newcombe was largely responsible—and Detroit Tigers outlasting the Cleveland Indians for a 5-3 victory, which put them only a half-game behind the New York Yankees.

The Tigers tucked their game away with a big four-run seventh inning as they won the opener of the important two-game series before \$2,555 fans.

Hal Newhouser scattered eight Cleveland hits as he won his 13th game. His mates had plenty of trouble getting to Early Wynn, who kept pitching himself out of tight spots until the seventh. Detroit left 10 men on base during the game.

The Yankees dropped an 11-2 decision to the Boston Red Sox, with lefty Mel Parnell fanning the Boston pennant hopes into a brisk blaze. Junior Stephens powered a 16-hit Red Sox attack with four safeties to down the League leaders.

In the National League top-liner, a thrilling two-out ninth-inning uprising gave the Dodgers all their second-game runs for a brilliant 3-2 victory and a sweep of the doubleheader with the Phillies.

Newcombe pitched a 2-0 shut-out in the opener and hurled the first seven innings of the nightcap as the Dodgers burst back into the pennant race, cutting the front-running Phils' margin to 1-3 games.
