MacRae hails fair showcase

One of the advantages of the provincial livestock show, held in conjunction with Old Home Week festivities, is that it affords breeders an excellent opportunity to exhibit and advertise their livestock, according to Agricultural Minister Andrew MacRae.

Already the number of livestock entries for this year's show is as high as last year and Exhibition Association president Allison Profit expects "the greatest fair the Island has ever known."

Mr. Profit noted that the excellent seasonal weather had brought Old Home Week "just in between having and harvesting. This means that farmers will more easily be able to leave their farms to show animals in the fair or simply come in to see the judging. The exhibi-

tion directors are expecting the greatest attendance on record this year."

Mr. MacRae noted that it takes "considerable time" to prepare animals for showing at the fair. "Possibly as far back as nine months, breeders began to ready their livestock for showing, with extra feeding and fitting," he said.

He pointed out that the livestock show draws many viewers, aside from farm people. "It is quite noticeable how many tourists can be seen viewing the animals in the barns," he said.

The minister said "the livestock show is an holiday for farmers but show business and exhibiting gets in the blood." He noted that while prize money has not increased greatly through the years, the costs to the exhibitors have been rising.

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Everybody loves a show; everybody loves to laugh; and almost everyone enjoys the vicarious thrill afforded by watching top grade balancing acts where a single slip can bring injury or even death.

Vaudeville may have been said to be dying out so far as having its old home. The Palace Theatre in New York, gone from the scene. But individual acts will never lose popularity.

Annually Old Home Week brings together a group of the top acts available in vaudeville today. They come from everywhere because show business is the only true international enterprise.

On stage at the Coliseum this week fatigues will see one of the finest entertainment programs the show directors have ever been able to gather.

THRILLS, THRILLS

And differing from other years, the 1963 editions of the vaudeville section of the fair will feature thrills and more thrills. Incredible feats of balancing which alone would draw gasps, but combined with daring juggling and darting movements become truly sensational.

Naturally these acts are sugar-coated. And just as naturally that sugar-coating is supplied by feminine beauty of face and form. This year there will be no lack of leaping on the entertainment stage.

The real problem the show director will have this year is in trying to decide which of the acts to feature.

However, it will make little difference in which order the acts appear on the stage; they will all be good. So good, in fact, there is a slight suspicion that

each may be just a bit better than the other as contradictory as that may sound.

Anyway, a gorgeous bit of feminine pulchritude is going to show everything from one-hand balancing while throwing bricks with the other to wind up her act with a split ordinarily reserved for only acrobatic dancers.

The lovely Astrid is reported to be one of the best in the business as well as being one of the most attractive.

But she is only one of the acts that combine beauty and talent.

TIGHT WIRE

More daring acrobatics are in store when Roland and Janice do fantastic things on a tight wire. Riding a unicycle is an art in itself, but doing it on a tight wire seems to be courting disaster with willing arms.

But Roland and Janice do it with a grin while improbably indulging their fancy with some fancy juggling en route, or some more than tricky hoop whirling. Incidentally they don't bother with riding parrots or balancing poles as they depend entirely on their own sense of balance.

But there will be other acts, if not of the death-defying variety of the danger-courting variety. Among them will be Les Verduis, a company of five guaranteeing to thrill you, and The Baddletons, a pair of startling performers.

Of course no show would be really complete without an animal act of some kind to please the kiddies and this year there is one to make them happy.

Bill Stone and his dogs are certain to delight every youngster in the Coliseum and you don't have to be under 16 to enjoy that performance.
