Her husband, driver of one of the cars, suffered severe injuries, and their son, nine-year-old Rene, is in critical condition in hospital here with undetermined injuries. The six occupants of the second car, driven by Desire Dube, were slightly injured.

Oyster Bed Bridge Annual Meeting Of Northumberland Ferries Saturday

All officers of the Northumberland Ferries Ltd., were re-elected at the annual meeting held here Saturday afternoon. The main decision reached by the directors was to still hold possession of the ship "Brigadier General Absalom Baird" which the company purchased last year. It was intended to convert the ship of United States registry to handle the type of traffic encountered on the Wood Islands-Caribou run, but this plan met with opposition from the Federal Maritime Commission. However, the ship was retained by the company and this year was moved from her Halifax base to Sydney, Cape Breton. The company hopes to eventually obtain Federal permission to operate it in order to take care of the ever expanding volume of traffic. Officers of the company are: Mr. E. New Life For Signs At Trafalgar Square

LONDON, (Reuters)—Four electric signs which nightly transform London's Trafalgar Square into a sea of light got a new, three-year lease on life Saturday, from Housing Minister Harold Macmillan. The ministry had earlier decided to ban the advertising signs because of protests they were spoiling the London scene. It reversed its decision when more protesters came in claiming that, after all these years, the lights had become part of the London scene. They said the square, with its high column to Lord Nelson in the centre, would look as grim and gloomy without its neon as it would without its thousands of starlings and pigeons. London's biggest neon display is Piccadilly Circus—a quarter mile away.

Immigration Officials' Visit

A party of three Canadian immigration officials accompanied by Mr. Vince Chisholm of the Department of Immigration, Halifax, visited the province on Saturday. The three men have been filling posts in Vienna, Austria; Paris, France and London, where they assist in screening and selecting emigrants for this country. As part of the Federal Government training scheme they are visiting all parts of Canada to familiarize themselves with the needs of employers.

Annual Vacation School At Trinity

The annual Vacation School now in progress at Trinity Church has shown increased popularity among parents who have their children enrolled. The school which opened last Monday is conducted by volunteer teachers and is designed to make the Bible more meaningful to the child. Continued from page 1 germs calls forth production of antibodies, which stay around to guard against any invasion later on by live typhoid germs. Since antibodies are specific Dr. Pressman and associates are trying to make them carriers of radioactivity to destroy specific types of cancers. Have Partial Success They've partially succeeded in making antibodies do this in animal experiments. Some mouse cancer tissue is injected into rabbits. The rabbits create antibodies against the cancer cells and antibodies are recovered from the rabbit's blood. Radioactive iodine then is incorporated into the antibodies, which then are injected into the mouse with the cancer. A large amount of the radioactive antibodies go to the cancer, Dr. Pressman reports. The antibodies are not quite pure, so they don't go only to the cancers yet. Further research is under way to purify them and make them missiles only against cancer cells. As for work in crime, "when a criminologist finds a blood-stained towel he can use antibody specificity to determine if the blood is that of a human. The same method has

HALIFAX (Special)—A crowded three-day program of religious ceremonies, business sessions and social events has been drawn up by local alumnae associations for more than 100 delegates from all parts of Canada, including Prince Edward Island, who will meet in this Maritime capital city for the 8th biennial national convention of the Canadian Federation of Convent Alumnae. Representing P.E.I. member alumnae groups to the convention, taking place Wednesday, Aug. 26 to Friday, Aug. 28, will be Mrs. Fred A. Cioyle of Charlottetown, Mrs. Mitchell Macdonald of Charlottetown and Miss Eleanor DesRoches of Miscouche. At the opening luncheon at the Lord Nelson Hotel on Wednesday, guest speaker will be Most Rev. A. B. Leverman, newly-appointed Bishop of Saint John, N. B. The luncheon will follow Pontifical Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral here, to mark the beginning of the convention. The first business session that afternoon will have as special speaker Dr. Karl Stern, professor of psychiatry at the University of Ottawa. Dr. Stern is the Canadian representative to the Board of Governors, UNESCO Institute of Education, and is the author of a best-selling autobiography, "The Pillar of Fire." The Hon.
