

Record Flight Described As The Thrill Of A Lifetime

MONTREAL (CP) — A record-breaking flight from Vancouver to Halifax was certainly to be classed as the thrill of a lifetime.

And the thrill remains with me today as I look back on the five hours and 30 seconds it took Thursday to make the 2,740-mile flight in our Sabre VI jets. We beat the old record by one hour and 13 minutes, made last January by a T-33 jet trainer.

When we first learned that the RCAF's Air Transport Command was going to run a test on rapid trans-Canada deployment of jet aircraft nobody was excited about it. The overseas ferry unit was ordered to send four Sabre VI jet aircraft from our base at nearby St. Hubert. One pair was to attempt it with a single refuelling stop, while the other section was to stop twice. Mid-way stop was at Charlottetown, and the RCAF station at Gimli, Man.

12 MINUTES BEHIND

Flt.-Lt. Ralph Annis of McAdam, N.B., was chosen to lead Operation Rapid Ranger. The other three pilots concerned were: FO Bruce Merklinger of Oakville, Ont.; FO Bernie McCormick of Granby, Que. and myself.

Ranger Alpha section made up of Flt.-Lt. Annis and myself was to take-off first. Alpha was to make only the one stop for fuel. Bravo section, made up of FO McCormick, was to take-off 20 minutes after us. Bravo was to make the additional stop at Montreal for fuel. It was expected that they would be able to fly faster than Alpha section. Fuel on the latter part of the flight would not be a critical factor for them. As it turned out Bravo landed 12 minutes and 30 seconds behind us. Vancouver airport was black and chilly Thursday when we gathered at 5 a.m. PDT for a pre-flight weather briefing.

7:58 a.m. START

We prepared our flight plans and did the necessary filing. Then we climbed into clammy flying suits. Dawn was well advanced by the time our Sabres were packed.

Flt.-Lt. Annis dropped his hand in the signal and we were rolling.

"Vancouver tower, this is Ranger Alpha section, request our terms 'turn-around',"

"Roger. Alpha was off Vancouver at 7:58 a.m. PDT. Good trip."

Twenty minutes after take-off we were viewing the Rocky Mountains from 40,000 feet. Groundspeed 580 miles per hour. The voices on the radio range stations along our route acknowledged our positions reports. Check you by Calgary; by Medicine Hat; by Moose Jaw. Our track lay across the town of Fort Qu'Appelle. We could see it through a haze of high cirrus cloud beneath us.

It took 47 minutes to cross Saskatchewan. North of Manitoba's oil town of Virden, Ralph contacted Gimli control tower. They told us that the weather was good, and that everything was ready for a quick "turn-around." (An aircraft in meaning that an aircraft is refuelled, oxygen tanks filled, guns re-armed and ready to take off).

ORGANIZED FOR SPEED

Sqdn-Ldr. Ken Leung, chief flying instructor at Stettin Gimli is an Sabre jockey himself. Knowing how critical time can be, he had the entire refuelling operation organized for speed. They even handed us a sandwich and a cup of tea as we sat in the cockpit. More of that Western hospitality.

The control tower had been watching our start-up and gave us the green light for take-off. We had a bit of a tailwind. Though we were on a redeployment exercise, we had all thought of 6 hours Canada speed record of 8 hours 13 minutes set by an RCAF Silver Star jet trainer in January. A blip - watcher told us that our ground speed was 620 miles per hour.

NO SWEAT

Can we back that record? The question is in the back of our mind. It hinged mostly on our dwindling fuel reserves. If we arrived over Quebec short of kerosene, our orders were to divert to St. Hubert.

We reached Quebec at the two-hour mark and found alternate aerodromes sprinkling the remainder of our route. There was no sweat. Over Saint John, we should have been able to see most of Nova Scotia. It was under cloud. The top cloud layer started at 18,000 feet; we broke through 20 miles west of Halifax and saw the city. Flt.-Lt. Annis dropped his wheels and I followed him down to the runway. The control tower told us the news:

"Ranger Alpha is down at 58 and 39 seconds past the hour over five hours; elapsed time from Vancouver to Halifax."

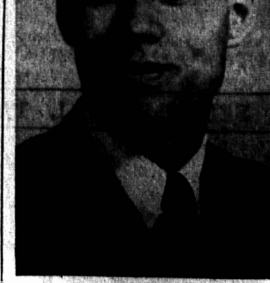

All speakers were critical of the present Government for not implementing election promises and all emphasized the necessity for a strong organization for the future.

Death Yesterday of Mr. P. S. Cobb

The death of Mr. Philip Simmonds Cobb, of the firm of Carvell Brothers, Ltd., occurred yesterday in the P.E.I. Hospital after he was taken following a heart attack. Mr. Cobb, who was in his 63rd year, had been frequently under the necessity of easing up on his business activities due to a heart condition.

Born at Craupaud, P. E. Island, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Cobb, he was educated in the local school and Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown. Mr. Cobb relinquished his position with the Bank of Commerce to accept the position of manager with the Manufacturers and Traders Trust, in Buffalo, N. Y., where he remained for some time until he returned to his native province to join the staff of Carvell Brothers as travelling salesman. Later he was advanced to the position of Sales Manager and became a Director of the organization, remaining as such until his sudden passing.

In his fraternal and social activities Mr. Cobb was a Freemason and a past president of the Charlottetown Club. He was distinguished as a curler in having twice been a member of the team competing in the MacDonald Briar Match. He was a member of Trinity United Church.

Surviving relatives in addition to his wife are one son, Capt. Thomas Drummond Cobb, Royal Canadian Dental Corps, Halifax, a graduate of the faculty of Dentistry, Dalhousie University, two brothers, Frank at Kensington and James in Vancouver. Surviving sisters are: Marquerite (Mrs. Warren Dawson) Ugg, P. E. I., Beulah (Mrs. Nolan) Buffalo, N. Y., and Louise, (Mrs. Trueman Cameron) Denmark, N. S.
