Island Odds And Ends

Desolate appearing and ice-hemmed for long months, the Island's coast-line and off-shore waters will become alive with bustle and hustle this week. Fishermen and factory workers will be putting the finishing touches to their preparations to gather the annual lobster harvest.

The official opening for Kings and Queens counties, and part of Prince, takes place on May 1st, and continues until July 1st. The remainder of Prince County has an open season later in the summer.

From Victoria on the south, eastward through Point Prim, Pinette, Murray Harbor to Scourie, and along the Island's north coast clear through to Tignish, packing plants will hum with life. Hundreds of men and women will be clearing the way for handling the catch of many boats operating in nearby waters.

Almost at the eastern tip of the Province, Mr. Earl Johnson is fitted up for the season at North Lake in one of the most picturesque locations on the Island. The factory faces the gulf, with its back door on North Lake.

At Souris the Eastern Packing Company and the roomy factory run by Mr. Albert Griffin, will look after the catch of many boats from Souris and other areas as well. Messrs Peters and Gallant manage Eastern Packers.

Situated at beautiful Fortune, the Fortune Bay Canning Company whose buildings are familiar to trout fishermen has been readied for the work ahead by Mr. Lester Johnson and staff.

Georgetown has two plants eager for the word; the Southern Packing Company directed by Mr. C. H. Llewellyn and a second under the ownership of William Martell.

At Lower Montague, that veteran packer, who has had considerable employment in the district throughout the summer, Mr. James M. Hewitt is prepared to make steam when the first traps are hauled.

Down Gaspereaux way the enterprising Graham family, a great asset to the community will again be to the forefront. Wendell Graham, whose cannery packs some type of fish from spring until late autumn, is doing business at the old stand. Charlie Graham is carrying on at his neighboring factory.

Johnson Bros., whose base is at Murray Harbor North, have carried out their customary preparations, and their factory hands, Murray Harbor South and Beach Point are showing optimism with the doors opening once more at the premises of the Beach Point Fishermen's Co-op., at Keelung and McKays, T.H. Frasers and at the plant of Mr. Hedley Penny. Messrs Geldert and McVarish, owners of the St. Peters Harbor Packing Co., and Mr. Lloyd Cox of Morell are alert, waiting the deadline of the North Shore. Mr. Cox is also well-known as a merchant. A little further east, William Glover, head man for the Savage Harbor Packing Co. has that energetic centre primed for the curtain-raiser.

Rustico, one of the Island's biggest fishing centres, a greatly improved locality in recent years, has scores of boats and practically its entire population is waiting for the day. Here the Rustico Fishermen's Co-operative and the North Rustico Packing Co., both modern and well-staffed, will buy and pack many cases of lobsters.

Malpeque, which gave its name to the world famous oysters, has its lobsters. There the Shore Packing Company will do business this year managed by Mr. Bearisto, and a second plant is ready for operations owned by Mr. Russel Champion. Another packer in the same general area is John E. Cousins, whose family have been connected with canning lobsters for many years.

Two companies known to the trade everywhere are standing by for the signal at Alberton; the Alberton Fishermen's Co-op. and the Alberton Fishermen's Union. The latter is managed by capable "Jack" Matthews.

Rivalling Rustico in manpower and number of boats is Tignish which boasts two large canneries with the capacity to take care of thousands of cases of lobsters and other fish. These are, the Tignish Fishermen's Co-op. and the firm of Myrick and McIntosh, the latter very well-known in lobster-packing circles.

May 1st should be given recognition as one of the Island's most cheerful days. On this long looked for date hundreds of men and women throughout our province, long-denied steady employment by the handicaps of winter, return to work. It's quite a day, for everybody, the butcher, baker and all the rest.

Even though we were on the outer-edges of the convulsive upheaval of the area, we still get a ripple of its after effects here in our quiet province. We have several doctors in our province from among the uprooted populations of Europe and one from remote China. Two of these medical men are attached to the Provincial Sanatorium, Dr. Rosol, formerly of Poland, and Dr. Yue, a Chinese graduate of a Chinese university. Dr. Yue came here from British Columbia where he obtained considerable experience in Canadian
