Insurance Agreement Signed Amid Warnings

 Farmers who do not take advantage of the crop insurance they have not had need appeal for financial assistance from the government in future on crop losses, it was stated yesterday by Alvin Hamilton and Andrew MacRae, who signed the crop insurance agreement on behalf of federal and provincial departments of agriculture.

This crop insurance is a self-help program, the kind of thing we have been trying to promote and develop for our farm people," Mr. Hamilton stated.

Response by the government to the insurance idea has been good to date, it was learned. Mr. MacRae said he would have a statement on the number of purchasers later this week, but he said that the interest in the past few days has banks and dealers have been pressing some growers who have unmet obligations, to insure their acreage.

Mr. Hamilton emphasized that the federal government is paying 50 per cent of the administrative costs and 20 per cent of the premium. The provincial government covers the other half of the administration costs.

The insurance is based on a premium to the grower of \$1.00 per acre and works out to a maximum of 145 bushels per acre, which is 80 per cent of the estimated average production over the past ten years.

There has been some serious questioning of the estimated average yield. Several growers told this paper their average is closer to 300 bushels, and they have never had anything nearly as low as 145 bushels over a 25-year experience. The average production on the Island is closer to 250 bushels, one man said. Production has run as high as 400 bushels of saleable spuds, they said.

"Why," one of them asked yesterday, "should I spend a little more than five dollars per acre to buy insurance that has no appeal to me?"

But Mr. Hamilton believes the crop insurance will develop into something really worthwhile. It met with good response in Manitoba and five times as many farmers there are buying insurance this year, the minister said.

Three Firms Seeking Ch'town Building Sites

The town planning committee of the city council will be asked shortly to consider the rezoning of an area in the northern section of the city - at present an almost purely residential area - to allow for the construction of three commercial enterprises.
