Ice Forces New Tugs To Seek Refuge Here

Two gleaming new tugs, enroute to Halifax, N.S., from Lazon, Que., Saturday made an unscheduled call at Charlottetown, which may last for another three or four days.

The two 98-foot powerful diesel tugs, the Foundation Viscount and Foundation Vigour, were recently completed at the Davis Shipyards at Lazon, and left there for their Halifax base last Wednesday.

They are the fifth and sixth new tugs of their class recently acquired by the Foundation Maritime Towing Company, as part of the company's program of modernization. At Halifax they will be employed in mainly harbor duties.

The skippers of the tugs originally came into Charlottetown just to spend the night here before proceeding to Halifax Sunday. Early Sunday morning they left with the intention of streaming through the Gut of Canso. But shortly after passing Pictou Island heavy ice was encountered which forced them to return to Charlottetown.

In the brief battle with the ice the Vigour suffered damage to her fuel line system, and the revised plan to leave here this morning had to be cancelled until repairs can be made. It was anticipated that the delay will be three or four days, as new parts may have to be flown from Halifax.

1,700 Rebate Cheques Sent To Hospitals

Approximately 1,700 persons sent their hospital insurance rebate cheques to the joint hospital campaign launched by the Prince Edward Island and the Charlottetown Hospital. The great majority of them came from the rural areas, it was learned Saturday from Jack Johnson, campaign chairman.

The campaign is still far from the objective of \$300,000, which the two hospitals said they would need to cover immediately foreseeable needs, but contributions are still expected from business organizations which have been approached as well as from certain individuals, it was learned.

SYRUP YIELD UP

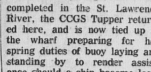
OTTAWA (CP)—Production of maple syrup and maple sugar increased substantially in 1962 in Canada, the bureau of statistics said Saturday. Total production of maple syrup rose 2.9 per cent to an estimated 2,332,000 gallons from 2,276,000, while maple sugar (farm production) increased 10 per cent to an estimated 781,000 pounds from 707,000 in 1961.

Navigational Aids Prepared In Marine Wharf Activity

The Marine Wharf in Charlottetown is daily becoming a scene of greater activity, as last minute adjustments and repairs are being made to the dozens of navigational buoys, with the lessening of ice conditions in the waters which come under the jurisdiction of the local marine agent, E. K. McNutt.

Several days ago, her work completed in the St. Lawrence River, the CCGS Tupper returned here, and is now tied up at the wharf preparing for spring duties of buoy laying and standing by to render assistance should a ship become locked in the remnants of the winter's ice.

One of the old familiar sights which will be absent from the scene this year, will be that of the ancient CCGS Saurer plying in and out of Charlottetown. The Saurer which has been considered almost obsolete for the past few years is to be replaced with the CCGS Wolfe, an almost new ship which is a close twin of the Tupper. The Wolfe now is working in and around Sydney, where the ice is reported very heavy, and once the situation there has been eased, she will proceed to her new summer base in Charlottetown, which may be in a week or 10 days.

Legislature Criticized From Pulpits

Frank Steele Dies At 74

The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital early Sunday morning after a short illness of Frank Steele, 76 Sydney Street, aged 74. Mr. Steele was a chef by trade and served in that capacity in many areas of the United States and Canada.

He was always deeply interested in sport and in his early years was active in both hockey and boxing. Older folks will remember him as goalie of the intermediate Victoria provincial championships, 1910-11 and was the last surviving member of that team. He also achieved success in Maritime ring circles as a lightweight boxer.

In later years his indifference to health prevented his attendance at many events but he was a keen supporter of all sport activities.

He is survived by his wife and a niece Miller, Mrs. Stanley Ross H. of St. Dunstan's, Hamilton, Ont.

The funeral will be Wednesday morning from his late residence to St. Dunstan's Basilica for Requiem High Mass at 9 o'clock. Interment will be in the Roman Catholic cemetery.

Funds For Cancer Research To Come From April Canvass

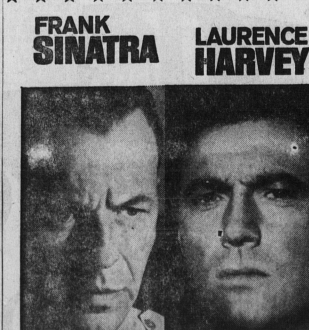
The annual April campaign of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian Cancer Society is in progress in the city of Charlottetown this week.

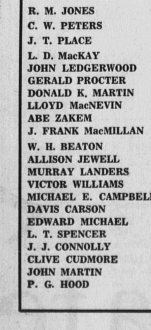
