CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

The bidding:
South West North East
1♠ Pass 1♥ Pass
2NT Pass 3NT

Opening lead—jack of spades. How should South plan the play of the three trump contract? He has eight rapid winners—three spades, three hearts and two clubs. The ninth trick may come adverse hearts may divide 3-3; the ace of diamonds may have been dealt to East; the clubs may divide 3-2.

Which of the three prospects for a ninth trick should be investigated first? Obviously, not the diamond possibility because, if a diamond is led to the king and it turns out that West has the ace, the roof may cave in the form of a string of diamond losers. How about trying the club suit

first, for example, by playing the A-K and another club? This is also dangerous because the third club may be won by East and the diamond king put under attack.

What about testing the hearts first to see whether they break because if it is seen the hearts don't divide favorably the alternate lines of play can be attempted.

So declarer wins the spade lead in his hand and takes three rounds of hearts only to discover that East has four of them. Plan No. 2 must be invoked. The lead is in dummy. Clubs must be attacked next because the diamond play subjects declarer to irretrievable defeat.

How to play the clubs is the next question. Three rounds of the suit may result in East obtaining the lead to threaten the king of diamonds. Best is to play a club from dummy, and when East makes the normal play of the eight, to duck it.

There is no valid fear that East will hold the trick because West cannot have a lower club than the eight, and will be required to overtake the eight.

As the cards lie on this particular deal, declarer's work is done. The clubs will now fall and four tricks is made. At no point was the contract sure, but every step taken was designed to bring the chance of success to its maximum potential.

Uranium Ore Reserves And Production No Longer Secret

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's vast reserves of uranium ore and production of uranium ore and concentrates since June 30, 1955, are to be taken off the secret list, Trade Minister Howe announced Wednesday night.

Mr. Howe said in a statement the new information will be released under a new declassification agreement signed by Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom. The new arrangement was announced simultaneously in Ottawa, Washington and London.

The announcement gave no figures of ore reserves or ore or concentrate production. However, it is expected that this information will be made public here today by Eldorado Mining and Refining Ltd., the crown-owned company responsible for Canada's uranium program.

The U.S. is also expected to make similar information public later. Other Western countries, including Belgium, France, South Africa and Australia, may follow Canada and the U.S. Britain produces no uranium.

Until now the only figures released by Canada have been the value of uranium expected to be produced in this country. The latest figure was that the Eldorado company by March 31, 1963, would purchase from Canadian producers uranium valued at about \$1,400,000,000.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

The declassification also makes public a wide range of information on development of atomic power for peaceful purposes, much of it of a highly technical nature.

The information is essential to the development of a nuclear industry. It covers all phases of nuclear power from recovery and fabrication of uranium

fuel elements to the design and operation of power plants.

The revision of the classification guide is the result of long study of security information held jointly by the three countries as a result of their wartime co-operation in atomic energy development.

An official said no figures on production before June 30, 1955, will be made public because it would enable a potential enemy to determine the amount of uranium available for the West's military programs. Almost 99 per cent of uranium produced to that date by Canada and the U.S. was for military purposes.

Anti-Soviet Demonstrations Sweep Poland

WARSAW (AP)—A wave of angry anti-Soviet demonstrations and strikes was reported sweeping Poland Thursday night.

Unconfirmed reports in Warsaw said demonstrators attacked a Soviet supply train in Central Poland and burned down a Soviet officer's house at Lignica, the main Soviet base near the frontier with Germany.

Miners went on strike at Szombierki in the Silesian coal basin to protest Hungarian premier Janos Kadar's dissolution of workers' councils and demanding an end to Soviet intervention in Hungary.

A similar strike threat was issued by 30,000 workers of the Cegielski Steel Works at Poznan.

Other pro-Hungarian demonstrations were reported from Sopot on the Baltic Coast, and Lipno, a small town in Warsaw county.

These followed up renewed demonstrations Wednesday night in Sietlis (Szczecin). It was there that a mob attacked the Soviet consulate Monday night.
