SHEEP HORSES.—The London Live Stock Journal of the 16th August has the following. The reference to Mr. Guard's recent importation will, of course, be noted:— "The Dunsmore stud of Shire-horses has, during the past fortnight, been again supplying various parts of the world with some very high-class specimens of that now universally popular breed. One of the best two-year-old stallions that has ever left this country, Dunsmore Gay Lad, by Canute, out of a William the Conqueror mare, has gone to Prince Edward Island; another beautiful brown stallion, without a speck of white, Bradgate, by William the Conqueror 3rd, by George, 2,453, dam by Honest Prince, 1,058, has gone to Chili, South America. Two more two-year-old stallions of the right sort, Dunsmore Bang Up, a Brown, and Dunsmore Wade, a bay, have gone to the United States; also two beautiful fillies, Dunsmore Fashion and Dunsmore Dimple, both by Canute, and bred at Dunsmore, out of those noted mares Bonny 5th, Vol. 9, and Diamond 6th, Vol. 6. Two very promising yearling stallions, which will undoubtedly be heard of in the future as valuable sires, have accompanied the above in their ocean voyage."

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.

This was another good day for the Island marksmen.

Capt. John A. Longworth won a badge in the Governor-General's match, and he and Lieutenant Hooper secured places on the Wimbledon team.

Captain Stewart, Sergeant Allen, Sergeant Davison, Sapper Anderson, Sapper Longworth and Sergeant Prowse have won prizes in the extra series matches.

The team will arrive home on Monday evening. The men are all in excellent spirits.

ANOTHER DESPATCH.

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.

The Dominion Rifle Association meeting closed to-day and the states officers have completed their returns.

In the Rideau Match Capt. Bishop, of the 63rd, took first prize and \$30, and Lieut. Hooper and Sapper Anderson, of Charlottetown, third and fourth respectively.

Among those who have secured places on the Wimbledon team for 1890 Lieut. Hooper, of Charlottetown, has thirteenth place. Among the 40 waiting men, Capt. Longworth, of Charlottetown, is first.

News of the Strike.

LONDON, Sept. 6.

A gang of dock men yesterday attacked the third officer of the steamer Clair Graham, kicked him until he was insensible, and then rifled his pockets. The outrage was committed out of revenge, the vessel having been loaded by Lascars.

Burns declares his belief that the strike will be over by Monday. It is estimated that it has already entailed a loss of over £1,500,000.

The Steam Navigation Co. has conceded the strikers' terms.

An increased number of wharf laborers are at work to-day. Burns has consented to allow men to coal steamers in the West India trade.

The Trades Union Congress to-day unanimously adopted a resolution in favor of a day of eight hours for miners.

Lord Randolph Churchill, speaking at Newtown, said the strike was the natural outcome of the excesses into which employers had fallen in the effort to extract an undue amount of labor at an inadequate rate of wages.

As a result of the conference, the dock directors have agreed to consider the proposal for sixpenny rates to begin in January next. This term was fixed in order to allow a readjustment of charges to meet the additional outlay. The strikers' committee consented to advise the men to accept this proposal.

Dynamite Explosion.

ANTWERP, Sept. 6.

Dynamite exploded to-day in a cartridge factory killing several persons and doing much damage to property. The cartridge factory was situated behind the docks upon which a million cartridges were being loaded and was adjacent to petroleum stores. Two large Russian petroleum warehouses were set on fire and are now burning. Eighty thousand barrels of oil are burning. The loss will be many million francs. Owing to the intense heat the firemen were unable to approach the flames nearer than a hundred yards, and it will be impossible to extinguish the fire in less than 24 hours.

Suicide.

NIAGARA FALLS, Sept 5.

An unknown woman plunged into the Niagara River and passed over the falls shortly before noon to-day. Her body has not been recovered.

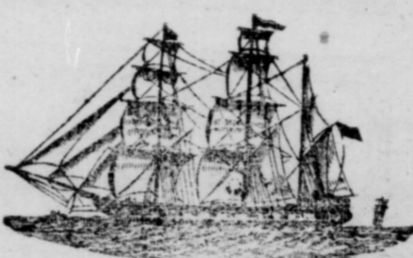
