

# Weather Finger Nor Trip Will Alter Date Of Bout

NEW YORK (AP) — Floyd Patterson insisted Thursday that neither his injured finger nor his planned trip to strike-form Birmingham would alter the date of his July 22 rematch with heavyweight champion Sonny Liston at Las Vegas.

"The fight definitely will go on July 22," said the former champion who was knocked out in the first round last September. "Even if my hand hasn't healed, it will go on."

Patterson appeared at a press conference wearing a small bandage on his right hand. It covered a scar that remained when a doctor removed a callous near the knuckle of the right hand.

The rematch, originally set for Miami Beach, Fla., in April, was postponed from April 4 to April 10 because of an injury to Liston's knee. After it was rescheduled for Las Vegas June 27, it was set back by Patterson's minor operation.

## HUNTERS' CORNER

### Columnist Receives Request From Native Of Denmark

I received a rather unusual request a few days ago from a man, a Dane, who had returned recently from Denmark. He was a native of that country.

He was authorized by Danish game officials to try and arrange a shipment of adult ruffed grouse, their young or their eggs from this province to Denmark. He informed me that Hungarian partridge and pheasants were practically wiped off the map in Denmark and West Germany when a few years ago, they were present in thousands.

He stated that Hungarian partridge were non-existent in Denmark at the moment with pheasants down an approximate 99 per cent. The odd pheasant is still reported on rare occasions.

Game authorities in both Denmark and West Germany are convinced that the type of game that would stand a chance of survival under intensified modern farming methods now in vogue are upland game birds like the ruffed grouse. Native partridge to local hunters, whose natural habitat is the wooded areas. They have a habit of feeding along the fringe of grain and wooded fields but their natural habitat is the swamps, swales and hardwood ridges. Farmland that has reverted to a state of Nature are also favourable nesting sites and feeding grounds.

# Parker MacDonald, Loney Honored At Sports Dinner

HALIFAX (CP)—A forward who rose to great scoring heights this season and a football coach who makes a habit of winning were honored here Thursday night at the first annual Nova Scotia sportsman's dinner.

Parker MacDonald, 29-year-old leftwinger from Sydney who recently finished his best season as a professional player with Detroit Red Wings of the National Hockey League, was awarded a trophy for being the Nova Scotia native who contributed most to sport on a national level.

## CYO Champs Receive Trophy

Kevin Dowling, representing Rev. Preston Hammill and CYO League officials, presented the Kelly and MacInnis trophy, emblematic of Island CYO Hockey supremacy, to Gabriel Keough, captain of the Seven Mile Bay CYO team at a banquet at the Borden Inn last evening.

Billy Noonan, star defenceman on the team, was master of ceremonies.

James Pendergast of Charlottetown, who recently returned from a Canada-wide trip, was guest speaker. He spoke of the danger of becoming flabby due to the push-button life most men are living. He encouraged the team to strive for excellence and stay away from liquor and tobacco.

Others who spoke briefly were Rev. R.F. MacDonald, parish priest; John Noonan, a c a b; Allan McCormack, president of the CYO; Gerald Gauthier, on behalf of the Belmont orchestra, who were guests of the CYO at the banquet.

MacDonald, shuffled between the minors and three NHL teams, scored 33 goals and 28 assists in regular NHL play this season for 61 points. In one full season with Toronto Maple Leafs, two with New York Rangers and half a season with Detroit, MacDonald's entire production prior to this year was 42 goals and 40 assists for 82 points.

Loney, a former centre with Ottawa Roughriders, has been coaching in Nova Scotia for nine seasons. His record: 69 wins, nine losses and one tie.

Loney is credited with a major share of development of football in the Maritimes, which have virtually dropped the game of English rugby play exclusively up until the Second World War.

Casey Stengel's amazing New York Mets rallied for three runs in the ninth inning Thursday, beat Philadelphia Phillies 5-2 and extended their winning string to four.

The sweep of the series ended the Mets to vault over the stumbling Phillies into eighth place in the National League.

The league-leading San Francisco Giants beat Milwaukee 3-2 and Chicago Cubs won their sixth straight, 3-1 over Pittsburgh in the only other day games scheduled.

In night games, Los Angeles was at St. Louis and Houston at Cincinnati in the National, and New York at Chicago, Cleveland at Washington and Boston at Baltimore in the only American League games scheduled.

The Mets, stopped on one hit for eight innings by Cal McLish, led the score on a two-run single by Tim Lincecum in the fifth and Phillie reliever

Johnny Klippstein will pitched the winning run home with two out.

Felipe Alou and Ed Bailey each drove in three runs for the streaking Giants, who have won nine of their last 10.

Veteran Warren Spahn was the loser.

Luffy Dice Eilsworth hurled a two-hitter at Pittsburgh in pitching the Cubs to their ninth victory in 10 starts.

The rejuvenated Cubs moved into second place, two games behind San Francisco.
