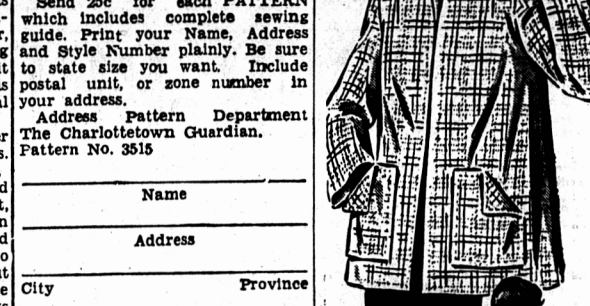

Independent Children

How Far Should Parents Go In Guiding Teen-Agers' Affairs?

DEAR MISS DIX: We agree with you that children should be taught independence and to use their own judgment, but don't you think that parents should have the privilege of advising and consulting with the children? We have some adopted children who resent our enquiry into their affairs and who seem to think that we should make no suggestions to them; that our only duty is to finance them, give them clothes and cars and the money with which to amuse themselves.

ANSWER: Teaching children to stand alone mentally and morally should be done just exactly as they are taught how to stand on their own feet and to walk physically.

And he needs the same mental training. No child can know of himself what to eat, when to go to bed, what to study at school, how to handle money, how to get along with other children.

MIND NEEDS TRAINING
