

Retarded Children's Assoc. Holds Annual Meeting

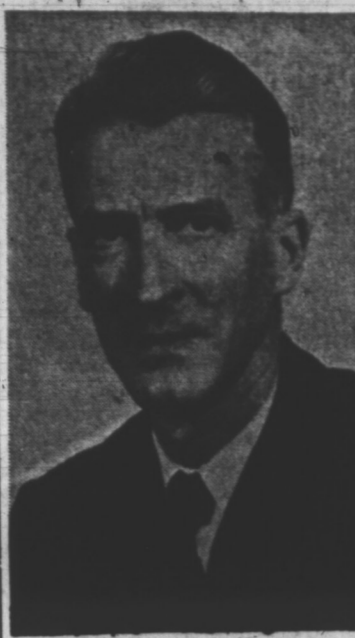
The annual meeting of the P.E.I. Association for Retarded Children was held recently in the day training room in West Kent School.

Those in attendance included Kenneth Parker, Supervisor of City Schools, Pius Smith, president of the Canadian Legion, Mrs. Frank Walker representing the Women's Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion, Mrs. Gordon MacDonald of the Home and School Association, Miss Gertrude Coody city and Mrs. Lloyd Matthews, West Prince of the advisory board. The retiring president, Leo Berigan, presided.

Reports heard from various committees included Mrs. Trevor Waye who reported 63 paid up members, an increase of eight over last year; Wendell Cudmore of the camp committee who reported that the road to the camp had been improved, interior painting completed and painting of exterior started.

A small building had been moved to the shore as a shelter for the children when the weather was bad. He asked for additional volunteer help to complete exterior painting on Saturday afternoons stating that there was ample room for children to play if parents wished to bring them along.

more interpretation of the needs of retarded children and emphasized that this would require increased membership. A research centre is to be established in London, Ont., in the near future as the first step in developing this much needed facility.

Students Enrol At St. Dunstan's

A total of 109 students have registered to date at St. Dunstan's University's second Summer Session which began Tuesday. This total represented an increase of 25 compared with the number of students which registered for the 1958 session.

Included in those enrolled this year are 85 Prince Edward Island school teachers all of whom hold First Class A teaching certificates or higher. For these the University's summer session provides an opportunity to obtain credits needed for higher licence qualifications.

Teachers from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario, Maine, Newfoundland and Quebec are also registered.

The remainder of this year's group are working towards Bachelor's degrees in either Arts or Science.

The 1959 curriculum comprises university level courses in English, French, Biology, History, Philosophy, Sociology, Mathematics, and Education.

The organization of the permanent conference came about as a result of the first Prince Edward Island Conference on Education last November when it was decided to form a permanent body.

Belle River Man Injured When Struck By Crane Boom

A Belle River resident, Angus Bell, 24, suffered a broken pelvis and a dislocated hip when pinned under the boom of a 75-foot crane being used on the reconstruction job taking place at the Charlottetown Railway Wharf. The accident occurred at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday afternoon.

The crane operator, Seifert Raynor of RR 1, Summerside, told police investigators that a slack cable put the boom hoist into gear accidentally. The boom,

he said, went over the top of the machine pinning Bell between it and the roof of the wharf shed.

The injured man was treated at the scene by Dr. L. H. Killora and then taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital by Hennessy's Ambulance.

The machine is said to be owned by Morrison and MacRae, Summerside, who hold the subcontract for driving the supporting piles. M. F. Schurman and Company are the main contractors for the job.

2 Month Tour For Pastor

The pastor of Trinity United Church, Rev. A. Frank MacLean, who is also president of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada left yesterday on a trip which will take him to major countries of Europe. He was accompanied by Mrs. MacLean on the trip which will take two months.

They will sail on Friday from Montreal for Great Britain and after visiting in the Glasgow area of Scotland, will continue through England and later to the continent. There they will visit France, Switzerland, Austria, Germany, Holland and Belgium before returning to Britain. They will return home September 1.

During July services at Trinity Church will be conducted by Rev. Robert S. Latimer. During August, two outstanding ministers from the United States will occupy the pulpit. They are Rev. Dr. J.S. Bonnell of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, and Rev. Dr. Lawrence Toombs of Drew University.

International Nickel Awards 17 Scholarships To SDU

Seventeen scholarships valued at \$100 each have been awarded this year to St. Dunstan's University by the International Nickel Company of Canada.

A University spokesman said last night that this was the first time these scholarships had been awarded on Prince Edward Island. They are restricted to teachers of Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry.

The same spokesman stated that SDU was using the scholarships not only to stimulate teachers but also to acquire a top-notch staff of instructors for the BCOO Seminar.

These include Gerald Eardley,

principal of Chipman High School, Chipman, N.B., who will instruct the chemistry group; Dr. Herman Feayour, supervisor of schools, Parraboro, N.S., who will instruct the physics seminar; and Ivan Dowling, a member of the PWC faculty, who will instruct the seminar in mathematics.

Each of these instructors is especially well known for effective teaching in these departments on the high school level and can be expected to contribute generously from his experience and training to the technique of presenting fundamental ideas in these fields, the University release adds.

Five golfers from the Belvedere Club will leave Friday night for Edmundston, N.B., where they will compete in a 36-hole tournament Sunday for positions on this year's Willingdon Cup team.

Led by Island winner Art MacKenzie those taking part in the tourney are Jack Beaton, Don MacDonald, Bob Dowling and Merlin MacKenzie. Art MacKenzie won the P.E.I. district tourney with a 72-hole total of 313.

The two top golfers in the Edmundston tournament will be named to the Willingdon Cup squad. The other players will be named at the N.B. — P.E.I. tournament in Fredericton.

There will be 25 golfers competing in Sunday's tournament.

Smallwood's 'Pet Projects' Involve 'Larac' Cash Layouts

CORNER BROOK (CP) — Gifts by Newfoundland's two pulp and Paper companies to Memorial University and the Corner Brook city council have been described by the district labor council as "tremendous cash layouts on Premier Smallwood's pet projects."

The CLC affiliate said in a statement issued here that the \$1,000,000 total "belonged to the loggers who had their union smashed by the plotting of the paper companies and the provincial government."

Newfoundland locals of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) were described by the provincial legislature after the IWA struck Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company in Grand Falls for more money. Premier Smallwood promoted an independent union, the Newfoundland Brotherhood of Woods-Workers, to replace the IWA.

The council statement said an A.N.D. gift of \$500,000 to Memorial University "was designed to please the young Newfoundlanders who were turning against the provincial Liberal government."

The labor council said it was "a little surprised that the money did not go directly to Premier Smallwood... probably to help balance the provincial budget."

The council referred to A.N.D. statements during the winter which said the mill would have to be closed if demands of the IWA were met. Bowater's complained of poor economic conditions.

"Now, both companies can afford tremendous cash layouts for Premier Smallwood's pet projects, the first time in their history that they have given such large amounts without even an official request for aid."

The IWA strike against A.N.D. began Dec. 31 and was punctuated by incidents of violence. Some work stoppages were reported in Bowater's woods operations.

The Golden Hawks staged a 20 minute sequence of loops, rolls, crossovers, bombbursts, Cuban-eights, and phubaris in a colorful and highly exciting performance that was the highlight of the magnificent show put on by the R.C.A.F. station.

Following the show a reception for press and radio personnel was held in one of the station lounges at which the Golden Hawk pilots were introduced to the newsmen by the public relations officer, Flying Officer John Doucette.

EXPRESSES REGRET

Sir Roy Dobson commented: "Words cannot adequately express the regret I feel at this time over the death of a man who has always been one of my best personal friends and I believe, one of the most competent young industrialists Canada has produced. He has made a valuable contribution to the growth of the company and to the development of Canada itself. He leaves our group with the best wishes for his future from myself and all his colleagues."

Mr. Gordon — described as a rugged, restless type of young executive — became president and general manager of A. V. Roe Canada in 1951 when he was only 38.

Since then he has led it through a wide diversification from a single airplane and aero-engine organization, to its present status as a holding company with subsidiaries engaged in a wide range of industry.

Notably he led it in the acquisition in 1957 of control of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation Ltd., commonly known as Canada's largest "industrial complex."

For a while following the acquisition he was president of Dosco.

ARROW DECISION
Hardest blow to A.V. Roe during Mr. Gordon's leadership was the federal government's decision earlier this year to scrap its program for the company's CF-105 Arrow all-weather jet interceptor, which Roe, under government contract, had brought to the production point at its plant at Malton, near Toronto.

Mr. Gordon is a native of Winnipeg and a graduate in commerce of McGill University. He served with the department of munitions and supply and with the department of reconstruction and supply, 1941-1946, received the Order of the British Empire, and was recalled as co-ordinator

Cars Collide On Bridge

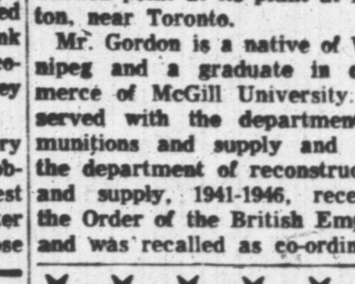
NO ALTERNATIVE

"My association with A. V. Roe Canada has been most satisfying in that I believe the company has contributed and will continue to contribute something of real and lasting value to Canada's industrial program."

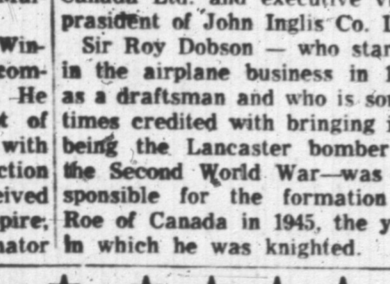
