## Gordie Howe Wins Award As Athlete of the Year

TORONTO (CP) — Gordie Howe, outstanding right-winger with Detroit Red Wings in the National Hockey League, has been named Canada's Athlete of the Year.

The country's sports editors and sportswriters gathered in the 35-year-old Howe, the NHL's all-time high goal scorer, the honor in the 29th annual Canadian Press year-end poll announced Tuesday. He was an easy win-over in a quarter-final of the Eastern Football Conference Ottawa Rough Riders.

"I'm very proud of this honor," the native of Floral, Sask., commented. "I don't know how many people wonder how I could win this when I am living in the U.S. on a permanent visa. A lot of Canadians living in this country are on such a visa and it is just going to be a matter of time until I am an American citizen."

"But the fact remains that I was born in Canada and I will continue to be a Canadian until I apply for my citizenship in the U.S."

**TOPS POLL FIRST TIME**

This was the first time that Howe had won the CP poll after 17 brilliant years in the big league.

He ended the 1962-63 NHL season last March as the league's scoring champion for an unprecedented sixth time. He won the Hart Trophy as the league's most valuable player for a record sixth time, and then captured the right-wing spot on the league's first all-star team for the eighth time.

But the clincher in an illustrious career was likely to come in 1964, when he was expected to receive only one vote in the over-all category.

**ALSO TOP MALE**

The selectors boosted him to the top in two categories.

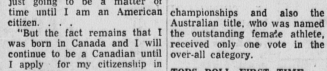

The voters were asked to name only one athlete and to give a reason. Howe had all sorts of credentials to back up his claim on 39 of the 147 men who participated in the poll made him their choice.

Jackman was second with 31 votes and Bill Crothers, the young man from Algonquin, Ont., just east of Toronto, who is ranked with the world's fastest half-milers, was third with 12 votes.

## Nebraska Takes Orange Bowl Win

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Nebraska's huge Cornhuskers surged to an early 13-0 lead Wednesday over Auburn and held off a furious Tiger rally led by All America Jimmy Side to win the Orange Bowl football game 13-7.

Dennis Claridge broke an Orange Bowl distance record by galloping 67 yards to a touch-down on the game's second play and after Dave Trencher kicked two field goals, the pro-size Cornhuskers appeared on their way to a crushing victory.

But Auburn, giving up a 16-0-0-0 man weight advantage in the line, stopped the country's No. 1 college rushing attack in the second half and fell just 11 yards short of pulling the game out in the final two minutes.

Side siped 13 yards for a touch-down on one of the wide sweeps that Auburn used to gain most of its yardage fast fall and then passed and ran the Tigers 60 yards to the Nebraska 11-yard line in a gallant bid for a winning touch-down.
