BRITAIN BACKS French Stand On Tunisia

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. Dec. 7 (CP) - Britain lined up solidly behind France Saturday in demanding that the United Nations keep hands off the French protectorate of Tunisia.

Selwyn Lloyd, Britain's minister of state for foreign affairs, told the political committee of the UN General Assembly it has not even the right to discuss the Arab-Asian demand for Tunisia's independence.

He said the question comes under the domestic affairs of France and therefore the UN is not competent to discuss it.

The Briton denied the Arab-Asian charge that the situation in Tunisia is a threat to international peace and warned that the UN discussion encourage Tunisian terrorism. He referred to the assassination Friday of Tunisian independence leader Farhat Hached, as a regrettable incident.

Delegates of Egypt, Iran and Indonesia denounced the assassination and called for positive UN action now to prevent further terrorism.

France, which governs Tunisia under a treaty signed 70 years ago, is boycotting the debates to point up its claim that the UN is incompetent to discuss the relationship between itself and its protectorate. Tunisia, about twice the size of New Brunswick, has a population of 3,000,000 Arabs and 240,000 Europeans.

37 Persons Killed When Big Air Liner Explodes

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Dec. 7 (AP)—A trans-Atlantic Cuban air liner exploded soon after it took off for Havana before dawn Saturday and carried all but four of the 41 persons aboard to death in shark-studded waters capped by burning gasoline.

Men, women and children—Spaniards, Cubans and Mexicans—were among the 37 who perished in the crash five miles off this British colonial vacation resort.

United States Air Force and Coast Guard crash boats picked the four survivors—three women and a man—from a choppy sea littered by debris—a pair of baby shoes, a briefcase, rubber fittings from the plane's seats.

One who lived through it was the Cuban steward, Orlando Lopez Surez, 40. Thrown out before the plane hit the water, he helped keep a Cuban girl, Alicia Ebank, afloat for an hour until they were rescued by the Coast Guard. The other survivors were Gloria Solomayor, a Cuban, and Adelaida Arenal, a Mexican.

The plane, a DC4 called "Star of the East" was operated by the Cubana Airlines, a subsidiary of Pan American. It carried a Cuban crew of eight and 33 passengers. Westbound from Madrid, the plane arrived at Kindley Field from Santa Maria, Azores, at 3:30 a.m. The takeoff from Kindley Field at about 4:40 a.m. appeared normal.

The explosion, from an undetermined cause, came as the plane was nosing out from the coastal shelf. It plunged into 60 feet of water. A mass of gasoline spread over the ocean and caught fire.

The control tower at Kindley Field saw the explosion. Thirteen bodies were recovered before rising winds forced abandonment of the search. Among them was that of the pilot, Capt. Luis Sastre. The consensus was that no others would be found.

Sastre was considered one of Cuba's best pilots. By coincidence his brother, Jose Antonio Sastre, died in Havana of natural causes just about the time the accident occurred.

U.S. Allies Opposed To Enlarging War In Korea

By John M. Highower WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP) - United States allies in the Korean war are authoritatively described as strongly opposed to any military action which would enlarge the conflict even within the borders of Korea.

A report on the Allies' attitude and on other international problems involved in trying to work out a new Korean strategy, is believed to be one of the major purposes of the forthcoming consultations between President-elect Eisenhower and John Foster Dulles, who will be the new secretary of state.

Dispatches from the cruiser Helena, carrying Eisenhower home from Korea, say Dulles is expected to board the ship when it reaches Wake Island.

Dulles was in Washington Tuesday and Wednesday. Some of the persons he spoke to are well-informed on the problems of handling over-all Korean policy in consultation with other governments, including Canada, Britain and France, which have forces fighting there.

Eisenhower, at his press conference Friday, emphasized the "many limitations on a war of this kind." Foreign capitals displayed relief that he had not, as some governments feared, indicated any immediate steps for drastic action.

Canadian Army Casualty List

OTTAWA, Dec. 7 (CP) - A Canadian army casualty list issued Saturday included two men wounded in action. The last list was issued Dec. 4. It brought to 1,247 total casualties so far suffered by Canadian troops in Korea, including 233 dead, 901 wounded, 28 missing, 34 injured and one captured.

In addition the navy has reported three dead and three injured in action.
