Canada's 99th birthday, Friday July 1st, will be an historic and momentous day in the long and eventful history of Georgetown, the capital town of Kings County when, with all the romance and excitement of opening night, Kings Theatre will present the Canadian Premiere of "Under The Yum-Yum Tree", sponsored by King's County Retarded Children's Association and a large crowd of dignitaries and public officials will attend the history-making opening.

Great Canadian names in the world of acting will make up the cast that will bring to Island theatre goers all the romance of the beloved "Summer Stock" theatre. Two plays will be presented during the months of July and August, with "Under The Yum-Yum Tree" running through from opening night on one week on Saturday, July 9th the second play, "Marriage-Go-Round" will be presented and will run for one week. For the remainder of the summer season, the plays will alternate, with one playing on Friday's, Saturday's and Monday's and the other Tuesday's, Wednesday's and Thursday's. The Theatre schedule also calls for a swing along sing along on Sunday nights throughout the summer.

Cast members and theatre staff members from outside the province have been rehearsing in Georgetown for the past two weeks and are residing in Georgetown, Montague and Lower Montague. They are all very enthusiastic and very much in love with the Province's scenery and climate and are showing great interest in many local customs and activities.

Mrs. Beth McGowan of Montague, with a long history of theatre behind her saw and realized the possibilities in the 100 year old Town Hall in Georgetown and to her it presented the long-sought answer to real revival of the legitimate theatre as a part of the everyday life of the average citizen. She realized that across Canada the theatre revival is sweeping like a prairie fire and artists are searching for centres in which to stage productions. This sense of urgency in the field of cultural development could, she felt, be best served by the potential present in the Old Town Hall. She accordingly made the necessary arrangements with the municipal authorities and sought and obtained a long-term lease on the historic building and thus was born "Kings Theatre".

The monumental task of refurbishing and redecorating the theatre, both inside and outside, was started, ever keeping in mind the preservation and restoration of its age old structural beauty and historical at-

tractiveness, and at the same time restoring it to its former appearance of a theatre of the 1850's era. What has been accomplished is fantastic and imaginative. The exterior has been painted in Victorian purple. The main entrance and exit are both adorned with gold fringed canopies. Old style English lettering, in white, spell out "Kings Theatre", against the Victorian purple background. From four flag staffs fly the Union Jack; the Canadian flag; the blue and white fleur-de-lis of Labelle Province and the Stars and Stripes.

PAINTED IN GOLD
The interior is painted in gold, thus presenting the royal colors of purple and gold. The high walls were covered with embossed velvet elaret paper. Stage curtains and window drapes are also of elaret. Gas light fixtures are installed on both side walls and from the high ceiling will be suspended three gas light chandeliers. A balcony adorns the back section of the theatre with a seating capacity of fifty. Two hundred and fifty persons can be seated in the main theatre which has side aisles. Other extensive alterations and installations include an elaborate system of stage lights, stage settings; dressing rooms; plumbing and a complete redecorating of the whole building.

Interest and enthusiasm in the whole project has spread throughout the Province and during the past few weeks hundreds of persons have called at the theatre to witness its renovation and all expressed amazement and fascination at the scope and artistry of the undertaking. Indicative of this interest and enthusiasm was the recent forming of a Theatre Guild and a recently held pantry sale initiated their campaign to play a part, as an auxiliary service, of this fascinating venture in cultural development.

The history of the Old Town Hall is fascinating and holds a special place in the memories of the days

Holstein Value Stressed For Dual-Purpose Field

The tremendous capacity of the Holstein cow as a dual-purpose animal was emphasized by Dr. Waldo Walsh, director of co-operative advisory services for Nova Scotia at the P.E.I. Holstein breeders' field day here yesterday.

The gathering at the Experimental Farm was presided over by Andrew Jardine, Freetown who is national director. Island president Jra Lewis, York introduced Dr. Walsh.

Two breeds of cattle, with the "H" initial have topped Canadian performances in the matter of rapidly gaining popularity. They are the Holstein and the Hereford, Mr. Walsh told the group.

TOP CATTLE
The Holsteins are the top cattle in Canada from the standpoint of value and also of popularity. In England, Dr. Walsh recalled, there were very few Holsteins or Friesians as the breed is known in that area, back in the early 1930s, "but when I was in England in 1962, 62 percent of all England's cattle were either Friesians or a cross of that breed."

Backing up his statement that the Holstein is the ideal dual-purpose animal, Dr. Walsh said they are heavy milkers and the milk is the kind the nutritionists and the women like—low in fat and high in solid content.

When cross bred the Holstein grades sometime Blue, often brown and at least commercial, if they are properly fed and cared for.

The Holstein steer that is well cared for will finish two years of age, and their weight is so great, they are much better than stuff that is much lighter. An opinion, Dr. Walsh, passed on from a man who conducted an experiment at Lethbridge, Alberta, noted when Holstein cows were through as a milk producer she generally brings twice as much as the smaller breed animals.

Turning to agriculture in general, Dr. Walsh noted that P.E.I. leads many other areas in good farming practices, "though you still have a long way to go."

SOILS AND CROPS
Recalling that the late Jack McCague, Alliston, Ontario had been a college classmate, the speaker told the field-day crowd that Jack had always insisted on emphasizing soils and crops. The unusual part was that Mr. McCague had been a tremendously successful breeder of high quality Holstein cattle—he bred and developed such all-time famous sires as the great Rag Apple Marksman, for example.

Dr. Walsh noted that he is continually stressing the value of good grass, early cut hay and green ensilage in his own province.

In closing the man who is always fairly bursting with vitality said that he is in this setting of history, memory and age-old tradition that Kings Theatre will open its doors to Islanders and visitors during its presentation of two plays during the summer season of this year, our centennial eve, and will go on to greater things in the years ahead.
