The bidding:
South West North East
1♥ Pass 1♦ 4♣
2♥ Pass 1♦ 4♣

Opening lead—six of clubs.

Readers who enjoy solving tough problems will get a kick out of this hand which arose in a duplicate game many years ago. Even with the advantage of seeing all four hands the six heart contract is not easy to make.

South wins the club lead and plays the queen of hearts. West, of course, ducks, and the finesse wins. Declarer sees he can pick up West's king by leading three more trumps, but if he does this, he will have to lose a club.

South also notes that if he ruffs his club loser in dummy without drawing trumps, West's

king can no longer be caught by repeated finessses.

But these observations are only academic at the moment since, if the spades break 3-2, twelve tricks are certain.

So declarer tests out the spade situation by leading a spade to the queen and another back to the ace. When East shows out, the situation becomes serious, since there are now two losers.

A little prestidigitation is then in order if the slam is to be made. One loser must be made to disappear.

After leading a low heart to the eight, a diamond is played to the king, and a club is ruffed. This leaves dummy with the ace of hearts along while West still has K-5.

The ace of diamonds is cashed, and a diamond is ruffed with the six. Next a spade is led to the king.

At this point dummy has the four of spades, ace of hearts, and four of diamonds.

Declarer has 3-10 of hearts and nine of spades.

West has K-5 of hearts and jack of spades.

The four of diamonds is led and East is allowed to win the jack. South and West each discarding a spade.

East is forced to lead a club. South trumps with the ten. But what can West do?

His king is trapped whether he undertrumps or overtrumps. It is smothered.

Mrs. Heber Bryan is leaving shortly for Halifax to undergo surgery.

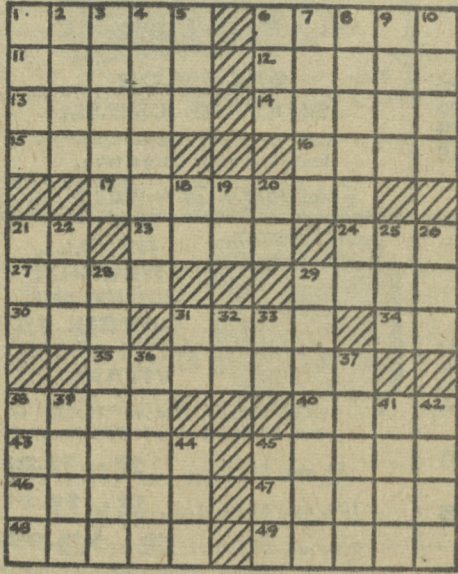
Howlan Schools opened on Tuesday October 14 after the two weeks fall vacation.

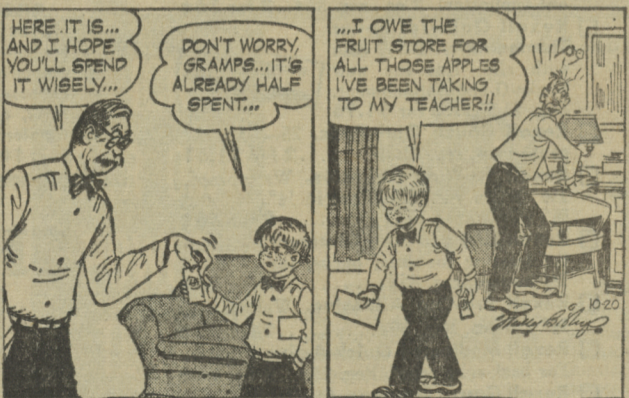

Miss Cottie Toombs, Charlottetown, spent the holiday at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Irving Toombs.

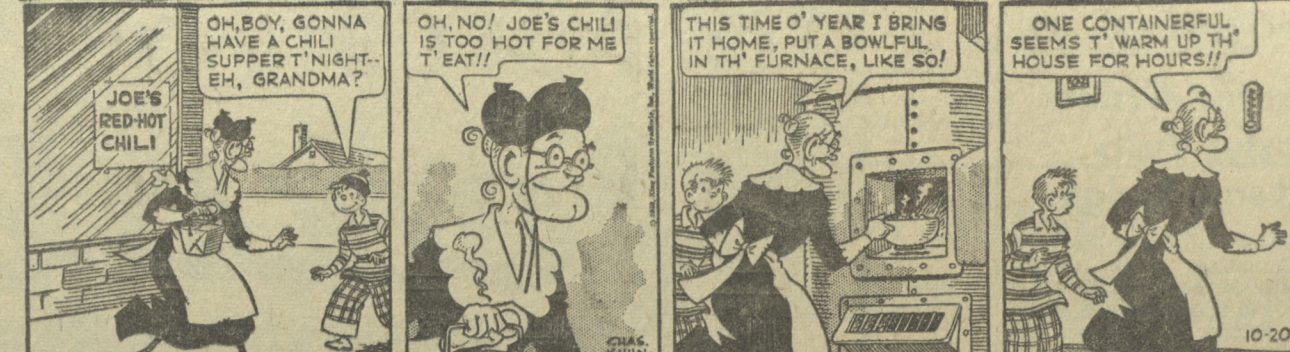
