WINDSOR, Ont., (CP) — Ford of Canada announced Wednesday overtime employment, suspended last Thursday because of a strike at the Canton, O., supply plant, will start again this week-end.

The sprawling plant here which employs about 11,000 men had been producing on an overtime basis since mid-February but cut back to the 40-hour work week because of the Canton strike which forced shutdown of most Ford operations in the United States.

On the overtime basis virtually all employees engaged in passenger car operations work a 48-hour week and one shift operates on Saturdays.

Welfare Council Adoption Report

OTTAWA, (CP) — There is a shortage in Canada of adoption homes for children of the Roman Catholic faith, children of mixed racial backgrounds and children who have outgrown infancy, the Child Welfare Division of the Canadian Welfare Council said Wednesday.

The committee aims to find ways and means by which every child in Canada who needs adoption will find a suitable home.

More complete rehabilitation of unmarried mothers and children born out of wedlock is another goal of the child welfare division which now includes 90 agencies across Canada engaged in promoting well-being of Canadian children.

Names are being withheld pending notification of next-of-kin.

Continue Search For Lancaster Missing In Oregon

SEATTLE, (AP) — Planes and ships of two nations combed Pacific waters off the Oregon coast Wednesday for an RCAF Lancaster missing with 10 aboard as a ground party trekked inland to check what the United States coast guard said was its "most substantial" lead.

Coast guard headquarters here said the ground party was en route to Salmon Mountain, 17 miles east of Port Oxford, Ore., to investigate a report received from George Montgomery, a miner, that a plane may have crashed in the vicinity of the mountain.

The plane en route to San Diego from Comox, B. C., was in the centre of a thunderstorm when it made its last radio report at 2:22 a.m.

The Lancaster was taking part in joint exercises, escorting the destroyer Algonquin, now en route to Halifax.

Captain of the plane, was F.O. Kenneth Edgar Elsdon of Kye Bay, B. C., the co-pilot was F.O. Harry Charles Maddick of St. John's, Nfld.

"factory." Eisenhower issued a statement reaffirming American support of the UN-approved principles in the truce talks.

The White House declined to comment on Taft's statement or to indicate whether it represented a serious difference of opinion between the President and his chief lieutenant in Congress.

In his address to the American Society of Newspaper Editors on April 16, Eisenhower spoke out against "isolation" and declared: "We are ready... to make of the United Nations an institution that can effectively guard the peace and security of all peoples."

The Alabama senator said it is generally known that the Allies have agreed to go along with the U.S. if the Communists reject the latest peace offer.

"Now Senator Taft is proposing

that we divorce them ourselves." These talks are scheduled to begin next month, by President Eisenhower, Prime Minister Churchill and the French premier.

Record Flow Of Refugees To West
BERLIN, (AP) — Four thousand refugees, the highest number ever counted on one day, streamed into West Berlin Wednesday from the Russian zone.

City officials attributed the sudden increase to widespread fear among East Germans that allied West Berlin may be sealed off, that new identity cards would be issued restricting their movement and that drafting for a Communist "People's Army" is just around the corner.
