MILK FLOOR RAISED

New Dairy Policy Ready

OTTAWA (CP) — Agriculture Minister Greene announced a new dairy policy in the Commons Wednesday to give farmers a return of \$4 a hundredweight for milk used to manufacture butter and other products.

The policy will go into effect in the dairy year starting April 1.

It compares with a national average government supported price of \$3.50 in the current dairy year.

The new support price will be achieved by direct monthly or quarterly payments to dairy farmers from the federal government.

So-called \$4 milk has been sought by farm organizations. In addition, the Liberals promised programs to provide a return of \$3.75 to \$4 in the campaign for the Nov. 8 federal election.

Mr. Greene told the Commons the new policy is aimed at preventing the "continued deterioration in the economic position of the dairy farmer."

The \$4 level will apply to milk testing 3.5 per cent butterfat delivered to the factory.

Also under the new policy, federal support payments will be extended to cover a portion of farm-produced milk that goes into the fluid retail market.

Payments will amount to 85 cents a hundredweight minus a 10-cent export assistance levy on an amount calculated by a shipping price formula.

Mr. Greene also said the Agricultural Stabilization Board, the federal agency that handles farm support programs, will also raise its offer to purchase butter to 59 cents a pound from 55.

The new butter price will be offered in certain areas across Canada to remove price differentials.

Other products such as skim milk powder and cheddar cheese will also receive "an appropriate offer" to purchase as well as export assistance.

In this way, milk and cream processors will be placed in a

position to pay a base price of \$3.25 a hundred for milk.

Direct federal payments of 85 cents a hundredweight to producers minus a 10-cent export assistance levy will bring the net price to the farmer to \$4.

Mr. Greene said the federal government has no authority to set the prices that milk and cream processors pay to farmers.

For this reason, farm groups and producer boards "must do

all they can to see that this market price level is achieved."

Longtime Resident Dies In Hospital

Samuel Campbell, longtime resident of Charlottetown died last evening at the Prince Edward Island Hospital after a brief illness in his 87th year.

Mr. Campbell was born August 27, 1879 in Renfrew, Scotland, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Campbell of Renfrew.

Mr. Campbell learned the trade of ship's blacksmith on the Clyde River and came to Canada in 1910 where he was employed with Bruce Stewart Company.

Three Bills Authorized

Three bills authorizing the City of Charlottetown to issue debentures were given second reading—approval in principle—in the Legislature yesterday.

One bill will allow the city to issue up to \$1,501,000 in debentures for the board of school trustees. The promoter of the bills, J. David Stewart (PC-Charlottetown), said the debentures would be issued to allow the board to erect a new high school in the city.

A second bill gives power to the city to issue \$150,000 in debentures for the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply for extensions of water services.

The third bill gave the city power to issue \$140,000 worth of debentures to refund expenditures for permanent works
