Trade Services Parade Large Crowds

SUMMERSIDE — Large numbers of citizens in the Summerside area attended church services and memorial parades yesterday to honor those who gave their lives in two World Wars and the Korean conflict.

Memorial services were held around the cenotaph in Summerside, with similar services being held at Traveller's Rest, St. Eleanor's, Miscouche, Wellington and Borden.

The SCAF band supplied music for the ceremony and the marchpast. C. Ross MacKenzie, president of the Royal Canadian Legion, was master of ceremonies. The funeral salute was by a firing party from "C" Squadron of the P.E.I. Regiment, RCAF, Camp Wark.

The address was given by Summerside Deputy Mayor George Key, Jr., who paid tribute to those men and women who so valiantly gave up their lives for the cause of freedom.

Looking over the large number of children in attendance, Mr. Key stated: "Little do they know the significance or meaning of this service." He said that the Cuban crisis recently had set the fire to his mind, the nearest to the kind of war that had been since the last great conflict.

"What do you do in times like these?" asked Mr. Key. "I tried to make an assessment. I looked at all we have to be thankful for and prayed to God that it would not be taken away."

Several organizations, plus representatives from the armed forces and other groups placed wreaths at the cenotaph as the veterans laid their poppies as names of fallen comrades.

The salute at the marchpast was taken by Mr. MacKenzie. Members of the George R. Peakes, VC Branch, Royal Canadian Legion held a banquet Saturday evening at the legion house, when guest speaker was Jack Veness, Moncton, N.B., a member of the North Nova Scotia Highland Regiment in the last war, and made famous by the book, "The Two Jacks," by Will R. Bird, Amherst, N.S.

Kathy Veness, remembering the war and escape from the Germans. He said both he and the other Jack, Jack Fairweather, were captured the day after D-Day. They spent seven weeks in a concentration camp at Reims, France. When the allies got near, the Germans marched their prisoners farther inland. Some of the journey was in train. It was during this train trip that the escape was effected.

Tommy Edouard, Minister Keir Clark, Montague "is not interested in being a candidate for the last time" and in a former provincial treasurer in a former Liberal administration. Joseph G. Campbell, Popular Point, who ran with Mr. Edouard last time and is a former member of the legislature, could not be reached by telephone for comment. Other names mentioned in this district included Lester B. MacLeod, manager of MacLeod and Green at Montague who said he had never given the idea any thought until it had been approached late last week by several suggestions he should offer. The name of Gilbert Clements, Montague electrical contractor, was also rumored but Mr. Clements said "is strictly a rumor." The men are in Third Kings when sitting members are Douglas McInnes, Edouard, Montague and Thomas A. Curran, Baldwin's who are both PCs.

Liberal leader in the legislature and former Health Minister M. L. Bommel, MDE, are the other candidates in Kings. They were reported in 1959 by PCs Murdoch Macdonald, Edouard, Montague, George Ferguson, Murray River, who was a byelection last year for the Liberals in Fifth Kings will naturally be running again and one report last night indicated that his running mate might be Arthur Macdonald, a young man from Little Point who has been active in the Liberal organization. If he offers, he might replace the late S. S. Hession, PC, Georgetown, who died the last legislature, who died recently in Nigeria, and who was a member of the province.

James McConnell, Georgetown said last night he would likely be a candidate for the party in this year to contest the federal riding of Prince or June 18.

It was also learned from a reliable source that C. Cleveland Baker, Kensington would not be offering in June. The one-time minister of agriculture, who was his seat in 1959, was first elected in 1957 and

re-elected in 1961, 1955 and again four years ago. Edwin Lewis, Freeborn is expected to offer as a candidate for the Liberals when the nominating convention is held. A former campaign manager for J. George MacKay, and an officer with the Young Liberals prior to that, Mr. Lewis is a brother of the late J. Lewis who contested Queens for the Liberals in the federal election this year.

H. E. Strong, Summerside and Allison Profit, Freeborn represented the PCs in 1959. Mr. Strong has died since and Mr. Profit could not be reached for comment.

Quick Action Prevents Fire Spreading From Attic Area

SUMMERSIDE — Misfortune again struck the Gordon Yoo family in Summerside Saturday afternoon when a fire broke out in the attic of 14 1/2 Beaver Street home, that could have spread to other regions of the town.

Mr. Yoo, almost a member of the dinner cooking on the stove. A roomer in the house, Linda Stewart, who has an upstairs apartment, also smelled smoke and upon opening the door to the attic stairway realized the fire must be in the attic.

She called to Mr. Yoo who was downstairs, and he ran up with a portable fire extinguisher. During this time Mrs. Yoo got water in some containers and this was thrown on the smoldering fire, which was confined to the attic floor where some articles of old clothing and papers had been ignited.

Mr. Yoo, almost a member of the Summerside fire department, kept the window shut, despite the heavy smoke and managed to extinguish the fire before the fire department arrived.

The smoke exhalator was inserted in a window and most of the smoke was thereby drawn out of the attic. Except for a small portion of the floor, where the fire was located, no damage occurred.

It is not known how the fire started. A lead wire from a television aerial in the attic was burned, causing speculation that it may have been a possible cause. It is also thought that perhaps some old clothing and papers on the floor ignited by spontaneous combustion and burned the aerial wire that was nearby.

Last month Mr. Yoo was seriously injured in a fire at the White Base oil plant in Summerside where he is plant manager.

Increase Is Noted In Accident Rate

Traffic accident statistics for the month of September, released by the provincial motor vehicle branch, showed that two people were killed and 49 injured in 10 accidents during the month. Seventy-three of the accidents involved property damage.

Estimated cost of the property damage in September's accidents was \$25,150. In the 77 accidents, 115 vehicles and 113 drivers were involved. The number of vehicles insured was 43 and 72 were not insured.

There were 44 suspensions of driving privileges as a result of drivers not carrying liability insurance at the time of the accidents.

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
