

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FOR GOODS & SPECIALTY.—Beer Bros. H. B. C.—Special meeting this evening. A full attendance requested.

POLICE COURT.—One drunk, gathered in yesterday afternoon, stands over for trial on Monday.

ST. PATRICKS CHURCH.—The evening service tomorrow will be preached by the Rev. A. O. Osborne, D. D., Rector of Sumner.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.—The Prince of Wales College will reopen after the midsummer holidays on Tuesday, 4th September, at 10 a. m.

THE FASTNET.—The Fastnet arrived from Summerside early this morning, and leaves for Halifax at four o'clock this afternoon. She will carry a good general freight and one passenger, Miss Laird.

ON A TOUR.—Myriads of small black flies passed over the city and some parts of the Province yesterday afternoon. They were in great numbers about the water, and were very annoying. They are reported to-day in King's County in large numbers.

SPORTS.—New Glasgow's celebration on Sept. 5th promises to be a big affair. The programme includes aquatic races in the forenoon, horse races in the afternoon, and athletic sports, by electric light at night. Charlottetown will be represented by four- and double-saddle races. There will be an excursion from here if a sufficient number of names be received.

CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH.—A correspondent of the St. John's M.D. Evening Telegram sends the following to that paper: A very sad accident occurred at St. Carl's recently. Mr. William Curlew's home, with three small children in it, was entirely consumed by fire. Mr. Curlew is an old man, over seventy years of age. A family by the name of Ross was living in the house with him, and it was the children of this family who were burned.

RELIEF WANTED.—The St. John Telegraph says: Mayor Robertson has received a circular letter from the board of trade of Vancouver, B. C., representing that the Fraser Valley floods had caused immediate demands for relief to \$10,000, that the harvest was a failure, and that demands would greatly increase towards winter, and probably \$25,000 to \$30,000 would be required to afford relief. An appeal is therefore made to the Dominion generally.

STEAMER ASHORE.—The steamer Doris, Capt. McKenzie, went ashore in 18 feet of water at Brook, off Cape Bear, at 5.30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, during the fog. She is bound from Pictou for Montreal with 2200 tons coal. The steamer is 1,127 tons, and draws 20 feet of water. They are today throwing the coal overboard, and at high tide, with the assistance of a tug, it is expected she will be got off. The Doris is owned in Scotland.

THE WOOD ISLANDS FATALITY.—A warrant for the arrest of James McNeill, for the shooting of William McMillan at Wood Islands was to be sworn out at Eton this afternoon. The case will be tried in Charlottetown before H. James Palmer, Stipendiary Magistrate for Queen's County.

TELEPHONIC COMMUNICATION WITH WOOD ISLANDS IS INTERRUPTED TO-DAY, PROBABLY BY THE LIGHTING OF THIS MORNING, and THE EXAMINER is therefore unable to obtain any further particulars of the unfortunate affair of Wednesday night.

A PECULIAR COINCIDENCE.—While Mr. Paul Lea was returning to Moncton on Wednesday evening from St. John a gentleman on the train asked him if he was acquainted around here, and if he knew a man in Moncton by the name of Paul Lea. Mr. Lea replied he did, and after some further remarks told him he was the gentleman he was looking for. Mr. Lea had been in Moncton for about forty years, and was also a Mr. Lea. But on further conversation it was discovered that the gentleman he was looking for had not been in Moncton for about forty years ago. He left for P. E. I. yesterday morning—Moncton Times.

A SAD FATALITY.—The Agricultural front-lens the following particulars of the shocking death of a child, of Mr. Walter Hogg, to which reference was made in a portion of yesterday's edition of THE EXAMINER: "He (Mr. Hogg) went out to shift a ball on the tether, and a few minutes later his son found him breathing his last, the animal having attacked him with fatal result. When the unfortunate man was found, life was about extinct. There was no recognition, and only the faintest pulsation, which very quickly ceased. Mr. Hogg was terribly lacerated by the animal's horns, there being nine distinct wounds in his breast, besides wounds in other parts of the body, and scratches on the face. One wound penetrated the lung, and it is thought the heart. Just how the accident began no one can tell, as no outcry was heard, nor was the affair seen by anyone until the life of the unfortunate youth was nearly ebbing. The bull was a young animal and was never known to be cross or unruly." Mr. Hogg was a widower, 64 years of age, and was respected and esteemed by all who knew him. His son and daughter were living at home with him. His funeral takes place this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Mr. Robert Hogg and Mr. J. P. Hood, of Charlottetown, are among those in attendance.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

NEW YORK, August 23.—A Rio Janeiro special says the city is under military patrol. Pitoto's secret police are everywhere. A Brazil warship has been ordered back from Uruguay and the harbor is patrolled by warships, and that launches. The city has the appearance of a military camp.

LONDON, August 23.—It is stated here that the French government will not permit Sir Charles Dike to make a tour of France's eastern frontier, which he was said to have planned for a parliamentary recess. The French press protests against allowing foreigners to pry into French arsenals and forts.

COWES, August 23.—The Prince of Wales mustered the crew of the cutter Britannia yesterday afternoon shortly before his departure for Hamburg. He commended all for the excellent performance of their duties, and presented Captain Carter with a pocket aneroid compass inscribed with these words: "A present from the Prince of Wales to Capt. Carter, in recognition of the gallant and winning six successive races from the Vigilant."

LONDON, August 23.—The Chronicle's Rome correspondent says the Pope has sent a circular letter to the Italian bishops requesting them to instruct the clergy to refrain from secular subjects in their sermons. The occasion for the letter arose from the preaching of political returns by some priests.

WASHINGTON, August 23.—The Pall Mall Gazette in an article on the William expedition says it is stated that the Norwegian members of the party assert the unfitness of the Americans who accompanied the expedition to take part in such enterprise. Mr. Revelahl, of the university of Christiania, who was one of the party, in a letter written at Walden Isle, stated that the provisions taken by the party were not sufficient, and that all the members were obliged to live on short rations and drink salt water, which was obtained by melting snow and ice. As a result he was made ill. The Gazette further says that in fairness to Wellman the public should suspend judgment until the explorer shall have returned and been given a chance to defend himself.

WASHINGTON, August 23.—Secretary Gresham and Sir John Pancoote, British ambassador, have agreed upon a convention to be ratified by the United States and Great Britain, providing for a commission to be appointed by each country to investigate the amounts of damage to be paid by the United States for seizing Canadian sealers more than three miles from land from 1886 to 1890 inclusive. The Paris-Berlin Sea tribunal established findings of fact that twenty such seizures were made. It is understood the president would like to have the proposed convention approved by the senate before the close of the present session, and it was to learn whether this could be accomplished that Secretary Gresham visited the capital several days ago.

ST. JOHN'S, Aug. 23.—Now that the date of the first by-election has been set, speculation is rife as to the success of the two parties. September 11 has been fixed for the election in the Burgeo and La Palle districts to replace the unseated and disqualified Whiteside member, J. Murray. H. Y. Mott, who was defeated by Murray at the general elections on November 6, 1892, by 100 majority, will probably contest the seat in the interest of the Goodridge government. Mr. Emerson, a cousin of the unseated and disqualified speaker, G. H. Emerson, is named as the Greenie candidate.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 22.—General Master Workman Sovereign, of the Knights of Labor, came to this city a day or two ago, and in company with Secretary Hayes and members of the general executive board, Maguire and Martin, unsuccessfully attempted to participate in a special meeting of District Assembly, No. 1. Sovereign and other general officers narrowly escaped rough usage at the hands of the delegates.

LONDON, Ky., August 23.—Near the mouth of Sexton creek, 16 miles from Manchester, a young woman named Anderson, who had borne a bad reputation, has been found nailed by her hands and feet to a tree, with life nearly extinct. No clue has been found to the perpetrators of the crime, although it is thought to have been committed by women.

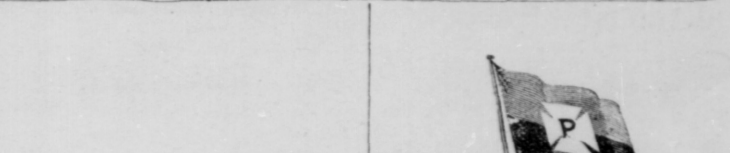
