RALLYING OF ARMS WAS STRESSED AT OPENING OF PARLIAMENT

Following ceremonies of beginning of the fourth session of 21st Parliament at Ottawa, opened by count Alexander, shown shaking hands with Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent, M.P.'s are preparing to dig into one of the heaviest programs of legislation in peacetime lined up by government. One of the most momentous but scarcely surprising items of business on agenda is permission for Canadian participation in the integrated European defence force being organized under command of General Eisenhower.

An unprecedented welcome greeted H.M.C.S. Sioux when the destroyer steamed into Esquimalt, B.C., to the cheers of 25,000 persons. Behind the Sioux were seven months and 50,000 miles of U.N. duty in Korean waters and a few memorable experiences. For she rolled up more miles and days at sea than any other ship in the Canadian flotilla, established a new fueling-at-sea record for British Commonwealth ships, rescued 29 UN soldiers and sailors seen a close second to H.M.C.S. Cayuga for the distinction of being the U.N. destroyer with the longest patrol and was close behind the Albatross in the mines-destroyed column.
