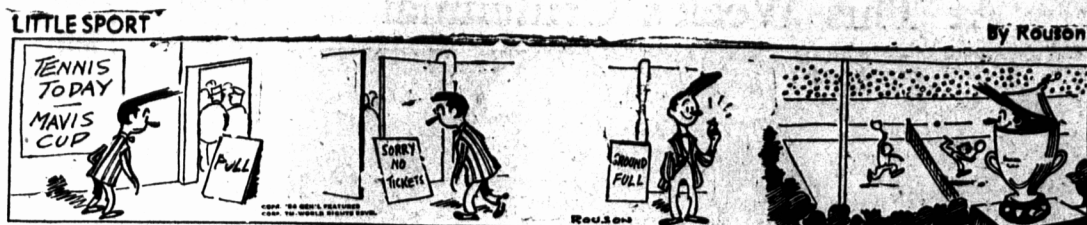

Successful Water Show Staged At Victoria Park

A boat racing programme along with a colorful boat parade was held in the waters off Victoria Park yesterday evening and judging by the success of the show and the enthusiasm of the people boat racing is due for a bouncing comeback.

Despite the drizzling rain and the cool elements a very large crowd turned out to view the entertaining proceedings.

The show kicked off with a parade along Victoria Park and ended with a colorful fireworks display set off from a scow at the finish line of the racing events.

Ron Smith, piloting "Scout" won the snipe race while Robin Houston won the 25 H.P. outboard class and Jim Peake won the 15 H.P. outboard class.

A colorful fireworks display capped the activities at the Park. Following the regatta the members of the Charlottetown Yacht Club, which sponsored the show, held a social evening at the Club quarters.

Against old games records, Lorraine Crapp of Australia ripped a tremendous 15 seconds off the time for the women's 400-yard freestyle, Graham Johnston of South Africa 2:43.9 off the men's gruelling 1,650-yard freestyle, the Australian medley team of Henricks, Dave Hawkins and Cy Weld of 4:30 seconds off the men's 350-yard medley relay, and John Brockway of Wales 1:20 seconds off the men's 110-yard backstroke.

In diving, Peter Healy of Scotland won the men's springboard championship and Australia's Barbara McAulay collected a gold medal for the women's high tower.

Swimming Records Fall At British Empire Games

VANCOUVER (CP) — British Empire Games swimming events ended Friday in a splash that washed four records out of the Games books.

But with 23 events still up for grabs before the nine-day 24-country sports extravaganza ends Saturday, the Australians had no hope of catching England in first place in the over-all unofficial time point standing.

WIN IN FIELD
The Englishmen, piling up points mainly in track and field, had 398 1/2 points, and certain championship of the Games, against 294 1/2 for the runner-up Aussies.

Points are awarded on the basis of 10-8-4-3-2-1 for the first six finishers in each event and England is certain to pick up more in the heavy 10-final track and field program Saturday.

The final day of swimming attracted an overflow crowd of more than 6,000, including the Duke of Edinburgh, at the shiny new Empire pool. And the big throng witnessed the grand windup of the wholesale burial of previous games records.

With the crowd thinning out after the day's final event, it was announced following a late tabulation of times and some shuffling through record books that 18-year-old Jon Henricks of Australia swam faster than any man in history when pacy Australia in the men's 330-yard medley relay championship.

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DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

On the cover page of the latest Harness Horse are photos of Newport Chief, Stenographer and Adora. Newport Chief took a 3-year-old record last year of 1:50 3/5 and ended the season with winnings of \$67,849. This year he is living up to all expectations and at the Grand Circuit meeting held on the half-mile track at Saratoga won the free for all pace in 2:00 1/5, making him the season's champion pacer for a half-mile track. Stenographer is a 3-year-old trotter that as a 2-year-old last season won \$58,603 and took a record of 2:01. This year at Saratoga she set up a new world's trotting record for a 3-year-old fillies on a half-mile track—2:03 4/5. Newport Chief was trained and driven by Del Cameron and Stenographer was trained and driven by Del Miller. Adora, a 2-year-old pacing filly by Adios set up a new world's record for 2-year-old pacing fillies on a half-mile track at the same meeting, time—2:03 1/5. Such speed is almost unbelievable and is the result of selective breeding, early training and excellent judgment of the men who get these horses ready for the fray.

The Joe O'Brien stable is commencing to show up and at the Saratoga Grand Circuit meeting he won the Arden Free For All Trot, purse \$10,000 with Scotch Victor, a 5-year-old by Scotland, heading a number of the fastest trotters in the world including silver Riddle, Anthony Hanover, Duke of Lullwater and Pronto Don. Time, 2:07 3/5, 2:07. The track was very heavy due to rain which was the cause of the slow time. Joe had also won a \$10,000 trot the week previously with Scotch Victor. The same night at Saratoga he won the 22 pace with Diana Star in 2:12 2/5 and was second in the three year old Utica pace, purse \$5,000, time, 2:08 3/5. It was won by Jug Chief. At Yorkers one night last week he had four winners and that was a record for this season.

One of the most outstanding citizens of the United States passed away at Hanover, Pa., recently—Clinton N. Myers, Public benefactor, churchman, banker, publisher, manufacturer and horse lover. He was 78 years old and together with H. D. Sheppard founded the Hanover Shoe Co. Inc. and also Sheppard and Myers, Inc., which operates the retail stores of the Hanover Shoe Co. BRIGHTON GOLF CLUB, N. S. (CP)—Marlene Stewart of Fonthill, Ont., held her six-stroke lead Friday at the end of the second round of the Canadian women's close golf championships here.

Gusty Atlantic winds kept scores above the 70s.

Marlene, bothered by strong headwinds, carded an 81 Friday for a total of 155. The day's best was an 80 by Marlene Wach of Winnipeg but her 98 of the previous round kept her well back in the standings.

Mary Gay Kitchener, Ont., remained in second place with an 80-81 for 161 and Dorothy Herbertson, Victoria, B.C., was third with an 80-83 for 163. Anne Sharp, Fonthill, Ont., turned in an 82 for 165 and Mrs. J. B. A. Brown, Winnipeg, was fifth with 167 after turning in an 82, three better than her first-round score.

Marlene's 81 was matched Friday by Mary Gay of Kitchener, Ont., who remained in the runner-up position, and Mrs. J. H. McCarter, Toronto, who is seventh with a total of 171.

Ontario retained its interprovincial team trophy by edging British Columbia by 20 strokes.

British Columbia was trailed by Saskatchewan, Alberta, Manitoba, the Maritimes and Quebec, in that order.

On the west team were Shirley Fry, Victoria, 165; Mona Morup, Calgary, 168; Sandra Hay, Saskatchewan, 174; and Carolyn Cameron, Winnipeg, 175.
