those United States in which similar commodities are obtained. Those higher prices are, consequently, dependent upon the maintenance of the present rate of the duties. While this is the fact, there is nothing to prevent us from going into the markets of Great Britain, or any other nation, with the balance of our surplus products, and selling them upon terms of equality with those of other countries.

Now, the simple question for our farmers to consider is this—would it be wiser to adopt the indefinite, unknown policy of the Liberals than to hold fast to the definite and well understood policy of the Conservatives? It is to be remembered that the Congress of the United States are, at this moment, engaged in raising (not lowering) the tariff of that country, and that we shall in the future find it even harder to obtain entrance to the markets there than we have in the past.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Mr. L. H. Davies' speech at Sussex lacked the essential element in many respects and in none more so than in respect to sugar. He said, "You admit raw sugar free." Not so. Law sugar is admitted on payment of a duty of half a cent a pound, and it is held by the Globe and other Opposition papers that the reported increase of this year's revenue is due to this fact and not to an improvement of trade.

The New York Outlook says: "Venezuela is republican only in name. During the majority part of its independent existence it has either been in revolution or under a dictator. Great Britain is republican in everything but name. Politically England and Scotland are more democratic than the United States; industrially Australia is more so."

NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL.

The Political Situation Practically Unchanged. The political situation is practically unchanged from yesterday, and it is still one of great and grave uncertainty.

TUPPER AND THE PREMIERSHIP. Sir Mackenzie Bowell Defends the High Commissioner. Sir Charles Tupper came out in response to a telegram sent by Sir Mackenzie Bowell, and it would not be a matter of surprise, in considering all the circumstances as they stand, if by 3 o'clock to-day Bowell were no longer Premier, and that Sir Charles Tupper were engaged in the task of forming a ministry.

OTTAWA, Jan. 9. The political situation is practically unchanged from yesterday, and it is still one of great and grave uncertainty. It was fully expected that the Premier would have made an official announcement last night, but owing to the sudden death of Senator Kaulbach the Senate has adjourned out of respect to the deceased.

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THE SURRENDER OF JOHANNESBURG. Governor Robinson telegraphed Mr. Chamberlain as follows on January 7th: "Johannesburg surrendered unconditional on this afternoon and gave up their arms. President Kruger has indicated his intention to hand over Johannesburg and the other prisoners upon the frontier of Natal. You may be satisfied that the crisis is over and all danger of further hostility ended."
