

House Committee Report May Embarrass Pearson

OTTAWA (CP) — The first Commons committee of the new Parliament met Tuesday to organize its business and in doing so set some precedents that could prove embarrassing to the government.

The defence committee of 24 members decided to appoint a Conservative vice-chairman, former Commons speaker Marcel Lambert, and a six-member steering committee with four opposition and two government MPs.

The government and combined opposition have an equal number of members on the main committee, composed of 12 Liberal, eight Conservative, two Social Credit and two New Democratic Party members. These steps were taken, all members agreed, in an effort to make a non-partisan body out of what is essentially a multi-partisan parliamentary group. In the past, Commons committees and their sub-committees have almost invariably had a healthy government majority

and have had government members as chairmen and vice-chairmen. This is in line with the parliamentary concept that when it comes to legislation and policy, governments propose and parliaments dispose.

PCs NAMED LIBERAL. An exception was made after the 1957 election when the Conservatives came to power and nominated an opposition MP, Liberal Al Macnaughton, now speaker of the Commons, as chairman of the house public accounts committee.

He had a government member as vice-chairman and presided over a committee that was predominantly Conservative. The only other exception in recent years has been in the external affairs committee which usually elects a government MP as chairman and an opposition MP as vice-chairman, to emphasize Parliament's aim of a non-partisan approach to foreign affairs. The Liberals lack a majority in the current Parliament, with

Daily Newspapers Picked For News And Advertising

TORONTO (CP) — Advertisers and ad agency executives were told here that most Canadians in a sample study said the daily newspaper is best among the mass - communications media in providing information in depth, both in news and advertising.

Reports on two studies on the habits, attitudes and motives of Canadians in using newspapers, radio, TV and magazines were announced by the Canadian Daily Newspaper Publishers Association, which sponsored two detailed surveys last year.

One was made by Canadian Facts Limited, the other by the Institute for Motivational Research Incorporated of Grotton-Hudson, N.Y., both in consultation with the Canadian advertising research foundation.

Irving Gilman vice-president of IMR, said at a CDNPA luncheon for 140 advertisers and agency representatives that his company's study of the role of the media in the home indicates that the four do not compete directly. All play complementary and supplementary roles. He said.

BETTER COVERAGE
Questioned on four in a major news stories of 1962, most people told IMR questioners that newspapers provided better coverage and understanding of the federal election, the medical care issue in Saskatchewan and the Balfour Declaration. A majority favored TV for coverage of U.S. astronaut flights.

Most people—75 per cent—believed newspapers should provide leadership in the community by standing for issues, thus stimulating interest and action, and 79 per cent said the newspaper is a major influence in the community.

A Canada-wide sampling on newspaper reading habits, carried out by Canadian Facts Limited, showed that seven of 10 adults read a daily newspaper at least once during a week—74 per cent of the men and 67 per cent of the women.
