### Lib. Motion To Boist Bills Voted Down

A straight party vote defeated a motion by opposition leader A.W. Thomson that a bill empowering the P.E.I. Industrial Corporation to borrow up to \$5,000,000 be given the "sine moras" motion.

The motion came before the Legislature during the closing reading, increases the borrowing power of the corporation to \$5,000,000.

### \$61,938 Loaned Island Business In Federal Plan

CAPITAL BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN - A total of \$61,938 was loaned to Prince Edward Island businesses under the Small Business Loans Act in the last quarter of 1963, the minister of finance has reported.

Of the total, the largest amount of \$34,964 was loaned to manufacturing industries. Another \$16,274 went to assist the retail trade and \$10,000 was a loaned to service businesses. No loans were approved for any island businesses in the wholesale trade.

The P.E.I. total is the second lowest for any province, only Newfoundland with \$22,395 having a lower loan total Quebec with \$2,198,835 led all provinces in the amount of money loaned to small businesses.

In Canada as a whole, there were 689 loans approved for a total of \$6,665,327.
