Vocational Director Addresses Plan Group

SOURIS — W. S. McMurtry, director for vocational training from P.E.I., addressed Kings County delegates at a meeting held to discuss the possibility of a Kings County vocational high school. Delegates from the various regional high schools attended the meeting held Friday evening in the regional high school.

Mr. McMurtry outlined the various aspects of vocational schools and stated the policy of the government regarding direction and control. Classes and courses were explained and the necessity of qualified teachers was emphasized. Mr. McMurtry stated that 18 teachers now employed in Island vocational institutes will be leaving and qualified replacements must be found.

Melvin J. MacQuaid was chairman of the meeting, and most discussion centered around the problem of location for the institute. Paul Kingsbury, chairman of the Montague regional high school, and John Hughes, principal of the regional high, stated that the Montague delegation would accept either Montague or Poole's Corner as the projected site. Considerable debate took place and a resolution was passed stating that the vocational school would be built in the geographic centre of the county.

Mr. McMurtry said the construction costs for the institute would be in the vicinity of \$15 million with a yearly operating cost of \$250,000. The delegates decided to send representatives to the provincial government as soon as possible to determine the amount of government aid the Kings County region would receive.

Three Vehicles In Collision At Montague

MONTAGUE — Two trucks and a car were in collision about 4 o'clock Friday near the Kings County Hospital at the intersection of Queen and Main and although no one was seriously injured the approximate damage was considered to be \$500.

The accident occurred when one of the vehicles coming from behind was unable to stop due to the reported failure of brakes. This vehicle plowed into a truck owned by Montague Furnishing Co. and was pushed into a car driven by Richard Jackson of Montague. The truck was driven by Willard MacDonald of Upper Montague. Cst. Ed. Downe is investigating the accident.

Three-Car Crash Causes Pole Damage

A spokesman for the Maritime Electric Company said city lights were out on Kent, part of Queen, Elm Ave., Prince and other side streets for approximately 12 minutes Saturday evening while linemen made repairs to a line on Queen Street.

City police reported a Maritime Electric truck, driven by Carl Moore of Winsloe, had severed a Maritime Electric pole near the fire hall on Queen Street. It went out of control when involved in a three-car collision near the intersection of Kent and Queen streets about 9 o'clock Saturday evening. The pole will be replaced this morning.

The other vehicles involved in the collision were a 1963 model, owned by Fred Bradley, 5 Windsor Street, and an Irving Oil truck, which was parked on Queen Street near the fire hall. There was no estimate of damages.

P.E.I. Shorthorn Breeders Buy 15 Ont. Animals

Three Dual Purpose Shorthorn breeders from Prince Edward Island purchased 15 head of registered cattle at the dispersal sale of Ross Hewitt, York, Ont., recently.

Waldron MacPhee, Elmwood, purchased three head, including the sale topper at \$500. This was a daughter from a high producing strain of cattle.

Byron MacPhee, Elmwood, purchased a pair for the new herd which he is developing. Keith Barrett, Lot 16 took a total of 10 animals, some of them reportedly a month the best in the herd.

The 15 cows sold averaged \$330 each, a report from the Canadian Shorthorn Association headquarters in Guelph, Ont., indicates.

Karl Rolvaag praised Prof. Sibley's "personal honesty, integrity and high moral character." In Canada, Social Credit Leader Robert Thompson said he could see no justification for barring Prof. Sibley. "Somebody goofed somewhere," he said.

Stanley Knowles, NDP member for Winnipeg North Centre, said Saturday Canada should apologize to the state of Minnesota.

"We simply can't allow this sort of thing as Canadians," he told an interviewer. "It doesn't matter what Prof. Sibley's ideas are. If this country is going to try to keep ideas out, it is not the Canadian way of doing things."

Mr. Knowles said he will raise one aspect of the case in the Commons Monday. He also reported that he had been told by an official in the prime minister's office that Mr. Pearson had ordered a full investigation.

"We can't stand for this, and I don't think Mr. Pearson will stand for it either," he said. HINTED AT MOVE
