ADULT EDUCATION
Adult education is to be a more important feature of our lives. It seems logical that among agricultural people Canada would be of interest and importance. Many farm people are leaving school at an early age and it was later in life that they realized their needs in this regard.

With the great changes taking place in society today it follows that the form of adult education must necessarily adjust to the age.

The Federation of Agriculture has long realized the importance of farm people being more fully acquainted with the social and economic problems related to their lives. For over twenty years National F and A Forum has been supported financially by the Federation.

It is now being proposed that farm organizations should take a longer and harder look at the

needs of adult education in the form of a national seminar on the topic. Accordingly the province has been asked to submit their views on this proposal and matters related to it.

WHO WILL FARM?
Every change in society produces effects in a number of directions. In recent years this province has provided itself with a high school system which now makes it possible for practically every boy and girl to acquire grade 12. This fact is bound to have effects on agriculture. Certainly the high school graduate has a wider choice of occupation and is in an improved position to better his or herself economically. How attractive will farming be to our high school graduates? Will they consider it an offering of opportunities and rewards in the future? Will we find a continuing per cent of boys and girls who do not make the academic grade staying on the land or will they demand and receive an improved type of vocational training tending to make better farmers and better rural citizens of them?

We suspect that the public generally and many of our government people are not really aware of the demanding nature of today's agriculture. Farming is today a complicated business, one that involves heavy investment and financing complications. For the person who wishes to lead a relaxed existence, in an honestly we cannot recommend farming.

IMPORTANT MEETING
We suggest that all rural rate payers circle on their calendar Tuesday, June 4—the day of the annual school meeting. The school meetings are, of course, an important event in the educational world but provides, in addition, about the last remaining control that the tax payer has over his destiny. While parents

with school children have the more direct interest, yet all rate payers have a responsibility which can best be discharged by putting in an appearance on Tuesday evening.

TRESPASS ACT
In 1933 legislation known as the "Summary Trespas A C" was passed which gives the local trustees acting under an order made at an annual or special school meeting authority to designate a field or place where refuse may legally be dumped. Provision is made that once the dumping ground is designated that garbage shall not be disposed in other places. However, this does not prevent the owner of property from dumping on his own property providing the place is not visible from the highway or on the bank of a stream. The important thing about this legislation is that the school district has authority to deal with dumping and this authority extends to used car bodies, one of our worst eye sores.

Canada Has Reluctant Nod For Increase In Air Fares

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada has approved a boost in trans-Atlantic air fares but has served notice that it believes they should be going down—not up. The Air Transport Board has given a reluctant blessing to a compromise deal at the Atlantic fare dispute, settled last Friday in Montreal by the International Air Transport Association.

Under this arrangement, air fares to and from Canada to European countries will go up about five per cent next Monday—a boost of roughly \$35 on a round-trip ticket between Montreal and London.

Then on July 16, one-way fares will be cut by about \$7. This fare arrangement will be in effect until March 31, 1964.

Sometime this fall, IATA airlines will meet to thrash out air fares on world routes after the deadline.

NEED JUSTIFICATION
Canada's two international carriers—the Trans-Canada Air Lines and Canadian Pacific Air Lines—will go to the fare conference with a clear understanding that the Air Transport Board will reject any further Atlantic air fare boost unless there is ample economic justification.

The board, which has power to regulate air fares on all international airlines operating into Canada, opposed the last fare increase on the grounds there was no economic reason for it.

The board feels that fares on

regular flights should go down—drastically reduced fares on not-up—since airlines seem to charter flights across the Atlantic by making money by charging lazier.
