DEATH OF GENERAL GARCIA

Occurred in Washington
Yesterday.

WAS A DISTINGUISHED CUBAN
LEADER AND FIGHTER

The Change to the Northern Climate
Induced Pneumonia

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—General Calixto Garcia, a distinguished Cuban warrior and leader and head of the Commission elected by the Cuban Assembly to visit this country, died here yesterday at the Hotel Raleigh, where the Commission has its headquarters.

The sudden change from the warm climate of Cuba, with the hardships he had there endured, to the wintry weather of New York and Washington, is responsible for the pneumonia which resulted in his demise.

A Traveller Found Dead—Andre
Riopelle Sentenced

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—C. P. Moore, commercial traveller for R. Spence & Co, fish makers, of Hamilton, Ont., was found dead in bed at the Brunswick Hotel last night. Heart disease was the cause of death.

Andre Riopelle was tried at Hull for murder, and found guilty of manslaughter, and sent to the penitentiary for four years.

Dr. DeMille, of Halifax, Dead.

UNITED STATES

Charges of Corruption to be Investigated.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10.—Senator Vest has introduced in the Senate a resolution providing for the appointment of a joint commission to investigate the charges of corruption in the conduct of the war with Spain. The preamble to the resolution recites that "charges have been made in the public press over the signatures of responsible parties that improper and corrupt means have been used to secure contracts from the Government, for the purchase of vessels for the navy and for the furnishing of clothing and other necessary articles for the army of the United States during the war with Spain at excessive and exorbitant rates."

The resolution calls for the appointment of three Senators and five members of the House, and imposes upon them the duty of inquiring as to the truth of all such charges and make report by bill or otherwise.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Aitack Spaniards at Iloilo and
Capture their Trenches.

MANILA, Dec. 12.—According to reliable advices brought from Iloilo, the capital of the island Mindanao in the Visayas group, the insurgents attacked Iloilo on the night of December 18th and captured all Spanish trenches except one.

Then they notified General Rio to remove the woman and children and threatened to renew the attack on the following night.

The Bicycle Race.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Miller won the bicycle race, beating the world's record, held by himself, by 24 miles. The score was 2007 miles, Waller second, Pierce third.

TWO BIG STEAMERS.

The Werra and Eulda Will Run to
Paspebiac.

A special cable to the Montreal Star from Bremen reports: "The Canadian Steamship Company has bought from the North German Lloyd Steamship Company the express steamers Werra and Eulda. The vessels are to be delivered in January, after the expiration of their lease to the Compania Transatlantica for the transportation of Spanish soldiers from Cuba to Spain. They will run between Milford Haven and Paspebiac in connection with the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway Company.

The Eulda was built at Glasgow in 1882. She is 5124 gross tons, has an indicated horse power of 6474 and a speed of 17 knots. She is 429 feet long, 45 feet broad and 35 feet deep. She has two funnels and four masts, and has accommodation for 1265 passengers.

The Werra has 5109 gross tonnage and an indicated horse power of 6408. Her speed is 17 knots, her length is 433 feet. She has two funnels, four masts, and has accommodation for 1260 passengers. She was built in 1867, but had new engines and boilers placed in 1880.

The wharf at Paspebiac being not yet completed the steamer Gaspeic, of the new Canadian Steamship Company, will go to new Carlisle to discharge cargo on her arrival in the Baie des Chaleurs from Milford Haven. Maurice Flynn, steward and a party of men will be in readiness for her on her arrival.

Big Flour Combine.

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 15.—In an interview here yesterday, C. B. Stern of the Atlas flour mills of Milwaukee, stated that he expected the big flour combine would be in operation shortly. The combine will have a capital of 30,000,000. A syndicate of English and American capitalists has been negotiating with the owners of the mills, looking to the formation of a trust for some time past. Mr. Stern said that the Atlas flour mills would be included in the new organization.

The Queen's Gift.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The Queen has given 250 guineas to the Kitchener fund for the establishment of the Gordon Memorial College at Khartoum. The fund now amounts to £90,000.

An Explanation.

PARIS, December, 10.—A semi-official note has been published stating that the utterances of Sir Edmund Monson in his recent speech have been misunderstood. The British Ambassador, the note says, had no desire to interfere in the international affairs of France or to criticize French policy. Moreover, it is added, the whole attitude of the Ambassador contradicts the supposition of malevolent intention.

The Dreyfus Case.

PARIS, December, 10.—The Government has permitted the sending to ex-Captain Dreyfus of all the documents necessary to the preparation of his defence.

Flood in Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, December, 10.—The river Neva suddenly rose nine feet yesterday inundating the lower quarters of the city, where communication is now carried on by boats. The inhabitants were panic-stricken and there was great loss of life as has been reported. The flood is now subsiding.

ON THE WARPATH AGAIN.

The Khalifa Organizing Another
Army

CAIRO, Dec. 10.—The Khalif, Abdulla, who fled into the desert with less than 200 men before the battle of Omdurman had ended, is preparing for another struggle with the British. It is this news which is bringing the Sirdar back so hurriedly from England.

Couriers have arrived at Omdurman with the news that Abdulla has left his hiding place in the desert near Kordofan and is now at Kobe in Darfur with a force of dervishes. Darfur is hundreds of miles farther west of the Nile than Kordofan, so it is apparent that the Khalifa is not seeking an immediate conflict with the British. This region, however, in the very heart of the desert, is excellent recruiting for another Dervish army, and this is undoubtedly Abdulla's intention.

The Darfur tribesmen are among the bravest and most fanatical Moslems. In spite of the slaughter with which they were defeated at Omdurman it is feared that the fanatics will again march east to the Nile.

Another campaign is apparently in store for Lord Kitchener. In any event the reconquest of Kordofan and Darfur for Egypt will probably be undertaken next year. It will be an exceedingly difficult task, involving a march of a thousand miles or more through a waterless desert. The aid which the Nile afforded in the advance to Khartoum will not be available there.

Their Engagement Announced.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—Truth announces that the Queen mother of the Netherlands has written privately to Queen Victoria, informing Her Majesty of the betrothal of Queen Wilhelmina to Prince William of Wied.

Reciprocity Wanted.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—According to a special de-patch from Paris, a telegram has been received there from Brussels declaring that Belgium cannot oblige the United States in the matter of admitting American preserved meats until the American Government shows a willingness to reciprocate by relaxing the heavy duties it imposes upon Belgian cloth and other wares.

BRITISH COLUMBIA FINANCES.

It is Said the Turner Government
Left the Province in Debt.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 10.—The provincial finance minister, Hon. F. Cotton, has created quite a sensation by declaring that the Turner ministry has left a provincial debt of a million dollars, whilst the provincial ministry will also be compelled to take over the guarantee Fraser Valley dyking debentures of over \$600,000. The land owners primarily are liable, but declare they cannot pay the debenture interest. Mr. Cotton says that it will be extremely difficult to avoid a considerable additional to the provincial taxes.
