## CWL Secretary-Treasurer Addresses Convention

Mrs. J.C. MacNeill of Moncton, N. B., national secretary-treasurer of the Catholic Women's League was guest speaker at a dinner at Mount St. Mary's last evening, that marked the close of the 44th annual convention of the provincial CWL.

Mrs. MacNeill spoke on "The Christian in the Community" and said that the CWL groups, as an organization, should analyze its position in the community to see how the organization can be integrated into endeavors for community welfare.

She noted that the individual CWL groups have been calling themselves parish councils. She said "I think that is too all-

are doing. A parish council should be made up of representatives of all organizations in the parish."

### OBJECTIVE

"To be a Christian in our community should be our ultimate objective," she said "if we analyze this objective in relation to our present work, we will realize that to a great extent we are just enlarging the scope of what we are now doing with the added benefit that we are spreading the knowledge of our works into wider fields, helping to unite the whole community in a compatible endeavor to follow the plea of Pope John."

"To be a Christian, she continued, means working with other faiths in a spirit of respect and understanding. Sometimes we have not been careful of the rights of others by passing resolutions on birth control, abortions, divorce and restrictive laws on press, radio and television. As Catholics we know what we have to believe and what we have to practice and we shouldn't have to pass resolutions to impress it on ourselves, and we have no right to try and force our rules on others."

"Community efforts," Mrs. MacNeill said, require people for many tasks so we should always be trying to enlarge our membership. She also urged an expanded program of endeavor and noted that some members lose interest in the League because of the program.

Mrs. MacNeill went on to discuss various aspects of "The

Christian in the Community". In discussing the church as an institution, Mrs. MacNeill said that when considering this topic, a number of questions must be answered, primarily if the church is out of touch with the real world and what if anything can or should be done to correct this, if it exists.

"She also discussed the question of whether or not Catholics were taking enough interest in civic and political life and how the church is coping with industry and industrial life.

Other questions discussed and posed by Mrs. MacNeill concerned health and welfare, education and social life as it concerns Catholics.

In closing Mrs. MacNeill urged all members and parish councils to engage in a complete study of this matter. She said, "If we are to be Christians in the community, we have no better plan of action available to us. If the CWL would find ways to become more knowledgeable about this major program of social life and if other Catholic organizations would do likewise, there would soon come a time when all segments of the community, all faiths, would be brought into the orbit." The speaker was thanked by Mrs. Athol MacDonald.

Among the head-table guests at the dinner last evening, were the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. W.J. MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald; Most Rev. Malcolm MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown; and Charlottetown's deputy mayor, Dorothy Corrigan and Dr. Corrigan.

The two-day annual convention of the CWL got underway at St. Dunstan's University on Saturday afternoon with Pontifical benediction celebrated by the Most Rev. M.A. MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown.
