Matty Alou Trade Highlights Meeting

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Two more minor trades and rumors on the expected naming of George Strickland as the new manager of Chicago White Sox occupied the baseball meetings here Wednesday.

The San Francisco Giants swapped utility outfielder Matty Alou to Pittsburgh Pirates for left-hander Joe Gibbon and utility man Ossie Virgil. The Pirates also will get a minor league player to be named later.

The other trade sent White Sox outfielder Dave Nicholson to the Houston organization, with Astro pitcher Jack Lamabe going to Chicago.

Strickland is being mentioned as the man to succeed Al Lopez, who resigned the White Sox job early last month. But the scoutbook has it that Strickland was the second choice. Mayo Smith, former skipper of Cincinnati Reds and Philadelphia Phillies, is said to have been the choice of Lopez and White Sox general manager Ed Short.

REPORTED UPSET

Lopez, now a consultant to the club, is reported to be upset at the apparent failure of the White Sox to hire Smith. Friends of Lopez say he considers this an indication of lack of faith in his judgment by Chicago owner Arthur W. Noyes.

Smith was offered the job Nov. 7, three days after Lopez's resignation. He flew from his Lake Worth, Fla. home to Chicago eight days later to confer with Allyn, confident the job was his.

However, a disagreement over the length and terms of the contract arose. Allyn insisted on a one-year contract but Smith held out for two years. Negotiations came to an end.

BROTHERS IN LEAGUE

Alou, one of three brothers playing in the majors, batted .381 last year. Gibbon was 4-8 with a 4.50 ERA and Virgil, who started his major-league career with the Giants a decade ago, batted .265 in 39 games.

Lamabe was 0-2 with Houston after winning 10 games and losing three at Toronto in the International League last season.

Nicholson, who batted only .153 in 80 times at bat last summer, set a major league strikeout record of 175 with the White Sox in 1963. He returns to Houston general manager Paul Richards, who gave him a \$108,000 bonus in 1964 at Baltimore.

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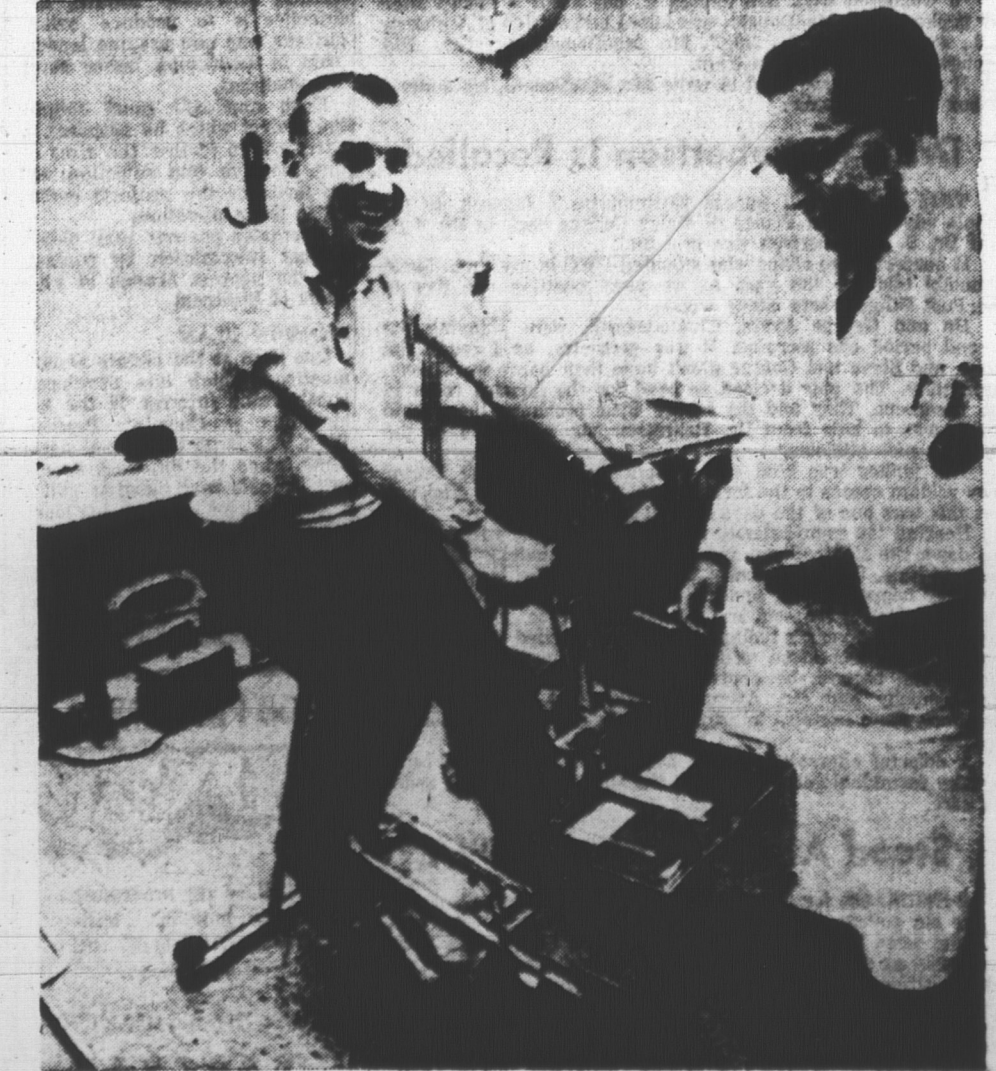
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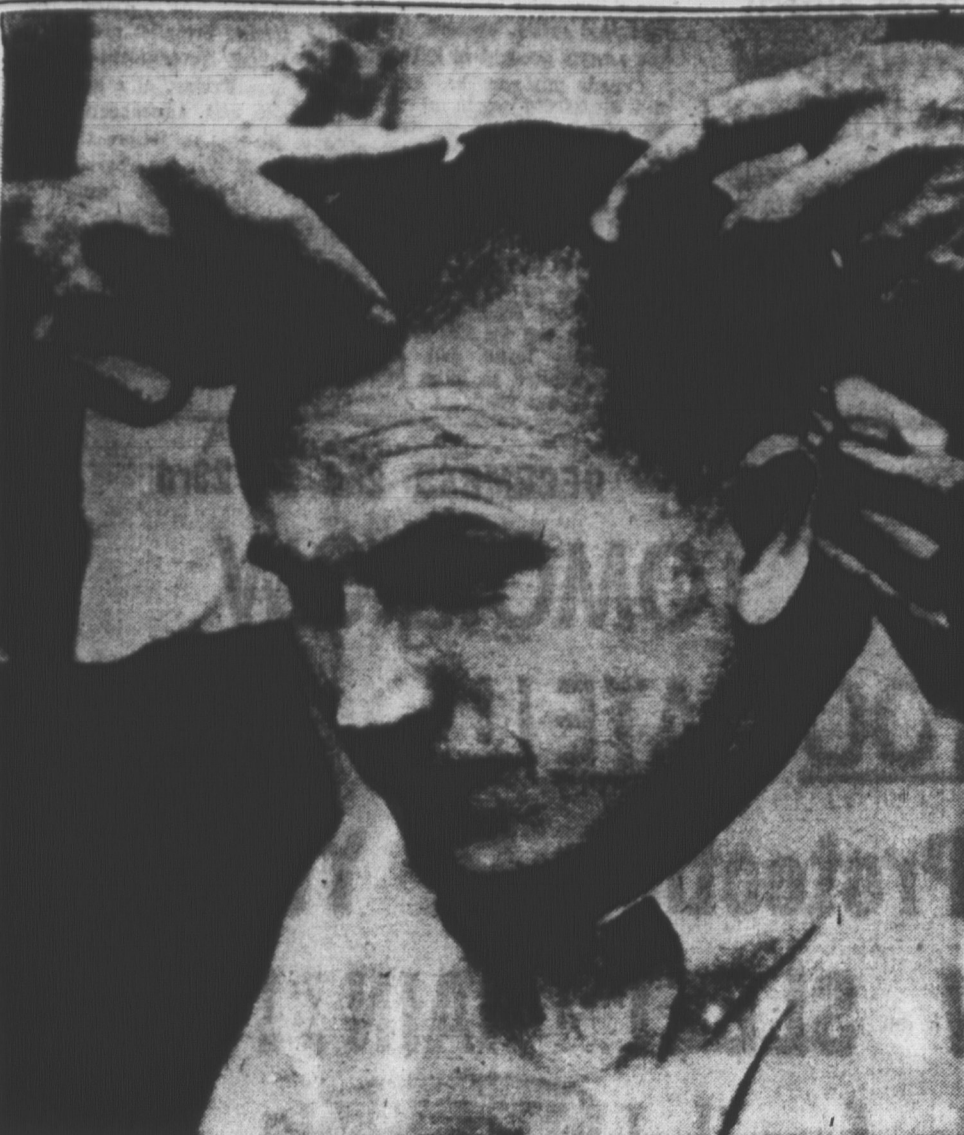


RIDING A BIKE INTO SPACE

Trade Talks Failurer Might Spark Division

TORONTO (CP)—Failure of the current trade talks at Geneva might set off a new wave of protectionism that would leave the Western world split economically. Commerce Secretary John T. Connor of the United States said Wednesday,

He told a meeting of the Canadian Export Association that progress in the talks, aiming at a broad reduction in international trade barriers, has been much slower than most officials had expected, but he still hopes for ultimate success.

"Their success could greatly mitigate the division within Europe which would otherwise result when the Common Market and the European Free Trade Association each eliminate most tariffs among their member nations, opening up a tariff gap

between the two blocs," he said. "Their failure would leave free Europe split down the middle economically."

Mr. Connor, making his first foreign speech since his appointment early this year, said failure of the talks will mean increased pressure by developing nations "for special preferences of all kinds."

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
