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Swedish Girls Not Romantic About Wedding

STOCKHOLM (Reuters) — It is the exception rather than the rule to find a Swedish girl who regards her wedding day as the greatest moment of her life. More often than not she sees it as a costly ceremony required by law.

Many brides regard church ceremonies as hypocritical and radical voices are heard asking if they are really necessary. Why, they ask, can matrimony not be arranged just like any other contract?

Many Swedish couples refuse to marry. They live together, an act condoned by legislation providing that such couples must be taxed jointly.

These couples say that the main advantage is that should they wish to separate there will be no expensive legal fees for divorce.

When a couple fall in love the suitor does not normally approach the girl's parents with a formal request for her hand. He simply announces that he is taking it.

The length of a Swedish engagement may vary from a few days to several years.

FEW ATTEND CHURCH
As in other countries availability of accommodation often decides the wedding day, and in Sweden there are more than 400,000 persons waiting for homes.

Selection of a church or civil ceremony depends on the couples' financial position or their attitude to religion.

Extremely few people in Sweden are regular churchgoers.

Receptions may be large banquets with relatives and friends from both families eating, drinking and dancing through the evening, or they may be less expensive with guests chatting over a glass of wine and a sandwich.

Honeymoon holidays also vary widely. Some couples travel, others go back to work the following day.

At civil marriages, the bridegroom usually wears a dark suit while his bride wears a smart costume or dress. Each wears a buttonhole flower.

Church marriages usually are white weddings with the bridegroom wearing a black tie and tailcoat.
