HORSE TIPS.

Our Boy, 2:13 1/4, will be the fastest harness horse in Honolulu.
 A thoroughbred mare, now racing in California, rejoices in the name of Go to Bed.
 Jack Curry, the 3-year-old brother to the pacer Gil Curry, 2:09 1/2, is a square gaited trotter.
 Robert Grady will have over 30 horses in his training stable at the Point Breeze track, Philadelphia, this spring.
 S. A. Paddock, the wealthy Brooklyn cork manufacturer, carries the sobriquet of Parnon down at Selma, Ala.
 Great things are expected of Carbonate, 2:09, this year. He is in Walter Wood's hands at Overland park, Denver.
 Bright Regent, 2:06 1/4, is proving a great road horse for Colonel Goff of Providence and is going so sound that he may stand training this year.
 O. B. Graves says that Dick Hubbard, 2:09 3/4, can pull a pneumatic buggy in 2:10 and predicts a trotting record of 2:06 for him this year.
 Old Barney, whose mile in 2:08 last year is the fastest ever made by an 11-year-old pacer, will be trained at Readville this year by James McGregor.
 The two Oregon stallions Gyuiscsa, 2:26, by Guy Wilkes, and Klatawah, 2:21, by Daly, are reported matched for \$1,000, the race to be trotted May 17.
 There seems to be a disposition on the part of trotting associations all over the country to offer more money for racing this season than was given last year.
 Probably the oldest thoroughbred horse in the world that is still at the stud is Jock of Oran, by Blair Athol—Tunstall Maid. He was foaled 29 years ago.
 Chrononhotonthologus is a recent barbarity in nomenclature among the trotters, and Hintzilopotchli a running sample. Wooloomoo may hide its diminished head.

PERSONAL CHATS.

Sir Donald A. Smith, the talented and famous Canadian, is said to be the richest man in the Dominion.
 Sir George Cotton is president of the Bombay Cotton Mill Owners' association. His name fits the position admirably.
 Dr. Sven Hedin, the Swedish explorer, has been received in Paris with almost as much attention as was accorded to Nansen.
 Representative Walker of Massachusetts is said to be one of the best horsemen in the house. He rides every morning before he begins his work for the day.
 Hon. J. Hamilton Lewis of Washington says that, in his opinion, the "most pestiferous nuisance to which a member of congress is subjected" is the woman lobbyist.
 It is stated that the name of Sienkiewicz, the author of "Quo Vadis," is pronounced Chenkayevetch, with the accent on the second syllable, and ch as in child.
 Alexandre Siloti, the Russian pianist, is 35 years old and the father of five children. His wife is the daughter of M. Tretiakoff, the owner of the finest art gallery in Moscow.
 The reason Charles Villiers left \$750,000 to each of his nephews was because the "Father of Parliament" was left the money by Miss Mellish. They mutually loved, but never married.
 Rev. T. W. B. Dawson of Troy, Ill., created a sensation a few years ago when he left the Baptists and joined the Adventists, prophesying the approaching end of the world by fire. The other day he was burned to death.
 For the first time in history Queen Victoria has held a reception for some of her sailors. After the return of the cruiser St. George from a three years' stay in South Africa, 24 officers and 284 men were presented to the queen personally.
 David W. Ramsdell, who has just died in Vermont, in 1861 received a package of government seeds. One peculiar variety of grass grown he called "Norway oats." In ten years he made \$3,000,000 from its sale, but he died in poverty.
 Though Cardinal Vaughan was intended for the army by his father, the late Colonel Vaughan, he preferred to enter the priesthood, and his example was followed by six of his younger brothers, while four of his sisters became nuns.
 Alexis Claremont, who died in Wisconsin the other day, carried the mail on foot from Green Bay to Chicago 66 years ago. At the opening of the World's fair he walked 240 miles in order to see it, although he was at the time almost 90 years old.
 Count Castellane, whose wife was Miss Anna Gould, has hired a villa at Cannes, but he and his family are not expected to stay there much this season, for they will make a yachting excursion to Algiers and Tunis. After their return to Cannes the count will go to the town of Castellane, where he has already been announced as a candidate for election to the chamber of deputies.

WHIMS OF FASHION.

Ribbons of all kinds will be much used next season.
 Chiffon and mousseline are to be much used in millinery.
 The coming season promises to be one of diaphanous dress materials.
 Everything crinkled and plisse will be in demand for summer wear.
 It is predicted that "practical" parasols will be the favorites next season.
 The new spring gowns may either be severely plain or elaborately decorated.
 Frivolous petticoats of ribbon and lace insertion are the favorites of the hour.
 Fancy silks will be less used than plain ones for lining the new spring coats and dresses.
 Kimonos, for summer wear, are being made of all the thin materials and of dainty embroidered stuffs.
 The graceful sash will probably be in high favor this summer. Plaid ribbons will be much used for this purpose.
 Most of the new ribbons are in soft, light weaves, stiff bows being no longer admired. Velvet ribbons will be used for belts on the new gowns.
 Pretty satin waists for evening wear are covered with alternate ruches of jet and mousseline bands, embroidered in black silk and small jet beads.
 Enameled buttons are next in favor after those that are jeweled. Cut steel is used in ornamenting pearl buttons, and the result is especially handsome.
 The birds are beginning to breathe again, for there are strong indications that the Easter bonnet will not be decked out with their plumage. Tips will be worn, but no birds and wings.—New York Tribune.

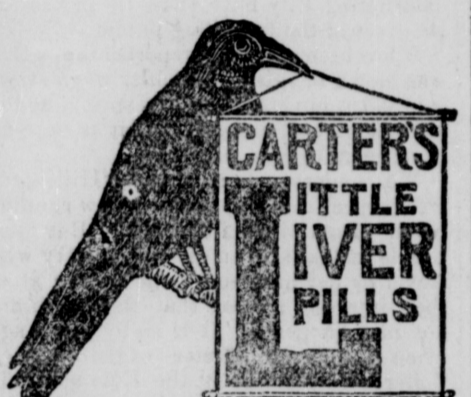
