Kings Hospital Opens Campaign

MONTAGUE — The Kings County Memorial Hospital today opens its annual campaign for funds and the objective this year is \$6,000.

The board of trustees of the hospital explains that this campaign is necessary in order that the hospital may meet its obligations in the payment of capital costs expenditures and also to purchase new equipment.

The capital costs and equipment purchases are not assumed by the P.E.I. Hospital Services Commission.

The board points out that new hospital construction will have to be undertaken soon, and this campaign will assist in starting a reserve building fund for this project.

It is felt that adequate outpatient facilities and additional administration space will be required in the near future.

The board reports a busy year for the hospital with considerable increase in outpatient admissions.

Woman Seriously Injured In Accident At Morell East

MORELL — Struck by a car she is reported to have been crossing the highway at Morell East last evening, Mrs. George Ferguson, 53, is in serious condition in the Charlottetown Hospital.

Mrs. Ferguson who lives in Morell East had both legs fractured, her pelvis crushed and is believed to have suffered internal injuries.

The driver of the car is reported to have been Joseph Alphonse Mallard, 35, of Souris River.

Mrs. Ferguson is said to have been in the passenger seat of a parked car on the south side of the highway at Morell East, and had started across the highway to proceed towards MacSwain's garage in Morell when she was struck by the Mallard car which was travelling towards Souris.

Bystanders placed the injured woman on a board and carried her to the garage from where she was transported by Perry's ambulance to James and John MacCormack of New Zealand.

The accident occurred about 6 o'clock and was investigated by the Souris detachment of the RCMP.

Insurance Bill Sent To Senate

OTTAWA (CP) — More and more restrictions have been placed since the war on Canadian life insurance companies operating abroad, the Senate banking and commerce committee was told Wednesday.

The restrictions have taken different forms, said superintendent of insurance K. R. MacGregor. He mentioned taxation and investment regulations as two of the areas affected.

Mr. MacGregor was answering questions of Senator Gordon Izor (N.S.) during consideration of a bill to incorporate the Allstate Life Insurance Company of Canada.

The bill was approved by the committee and sent back to the Senate for third and final reading.
