## Kennedy's Body Lies In Capitol

WASHINGTON AP—To the mournful roll of muffled drums, the body of President John F. Kennedy was carried from the White House for the last time Sunday and borne to the Capitol to lie in state.

This sorrowing capital offered up a tribute of ancient pageantry as the body passed. The new president, Lyndon B. Johnson, joined scores of thousands of his countrymen in the accolade to the dead.

Across the United States people in their houses of worship prayed for the present slain at 46—and for the new one with avowed burdens so suddenly thrust upon him.

Even as they did so, the man charged with an assassination that shocked the world was shot in the same hospital where Kennedy died Friday.

At the moment of the shooting, seven matched grey horses drawing a caisson were approaching the White House. And soon Kennedy's body was on the way

down Pennsylvania Avenue to lie in state within the Capitol and to receive the homage of the ordinary people of the land.

**CROWDS GATHER**  
Crowds had been gathering at the Capitol, some since midnight, to view the coffin at a resting place in the centre of the rotunda. Police estimated the crowd along the route and at the Capitol at 300,000.

More thousands converged at the White House and along the route of the slow-paced military procession.

Word of the shooting of Oswald flashed among the onlookers. But it produced little reaction. All show of emotion seemed to be reserved for the passing of a president. For him, many people along the route sobbed without shame.

A single horse, riderless and with trappings of black, followed the caisson in a centrist-old symbol of tribute to a dead leader. It was saddled and in the stirrups were empty cavalry boots, reversed.

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## Mourning Millions Pray For Soul Of President

WASHINGTON (CP)—Political leaders and members of royal families from around the world headed for Washington during the weekend to attend today's state funeral for President John Kennedy.

They included Prince Philip, Prime Minister Pearson, France's President de Gaulle, West German President Heinrich Lübke and Chancellor Ludwig Erhard, British Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home and Queen Frederica of Greece.

Russian First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan flew from Moscow to represent Premier Khrushchev.

Before leaving the Russian capital, Mikoyan said the government and Khrushchev personally "have authorized me to convey to the family of the late president, the leaders of the U.S. government and the entire American people sincere condolences on the occasion of this great loss."

In New Delhi, informed sources said Indian Prime Minister Nehru abandoned plans to attend the funeral after it was learned it would be impossible for him to reach Washington in time for the services.

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## Mourning Millions Pray For Soul Of President

Mourning millions on all continents—kings and commoners, rich and poor—prayed Sunday for the soul of President Kennedy for the soul of President Kennedy.

They gathered for memorial services in Buddhist pagodas, Roman Catholic and Protestant churches, Greek Orthodox synagogues, and Jewish synagogues, at synagogues and wherever else people gather to pray.

Alone in a grief-stricken world, Communist China reported Kennedy's assassination on the inside pages of newspapers and the show union newspaper Workers Daily printed a cartoon entitled "Kennedy biting the dust."

**REMARKABLE RESPECT**  
Apart from the ritual of China, and in a lesser degree in Italy, Albania, to mourn the president, tributes from the rest of the world showed extraordinary warmth and respect.

Russian leaders from Premier Khrushchev down continued to mourn Kennedy with a public and spiritual side of the Kennedy family.

**SERVICE AT NOON**  
The rites are set for noon. They will be followed by burial in Arlington National Cemetery across the Potomac River in Virginia.

The White House press secretary, Pierre Salinger, in announcing the arrangements Sunday, said the procession will form at the north portico of the White House when the flag-

ally, president, prime minister and foreign ministers from other countries. Prime Minister Pearson and External Affairs Minister Martin of Canada will be among them.

The funeral mass is to be celebrated by Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston and a longtime personal friend of the Kennedy family.

# Oswald Shot Down By Nightclub Owner

DALLAS (CP)—Lee Harvey Oswald met a merciless death amid a crowd Sunday just as President John F. Kennedy did 48 hours earlier. The accused presidential assassin was shot and killed during a jail transfer.

Jack Rubenstein, alias Ruby, 32, bachelor owner of a downtown Dallas striptease club, dropped unconscious at Oswald's feet, within a cordon of escorting policemen.

That was at 11:20 a.m. while Oswald was being taken from city hall detention quarters to a permanent maximum security cell in Dallas County jail, there to await trial for Kennedy's assassination.

Oswald died at 1:07 p.m. in the same hospital where President Kennedy died Friday, with the same hectic medical activity beforehand of the transfer, was over him who labored valiantly to save the president's life. Ruby was charged with murder in Oswald's slaying.

A crowd of about 200 cheered the shot that cut down Oswald's "body," one person shouted.

A crowd of reporters and television cameramen, advised beforehand of the transfer, was on hand.

Hospital Administrator C. J. Price said attendants on duty at the hospital had been warned of the possibility of attempt on Oswald's life. Thus they were at hand when word of the shooting came from city hall.

The alleged assassin's death was an historic footnote to three days of high drama—beginning about noon Friday when the sharp crack of a sniper's bullet cut down the deposed Kennedy as he rode in a Dal's motorcade.

Here the officer's voice cheered him and he did not finish his sentence.

Police said Attorney Henry Wade had plenty of evidence to prosecute for murder in an attempt to send him to the electric chair. Just as Oswald would have been. The night club operator was held for a court hearing today.

Ruby owns a striptease place Oswald's death may have

left an enduring mystery—whether the black-haired ex-marine, who once tried to become a Russian citizen, really killed Kennedy, and if so why.

Despite intensive questioning, and despite the assertion of authorities that they had enough evidence to send Oswald to the electric chair, the accused assassin never wavered in his insistence he was not Kennedy's killer.

"I did not kill President Kennedy," Oswald declared when he was arrested shortly after the assassination. "I did not kill anyone."

That was the firm denial Oswald died with. But Cape Will Fritz said after his death: "We don't know of anyone else who was involved in it and the shooting came from city hall case is closed. There is no question in my mind that Oswald killed Kennedy."

Oswald never quit seeking evidence. He had plenty, but if we find other evidence, of course . . ."

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## Grieving Jackie To Head Funeral Procession Today

WASHINGTON AP—At the head of procession of U.S. and foreign dignitaries, grieving Jacqueline Kennedy will follow her husband's body today from a spot near the White House to the funeral cathedral.

The White House said Mrs. Kennedy and other dignitaries will move from their residences to positions in the walking procession.

Beside her on the five-block route to St. Matthew's Roman Catholic Cathedral will be Attorney-General Robert F. Kennedy, brother of slain President John F. Kennedy.

Behind them will come President Johnson and scores of senators, governors, judges, cabinet members and mayors plus royalty, president, prime minister and foreign ministers from other countries. Prime Minister Pearson and External Affairs Minister Martin of Canada will be among them.

The funeral mass is to be celebrated by Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston and a longtime personal friend of the Kennedy family.
