CANADA WINS.—The Canadian yacht Glencairn has won three races out of four for the Seewanka cup, thus keeping the trophy in Canada.

RACES AT GEORGETOWN.—There will be races and a tea party in the Driving Park at Georgetown on Tuesday the 24th, inst. There will be a 2.40, a three-minute and a green race. A bicycle race will also take place if enough contestants enter.

HOME IN TRIUMPH.—Mr. Cyrus McMillan returned in triumph last evening from Halifax, where his and Mr. Lorne Unsworth's performances at the Wanderer's sports kept the Island well to the front in the events which these young men entered. They carried off between them seven out of fourteen prizes. Mr. Unsworth did not return last evening, as he was booked for the races at Amherst. The prizes are on exhibition at Mr. A. W. Reddin's, the Central Drug Store.

DIED AT HIS POST.—Michael McLeod, lighthouse keeper at Point Prim died suddenly at the lighthouse on last Friday, the 13th inst., at the age of 75 years. He was appointed to his present position by the late Hon. J. C. Pope, on June 3, 1868, and held it up to his death on Friday last. Mr. McLeod was a man of good moral and religious character, a strong and faithful believer in the Established Church of Scotland, and a kind husband. He leaves behind him a widow, four daughters and two sons, the younger, Samuel, has charge of the lighthouse at present.

The Christianized Esquimaux north of Hudson Bay built a church, and as there was no wood available they used whale ribs for rafters and covered them with the tan hides of the walrus. The edifice would seat about one hundred people and was used Sunday after Sunday for divine worship. Photographs were even taken of the church and sent to missionary publications in London, showing the ingenious device of building a church without wood. All went well until the advent of the intensely cold winter, and then hosts of famished dogs promptly attacked the church and eat it up.

FOR THE NORTHWEST.—The I. C. R. depot presented a lively scene last evening when about three hundred able bodied men left for Manitoba and the Northwest on a special train. For some time the C. P. R. have been advertising a cheap harvest excursion, and when the regular express for Montreal arrived here last evening some two hours late, there were on board some two hundred farm laborers bound for the Northwest. Ten extra cars came in and were detached here. The regular train was sent out shortly afterwards, and about 7:30 o'clock a special with the excursionists including fully seventy-five from P. E. I., as well as the large number from Nova Scotia and Cape Breton, and the hundred or more from this district, left for the west. The party will be rushed through in the quickest possible time. The special was made up of twelve cars, eleven passenger and one baggage.

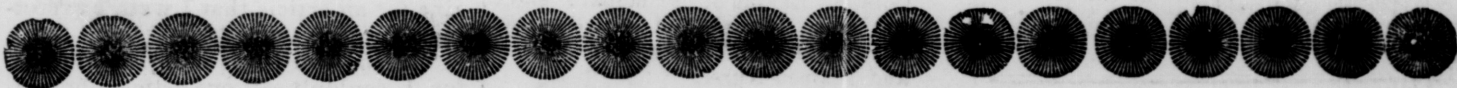
