

**Retired Editor
Dies In Nassau**

NASSAU, Bahamas (CP)—H. Napier Moore, 68, retired editorial director of Maclean's Publishing Company in Toronto, died in hospital here Thursday. He had been in ill health since rupturing an appendix March 25.

Mr. Moore served as editor of Maclean's magazine before taking over as editorial director of the company. He retired eight years ago and has been living in England and Nassau.

Editor of Maclean's magazine for 20 years, he built the publication's circulation from 30,000 to more than 250,000 and encouraged struggling writers and artists. Among these were Stephen Leacock, W. O. Mitchell, Norman Reilly Raine, Arthur Mayse, Ralph Allen, W. Arthur Lewis and Marjorie Wilkins Campbell.

Floyd S. Chalmers, Maclean-Hunter president, said in Toronto Thursday Mr. Moore "was one of Canada's great editors and probably did more than any of his contemporaries to help develop the country's literary talent."

BORN IN ENGLAND

Born at Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, he began his newspaper career as a reporter on the Newcastle Daily Journal in 1916.

He joined the Vancouver News Advertiser staff in 1918, and later that year worked for the old Montreal Daily Mail, of which he became news editor.

In 1918, he joined the Montreal Star and went to New York two years later as resident correspondent. Versatile and keen, he was an illustrator and author of many short stories and plays as well as a newspaper man.

His first wife, the former Blanche Whitley, died in 1911, the mother of his only son, Alan, of Montreal, who survives.

In 1932, Mr. Moore married Marjorie Noble, daughter of the late Sir Ernest Bain, who died in England last June.

He is also survived by a brother, John, of Vancouver. After cremation, a memorial service will be held in Nassau at a date to be determined.

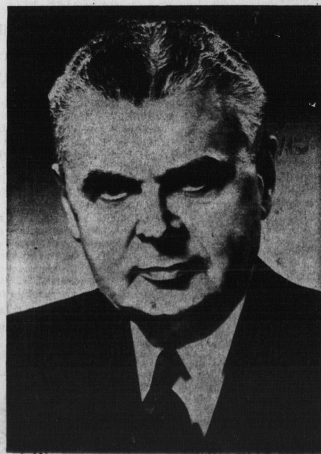

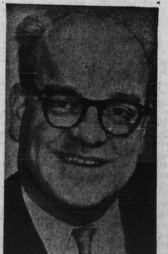
