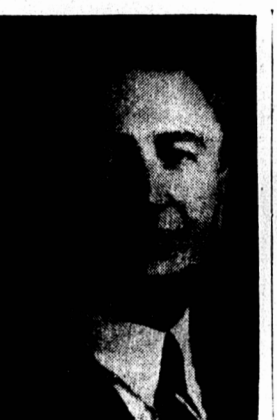

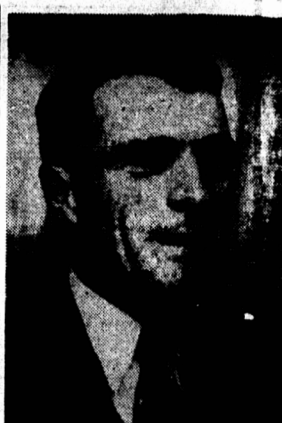

### Contract Bridge

#### TOO SACRIFICIAL

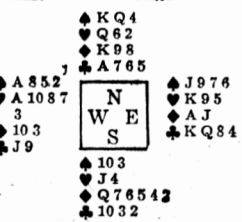
One of the worst things that can happen to a certain type of player is to be non-vulnerable against vulnerable opponents. Under this condition he is apt to make the most outrageous "sacrifices," on the absurd theory that he can afford the loss of a great many tricks to keep the opponents from going game and rubber.

Apparently, South in today's deal belonged in this category—although it must be conceded that he was aided and abetted to a certain degree by his own partner.

It must be conceded that East-West also "pushed" a little in getting to the four-heart contract—which, incidentally, could not have been made against routine defense. The East-West aggressiveness, however, was logical—they at least could have come very close to their goal, whereas the five diamond sacrifice was inexcusable. It is true that a more discreet North, having opened the bidding on a minimum would not have raised South's diamond bid, but, even after this raise, South had to be pretty reckless to overcall four hearts!

Ordinary defense would have defeated five diamonds 700 points, but East-West did a little better than that! West had the inspiration to lead a low spade, away from the ace, and South, feeling that his only chance to save something was to let the lead ride to his own ten—it certainly seemed that East had the ace—did so, only to see East win the trick with the jack! East shifted to the king

of clubs, and the upshot was that the defense took two spade tricks, two hearts, two clubs and one diamond, for a 900-point penalty.
