

Butter Output Nearing Record High Level Here

The possibility that Prince Edward Island's dairymen may hit an all-time high in butter production this year was suggested yesterday by H.J. MacDonald, provincial dairy superintendent.

A total of 4,680,015 pounds of butter has been produced to the end of September this year and production is running at 185,290 pounds per week, at present.

An average of slightly more than 111,000 pounds per week for the remaining 13 weeks from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31 would boost the total past the all-time record of 4,125,287 pounds, produced here in 1954.

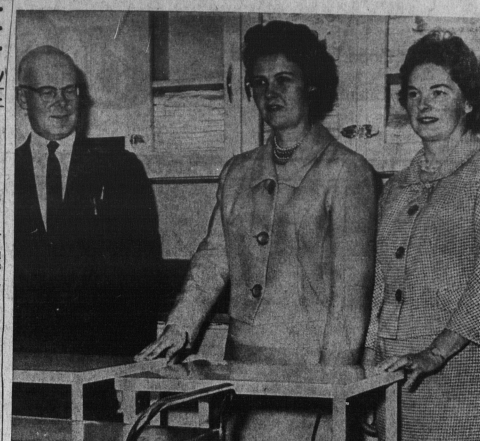

Crash In Spain Kills 18 Persons

MADRID, Spain (AP) — A Spanish airlines plane carrying 18 passengers and five crew members crashed and burned Friday near the village of Cameros. Headquarters of Iberian airlines here announced that all aboard perished.

The plane, a twin engine Conqair, left Madrid early in the day on a regular run to Barcelona, Valencia and Sevilla with 23 passengers. Police at Valencia said there were 14 passengers aboard when it left there just before the crash, but airlines officials said the number actually was 18, including a child.

A spokesman said contact was lost with the plane just after the pilot radioed for permission to descend from 4,000 to 3,000 feet five minutes from Sevilla. This contradicted earlier reports that it had sent a message about a fire aboard.

A U.S. Air Force helicopter carrying doctors to the scene had reported back it could spot no survivors.

ON HOW TO SAVE MORE PIGS AT FARROWING TIME

1. Scrub sow with solution of Purina C & S Powder, rinse with clear water, then with Purina Disinfectant Concentrate solution 1, o to 6 gals. water.

2. Clean and disinfect farrowing quarters and equipment to control scours and transmission of worms or diseases.

3. Keep farrowing place well ventilated.

4. Try to keep temperature above 40° in winter, under 70° in summer.

5. Take up each pig and immediately tie and dip navel cord, at about 2 inches, and paint with a 50-50 iodine and glycerine mixture.

6. Wipe away slimy mucus from nose

and mouth. Put in brooder or under heat lamp.

7. Clip needle teeth, using sharp clippers, to prevent pain from injuring each other and sow's udder.

8. After teeth are clipped, paint gums with iodine-glycerine mixture. If ears are notched, also paint with iodine-glycerine mixture.
