Trade Fair To Open At Chicago

CHICAGO, Aug. 6 - (AP) - A fair designed to promote world trade, prosperity and peace will open Monday.

It is the first United States international trade fair - a \$2,000,000 display of the world's finest wares.

The 14-day event is a direct response to repeated admonitions of American business men to foreign exporters: "If you want to earn dollars, come show us the goods." Forty-seven countries will exhibit a wide range of merchandise. Russia and her satellites will not be represented, but Yugoslavia has leased space for its exhibits.

Other American cities are considering following Chicago's lead. A number of fairs in American cities would enable foreign exhibitors to make a grand circuit of such shows with their products. The 2,500 exhibitors have leased 200,000 square feet of display space - eight miles of space at navy pier and several acres at the international amphitheatre. Twenty per cent of the displays will be American and 80 per cent foreign.

Western European exhibits who have leased more than 50 per cent of the space value their exhibits at \$16,000,000. The other exhibits were estimated roughly at \$19,000,000.

Steel Mills Revise Schedule

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 6 - (AP) - Steel mills already are revamping some production schedules as military orders rise, Steel magazine says today.

This contributing to shipment delays on civilian account and giving impetus to a consumer's scramble for protective tonnage, the weekly adds. "For the near future voluntary allocations will prove adequate to care for all likely armament needs," Steel predicts.

The national steelmaking rate rose one point last week to 100.5 per cent of rated capacity production, or about 1,916,000 tons.

New, Fast Lake Freighters Planned

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 5 - (AP) - Three new lake freighters to be built soon for the Pittsburgh Steamship Company, a United States Steel subsidiary, will be the largest and fastest in its fleet of 61 ships, president W. C. Hemingway announced. Hemingway said the new 18,000-ton-capacity ore carriers will have an over-all length of 646 feet and 11 inches, beam of 70 feet and depth of 36 feet. They are expected to cost more than \$5,000,000 each.

Mr. Cyrus Eaton Predicts Good Times

Registered beef Shorthorn cattle from the Canadian and American herds of Cyrus Eaton, Nova Scotia, made their debut at the Acadia Farms at Northfield, Ohio. The prize Shorthorn pair from Deep Cove were exhibited at important Maritime fairs last year, and were winners wherever shown.

Deep Cove Rosebud, bull and heifer that were raised at Mr. Eaton's Deep Cove Farms near Chester, N. S., and shipped this spring to his Acadia Farms at Northfield, Ohio. The prize Shorthorn pair from Deep Cove were exhibited at important Maritime fairs last year, and were winners wherever shown.

Mr. Eaton recently arrived in Nova Scotia with eight of his grandchildren for his annual extended stay at Deep Cove Farms. He is convinced that the farmers of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island can do a profitable business in raising purebred and registered beef breeding stock for the American market, where such cattle are permitted to enter duty-free.

Properly fertilized and seeded, the pastures of the Maritime Provinces can become the best in North America, "says Mr. Eaton," and can be an important factor in producing superior beef breeding cattle." In support of his contention, Mr. Eaton is conducting a progressive pasture-improvement at Deep Cove Farms, where his registered Shorthorn herd now numbers forty head.

Also in Nova Scotia for the summer is Miss Betty Royon, Vice President of both Deep Cove and Acadia Farms, and Director of the Ohio Shorthorn Breeders' Association. James Napier, President of the Eaton farming enterprises in Canada and the United States, returned to Ohio to prepare for the Summit Centennial Fair after serving as judge at the Aulac Regional Shorthorn Show last month. Last February, Mr. Napier made a trip to his native Scotland to select two top bulls for the Eaton herds at a total of \$32,000.

British Defence Chiefs To Visit Canada

OTTAWA, Aug. 6 - Fifteen members of the student body and directing staff of Britain's Imperial Defence College will arrive here Sunday, August 13, by air from England on a 24-day tour of Canada from coast to coast, Defence Minister Brooke Claxton announced yesterday.

A similar party from the College came to Canada last year, visiting and inspecting industrial plants and defence installations in the larger centres and in the north. Almost the same cities and stations are to be included in this year's tour, and a week will be spent in the United States before the party returns to the United Kingdom from Montreal on September 14. Employment In Russia Increases

LONDON, Aug. 6 - (Reuters) - Employment in Russia is increasing, Moscow radio claims. The radio quoted an official report detailing fulfilment of the five-year plan target figures for the R.S.F.S.R. (Russia proper, the biggest federated republic of the U.S.S.R.) during the second three months of this year.

This disclosed that the number of "workers and clerical workers" in the republican and local economy of the R.S.F.S.R. increased by 6.5 per cent compared with the second quarter of 1949.

But the report quoted no actual figure for the number of workers employed. (Nearly all workers in Russia are directly or indirectly employed by the state.)

The report added that further growth continued during the quarter in "labor productivity in industry under republican and regional control. The task set by the state plan for the second quarter of 1950 for labor productivity in most branches of industry has been fulfilled."

Giving percentage figures for fulfilment of plan targets, it disclosed that the republican ministries of the meat and dairy industry and of the fish industry had failed to achieve their targets. The former failed by five per cent and the latter by three per cent.
