CURRENCIES

MONTREAL (CP) — The US dollar closed Monday at a term of 3.18 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, up from 3.17 1/2% on Friday.

TORONTO

(TORONTO CP) — The stock market opened lower Monday and remained down for the entire session, which was mainly due to light trading.

NEW YORK

(AP) — The stock market started out the last month of the year in a rather inauspicious fashion Monday, most leading issues declining fractions to about 2 points. Missiles stocks closed mixed.

U.S. Steel and Bethlehem, the two highest steel producers, fell about a point as steel operations sank to the lowest level of the year last week.

Missile stocks continued to attract attention, North American Aviation, the most active issue, gained 3/4 at 31 1/2 and Sperry Rand, a second most active, moved up 1/2 at 20 1/2.

Both companies are associated with the Thor and Jupiter missiles, production of which was authorized last week.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed down 1/2 at 158.70 with the industrials down 1/2, rails down 1/4 and utilities unchanged. The drop in the average clipped an estimated \$140,000,000 from the value of all stocks on the New York Stock Exchange.

Volume totalled 2,430,000 shares compared with 2,740,000 Friday.

Canadian gainers on the New York exchange included Western Gooderham, up 1/2 on 300 shares, and Phillips-Struggans, 1/2 higher 3 1/4.

NEW YORK (AP) — Adlai Stevenson said Sunday night he does not expect to attend the North Atlantic Treaty Organization conference in Paris Dec. 16.

Stevenson, acting as a consultant to State Secretary Dulles, said that "by that time, Mr. Dulles will have had my views and my work will be over."

Returning to Washington after a weekend here for the two-time Democratic candidate for president said he has "high hopes" that the NATO meeting will "renew confidence in the Atlantic Alliance" by clarifying United States foreign policies which have been misunderstood in Europe.

He told reporters at La Guardia airport that he will participate in the administration's bipartisan conference of congressional leaders Tuesday. The White House said the matter has been settled.

"The situation is normal and there is no longer any need to consider shutting down," Mr. Campbell said.

NO SHUT DOWN IN SPRINGHILL MINE

SPRINGHILL, N.S. (CP) — Employees of the Cumberland Hallway and Coal Company's No. 2 mine here breached earlier today, knowing the pit has been given a new lease in life.

Mine Manager William S. Campbell, who warned in October that operations might be suspended if "illegal work stoppages and absenteeism" did not cease by Nov. 30, said Sunday "the matter has been settled."

"The situation is normal and there is no longer any need to consider shutting down," Mr. Campbell said.
