vious to her father's death and also at the funeral, two sons Gerald, an homesteader and Read, a farmer nearby. A son Lorne and daughter Eva (Mrs. Clifton Ince) pre-deceased him.

Numerous floral tributes from friends and relatives in Ontario, Nova Scotia and the homeland were silent testimonials of the esteem in which he was held.

The funeral services on April 25th, were conducted at the home by his pastor, the Rev. Bryer Jones, assisted by Rev. A.E. Piercy. The Hymn sung was "Abiding With Me", followed by Scripture Reading and prayer. A fitting tribute to the departed and comforting messages to the bereaved.

The body was tenderly laid to rest in New Glasgow, Cemetery to await the Resurrection morn.
